**Gold Discovered on the Nashua.**

(Frederick Star.)

Some time ago we stated a party was to start up Nashua on a gold prospecting expedition. The party, numbering five persons, the river about forty miles to the spot whence the specimens had been brought. The country is wild and wooded, and a vein of quartz runs down to the banks of the river. The party found on examination that the vein towards the river was crumbling and was among the sand saw SHINING GRAINS OF YELLOW METAL.

The party then began to search on the surface, and found two dozen pure gold, varying in size from a mustard seed shot to a swan drop. The land on which the gold was found belongs to Mr. A. Gibson, and he has taken immediate steps to put up a quartzing mill. The gold region is about two miles below the Napadoggin Stream and there is every reason to believe that quartz, rich in gold, extends through a wide tract. The quartz was shown to experienced gentlemen who pronounced it richly laden with gold. The grains picked were valued at \$10. Among the gold was an expedition were Mr. A. Gibson, Rev. W. W. Brewer and John Gibson.

**Death of Archbishop McKinnon of Antigonish.**

It is our painful duty to record this morning the death of His Grace Archbishop McKinnon, for many years Roman Catholic Bishop of Antigonish. The deceased Prelate had been in delicate health for some time, so that his demise which occurred at Antigonish yesterday afternoon, was not altogether unexpected. He was born in Antigonish in 1810, and entered the priesthood at an early age. In 1852, he succeeded the late Bishop Fraser, as Bishop of Antigonish, being consecrated in St. Mary's, in this city, by the late Archbishop Walsh. For twenty-five years, he discharged the high duties of his office in that important diocese with great advantage to his own church and winning the highest respect and esteem from all other denominations. In 1877, owing to failing health, he resigned his episcopate, and was succeeded by his Lordship Bishop Cameron who had been for many years previously his coadjutor. Shortly afterwards the Holy Father created him a bishop of Antigonish in *partibus*, an honor well deserved and highly appreciated by the deceased prelate. His death will be sincerely mourned throughout his former diocese not only by his own people, but by all creeds and classes.—*Halifax Herald, Saturday.*

**The Customs Department.**

In the course of a lengthy and able review of the political history of the last twelve months and of the action of the present Government since it took office, the *Toronto Mail* says: "The Customs Department, under Mr. Bowell, has inaugurated a system of rigid and vigorous collection of the revenue, in which the interest of the retail trade, the wholesale trade, manufacturers and laborers will be protected in spite of all that silly agitation can say in defence of smugglers and swindlers of the revenue. A system of uniform valuation of goods of a like character has been adopted with the full approval of those who had occasion to know how much such a reform was needed."

This is a fitting answer to those journals which have persistently assailed the Minister of Customs since his appointment. His great energy and practical ability have manifested themselves conspicuously, and we venture to say that it will be found when the next official report of the operations of the Department under his control shall be published, that the efficiency of the service has been vastly increased under his management, and that the expenses have been considerably decreased.

The Montreal *Star*, noticing a recent letter from Mr. Bright, in which he criticizes the National Policy of Canada, thus puts the matter as viewed from the Canadian point of view:

John Bright does not believe in Protection, and he believes the present policy of the Canadian Government is inflicting a wound on our union between the colony and England. Yes, but that is not the great question at issue. The great point is—How will the protective tariff affect Canada? That is the issue at stake. What is the welfare of the men of Manchester or Leeds, if by that welfare we suffer? Our own prosperity is of more importance to us than the prosperity of the gun-makers of Birmingham or the cotton spinners of Oldham. If Protection makes Canadian manufacturers flourish, why should we hesitate because English manufacturers thereby fail? Are we to injure our own trade because a wall comes from a Stalybridge, or Sheffield? Loyalty to the crown does not entail disloyalty to ourselves. We are to treat the property of the British and in which we live. We should be neither more nor less than men, angels or imbeciles, if we did not place the welfare of Canada, the prosperity of our people, the comfort of our homes and the freedom we enjoy above every other issue in the world, no matter who or what stands in the way. John Bright advocates free trade. Why? Because as an Englishman he desires the prosperity of England, and he believes Free Trade most conducive to that prosperity. We Canadians advocate Protection, because we believe it is most calculated to do the country good. At least Canada is committed to give Protection a fair trial, and if it is successful we do not care the loss of a button who is injured, so long as we are benefited ourselves. As a matter of choice, Canadians would not aim an unnecessary blow at English commerce. We are too loyal to desire to injure the mother land, but when we come down to hard facts it is everyone for himself, and the warning bells who catches "the hindmost."

