

New York, N. Y., Aug. 22.—How to produce artificial daylight seems, according to a London despatch to the simultaneously in England and Germany and the results promise that artists will soon be able to paint by "daylight lamps," and that art classes may be held in the night time. House wives will not have to wait for a bright day in order to match dress materials.

Dr. C. E. Kenneth Mees, who has been working on the new idea in England, in a lecture yesterday described to the illuminating and Engineering Society of London successful experiments with the new invention. "Daylight lamps" were originally intended for measuring the sensitiveness of photograph plates. He stated that he first constructed a filter by means of dyes adjusted to follow a spectrophotometer curve, which after an initial failure was satisfactory for his own work, but was not a permanent affair and hence he devised another with permanent dyes.

The difficulty was to find a satisfactory blue. He recently discovered this and got a permanent as well as an almost perfect resemblance to day. Light. 
