Month of June FRANCE IS PREPARING FOR A FIGHT TO THE FINISH

Desperate Struggle is Coming HOLDS THE RECORD Between the Government and ihe Unions--- Revolutionary Talk Fails to Disturb the **People of Paris**

PARIS, May 8—Both the government and the state employes including the men of the department of posts and telegraphs are today rapidly marshalling their forces for the impending struggle. Premier Clemenceau is still confined to his room by ill health, but

The strike committee of the postal employes ridicule the measures adopted by the government and promise big surprises. It is understood that they do not intend to declare a strike until next Tuesday in order to give parilament which reassembles Monday a chance to intervene in their favor. Their manifestoes, which are couched in the phrase of the revolution read as if they were martyrs to liberty. For instance, in amouncing the refusal of seven postmen to appear before the council of discipline today, on the ground that to comply would be an interference with their liberty, these men are described as "going to the execution in charretes." a term empoyed in the days of the reign of terror to describe the carts which conveyed the victims of the revolutionary tribunal to the guillotine.
