Among the children, a number have died of measles. in a vast camp here is an interesting sidelight on the war. The camp sidelight on the war. The camp, i which is one of the numerous similar concentration centres spread about Holland, is situated on a sandy plain surrounded by pine woods renowned for their efficacy in the treatment of tuberculosis. It consists of four villages formed of capitally arranged and commodious huts in which each family has a chamber. All have board floors and are illuminated with electric light.


In each of the villages are large workrooms for different trades, wash houses, baths and a children's recreation shed, all provided with heating apparatus, while there are four school houses and a wooden church capable of seating about 2,000 people. Hospitals for ordinary allments and for infectious diseases, a dispensary and several small libraries have been either specially erected or established in houses already standing in the neighborhood and lent for the purpose by charitable people.

The camp is under a Dutch military guard and besides the company of 150 soldiers a small detachment of county police and Belgian gendarmes patrols the villages to keep order. Tools necessary to all the ordinary trades are provided and several small huts in each village are fitted up as workshops. The men make or mend all their own shoes and clothes, while the women do the sewing.

It is interesting to observe the pride the refugees take in the decoration of the huts, which are separated by wide tracts of ground. Each shack has received its name and the differences in the two Belgian races—Flemish and Walloon—can be marked at quee by the inscriptions in Low Dutch or French. A small proportion of the people are bi-lingual, but 6,000 of them speak only Flemish and the other 3,000 only French.

HOW ZEPPELINS COMMUNICATE WITH OUTSIDE WORLD.



This picture, drawn specially for this newspaper, the New York Herald and the London Sphere by G. H. Davis, shows the wireless equipment of a Zeppelin. The modern Zeppelin is equipped with a wireless apparatus with a range of 120 miles. The aerial consists of 750 feet of phospher-bronze wire, which hangs from the airship with a plummet on the end, and when not in use is wound around the wheel, seen in the illustration. At night, when wireless waves are most efficient, a Zeppelin over England could easily communicate with the wonderful system of wireless stations in Germany.

"From the sea to the Oise our artillery has carried on an efficacious shelling, which has dispersed a number of gatherings, blown up some caissons, and destroyed some trains.

"To the north of Arras we have taken two lines of trenches, and beaten back violent counter-attack. We have made some prisoners and inflicted on the enemy heavy losses. A number of German officers have been killed.

"In the neighborhood of Rhelps, near Loivre, the advances made on Feb. 16, several hundred metres, have been maintained and consolidated.

"In the Champagne district we have followed up our gains to the northwest of Perthes, and have captured positions of the enemy on a front of 800 metres. All the German counter-attacks to the north of Mesnil-Les-Hurlus and Beausejours have been repulsed.

"We captured a large bomb thrower and several small ones, and made 200 prisoners. This engagement continues.

"In the Argonne we have made progress in the forest of La Grurle, and maintained our gain, notwithstanding two counter-attacks and several very hot actions at close quarters, which resulted in heavy losses to the enemy.

"A strong attack by the Germans was completely repulsed at Four De Paris.

"Between the Argonne and the Meuse we have made progress at divers points.

"In Alsace we have taken control of the ridges which dominate the Sudel farm, and we have retained all the ground conquered.
"Our aviators have bombarded the railway station of Freiburg in Breisgau." GERMANY

Berlin, via London, Feb. 17.—Today's statement from the War Office is as follows:

"Western theatre: Obviously induced to do so by our great successes the British and French began especially stubborn attacks at many places. In their unsuccessful attempts to capture positions which they lost on the 14th of Febuary, the British lost in prisoners four officers and 170 men.

"Northeast of Rheims the enemy's attacks were repuised. Two officers and 179 Frenchmen were captured. Especially strong advances made against our lines in Champagne district frequently led to fierce fighting at close quarters. With the exception of certain separate sections where the enemy has been concentrated and where the battle continues, the troops of the enemy were repulsed everywhere. About 300 Frenchmen were taken prisoners.

"In the Argonne we continued our offensive and captured further portions of the enemy's main positions, taking 330 prisoners, two mountain cannon and four machine guns. In Priesterwald, north of Toul, small successes also were recorded. On this occasion two machine guns were captured. There is no news from the Aleace-Lorraine frontier.

"Eastern theatre: North of the Niemen river our troops have followed everywhere the defeated enemy in the direction of Taurogan.

Germany is increasingly presenting a pitiable sight to the world and the straits which she is experiencing have been publicly indicated by her frantic appeal to the United States to endeavor to secure for her a continuation of the much needed supplies of food of which it has now been admitted abe has no longer sufficient to meet the wants of her people. In this hour of her need when the wolf, of which she has far more fear than of the lion or of the bear, is standing hard by her door, she has signified her entire will ingness to withhold her threatened submarine blockade of England, on condition that she may be permitted, as formerly, to procure those provisions, lacking which, her entire campaign must inevitably prove a complete failure. "Starving" Cermany.

(Editorial, New York Evening Post.)
Statements from German sources, official and unofficial, are growing more and more definite about the attempt of England to reduce the population of Germany to starvation. Thus Count Zeppelin, in his interview of yesterday, speaks of the effort to "starve our women and children." In the same line, and even more specific, is the assertion made by the German Government itself, in its explanation of the Admiratly order declaring a "war zone" around the British Isles, and undertaking to sink merchant vessels regardless of peril to crew and passenters. It justifies so extreme a measure—which must still be regarded as little more than an impotent threat—by asserting that the English plan is "not only to strike at Germany's military strength, but also at the economic life of Germany, and, finally, through starvation, doom the entire population of Germany to destruction."

Such utterances have to be liberally discounted for rhetorical overstatement. Their primary aim is to rouse sentiment against Britain's exercise of the command of the sea. No one supposes that there is any immediate danger of anything like "starvation" in Germany. Indeed, more than one German economic pathority has boasted that the nation is self-supporting; and that, even if the war were to last two or three years, food would be lacking to neither the army nor the civilian population. This estimate is probably not very wide of the facts. Germany is undoubtedly much hampered by the great cutting down of her or dinary imports of foodstuffs. But her resourcefulness is so great, the skill of her being starved is at least very premature. "Starvation," as the word is used, is a relative term. Luxuries and even many things customarily regarded as necessities may be cut of, and yet life may be supported. So that a starving Germany is to be thought of for the present as only a figure of speech.

The free use of it, however, by Germans themselves does serve to indi-Meanwhile the Kaiser and his bureau-crats might find some illuminating in-formation as to what is involved in the "We shall never sheath the sword, which we have not lightly drawn, until Belgium recovers in full measure, all and more than all, she has sacrifieed, until France is adequately secured against the menace of aggression, until the rights of the smaller nationalities of Europe are placed upon on unassallable foundation, and until the military domination of Prussia is wholly and finally destroyed."

It is cold comfort for Germans to be told that all this should have been foreseen at the time when their rulers were sending ultimatums that meant war, and a war into which England was certain to be drawn. Professor Delbruck, in his role as apologist for Germany, has just borne testimony to the "consummate diplomatic ability" of Sir Edward Grey in maneuvring the German Chancellor into a false position, as regards the neutrality of Belsium. But he omits to state that the English Foreign Secretary had previously made a proposal which would have insured the peace of Europe. By rejecting that and signing, even if with tears, as alleged, the order for German mobilization, the Kalser condemned non-combatant Germans to the hardship and misery which they how see looming before them. All that it is necessary to say is that a government which, in the last week of July, refused the sure means of peace, ought not, in the first week of February, to whine over the inevitable consequences of war.






