ONTARIO "MOVIES" CENSORS ARE TO RECEIVE MORE PAY

Price of Inspecting Film is Advanced from Fifty Cents to Dollar and a Half.

Toronto, Jan. 27.—The ardent work of Chairman Elliott, G. A. Armstrong and R. Wilson, Ontario Commissioners of Moving Picture Films, beginning today, has been more remunerative. Hislerto inspection of a film has cost the film exchange fifty cents, henceforth the charge for the same work will be a dollar and a half.

At their little demonstration theater on Danforth avenue, the commissioners probably do enough work to call for the best pay in the province. They must be closely inspected so that no objectionable feature may be allowed to pass, and this necessitates some-thing like the best play in the picture all the time, but the effect on the little picture houses throughout the province which in some cases already find it best to play the picture on a five cent admission rate, is to be awaited. Ultimately, perhaps, the patrons will pay the tax.

WINDING UP OF THE SOVEREIGN BANK

Order Made Yesterday at Ottawa, by Judge Lemieux—Interim Liquidator is Appointed.

Toronto, Jan. 27.—An order winding up the Sovereign Bank on the petition of G. T. Clarkson, creditor in excess of \$10,000, was made at Ottawa today this morning by Mr. Justice Lemieux.

The order names Mr. Clarkson as interim liquidator, with a reference to Geo. Kappelke, K. C. The liquidator is to give security to the extent of \$35,000.

James Bicknell, K. C., represented the curator, the petitioner and all the creditors, with the exception of the Quebec Bank.

D. T. Symons, for the Quebec Bank, consented to the order.

"Everything is in order," remarked Mr. Bicknell. "The meetings of the creditors and shareholders were duly advertised. We have had the meetings, and have been stenographic reports of the meetings and the report of Mr. Clarkson."

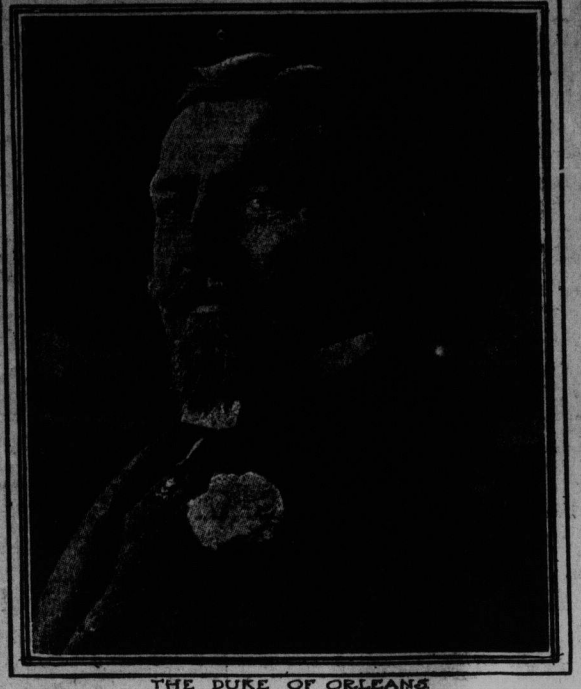
ATTELL AND KILBANE

DEATH WHEN ROOF COLLAPSES
Men were at Work in Mill
When Supports Gave Way.

MACHINERY STOPS
FALLING TIMBER
Hartland Minister Denounces Dances of Present Day and Warns Congregation against Tango and Turkey Trot.

Hartland, N. B., Jan. 26.—A miraculous escape from death or serious injury was the lot of three men working in the old Flemming mill, now owned by Nevins & Pries, about a mile below here, on Saturday. The mill had recently been remodelled and some additions made to it, the whole being covered by a corrugated iron roof. The heavy snow of the past few days, together with the mild weather of Saturday had caused such a weight on the roof that the supports were unable to bear it and nearly the whole top of the building came down with a tremendous crash Saturday afternoon. Thirty the entire crew of nine men were busy at their work in fancied security from all harm. At the first sound of danger there was a general scramble for the machinery and safety, but the fall of the mass above was so sudden that the men were practically imprisoned where they stood. Fortunately, however, the machinery and other obstructions arrested the fall of timbers and iron, and beyond a few bruises the men were able to crawl from under the debris with nothing but the scare to remember the occasion. Very little damage was done to the machinery, and the main loss to the owners will be cost of clearing away and building a new roof together with the loss of business in the meantime. It is a thankful lot of men who never recount their experience to eager listeners.

The heavy storm of snow, followed by high winds, rain and cold on Saturday night and Sunday, have made the roads in a practically impassable condition, and people in the surrounding country are virtually prisoners until the roads can be broken out. So bad were the roads on Sunday morning that Rev. Mr. Hazel, of Woodstock, who was to hold service and officiate in the church of Eng. land here was unable to fulfil his engagement, and as the pastor, Rev. Mr. Franchetti, who is in Woodstock to officiate in Mr. Hazel's absence, there was no service possible and those who had braved the storm were obliged to go home unrefreshed by their fulfilment to their religious duty.

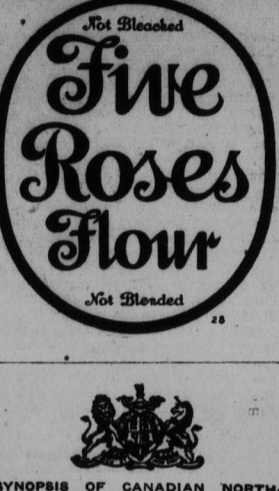

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.
COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre on the claim year, or paid to the mining Recorder. When \$50.00 has been expended for paid and other requirements, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.