The hostile feeling which has lately arisen between Germany and Russia having induced much speculation as to the respective military strength of the leading European powers, the Vienna correspondent of the *London Standard* furnishes some particulars obtained upon good authority. The strength of the German army is put at 1,250,000 men, of whom 400,000 are undrafted. The state of the territorial army and Garde Mobile is so doubtful that France is considered to have ready for the opening of a campaign, only 1,000,000 men, of whom 400,000 must be deducted for garrisons, leaving 600,000 really available. The Russian force, nominally 1,800,000, is supposed, after like deductions, not to exceed 400,000 men on the German frontier.

THE N. B. UNIVERSITY.—The result of the matriculation examinations for entrance to the N. B. University was announced at noon on Saturday. The 21 applicants successfully passed the examination and will form the Freshman Class to open on Monday. The class with their respective positions is as follows:—McFarland, 799 points out of a possible 1000, of York; Weldon, 793, of Moncton; McFarlane, Weldon, Johnson, Kierstead, of Kings; Phillips, of Fredericton; Chapman, of Kings; McIntosh, Taylor and Duke, of St. John; Bridges, of Queens; Raymond, of Kings; Smith, Williams and Fowler, of Queens; Russell, of Northumberland; W. Crockett, of Fredericton; Magee, of St. John; Blair, of Northumberland; McFarlane, Weldon, Johnson, Kierstead and McIntosh take the scholarships for York, Westmoreland, Queens, Kings and St. John, respectively.—*Sun.*

Gambetta, Viceroy Lyttel of India, King Thuan of Burmah, Prince Kung of China, the Emperor of Siam, the Mikado of Japan.

THE TARIFF.—The *Toronto Mail* in the course of an article on the revenue and tariff, says:—"The tariff has not been so fatal to British trade as is proved; that it has been effectual against our nearer rivals will plainly be seen; and that it has enabled us to regain a good portion of our West India trade will also be made apparent. We shall not be surprised to learn, for instance, that our sugar importations from the West Indies, which last year in the quarter ending in June, were only 4,000,000 pounds weight, while this year prove to be nearly 18,000,000 pounds weight, or nearly 14,000,000 pounds more than last year."

The gold fever in Queen's, N. S., is still increasing. Persons from all parts of the country have visited Middlefield, and many fine gold specimens have been obtained. A dozen prospecting licences have been applied for, and, in a short time, work will actively commence. Messrs. Morton and Rhyno commenced sinking a trench, the prospectors are encouraging. Mr. Barnes will commence digging to find the lead in a few days. Others will begin operations at an early day. The recent gold discoveries have led to a search in other parts of the county, and both iron and copper ore have been discovered.

The *Fredericton Reporter* says: While Frederickton is still free from any financial difficulties in the management of the town schools, the trustees of the town of Antigonish seem to be alive to the exigencies of the times, and have been endeavoring to manage matters with the view of reducing the expenditure. As a first step in this direction, the trustees have decided to make a reduction in the salaries of the teachers. The removal entirely of these important subjects from the curriculum is to be regretted, and it is to be hoped that the action of the trustees will doubtless be approved. It is further contemplated to make additional reductions in the salaries of the teachers, and to make a slight reduction in the salaries of the clerks.

The *Charlottetown Examiner* says that the Inspector of Fisheries has seized and put the Queen's broad arrow on the doors of some of the lobster factories eastward from Point Prim, for carrying beyond the season; and has also dispensed with the services of the Warder, who failed to carry out his orders as to promptly closing the factories in this locality, appointed—viz: the 20th of August.

TENANTS RIGHTS IN IRELAND.—London, Sept. 26.—A great tenants' rights meeting was held in Listel street, yesterday (Thursday) at which 15,000 were present. It was addressed by many prominent men.

Some hundreds of the tenants on Lord Normanby's estate have refused to pay rent. They threatened the agent, who had offered to make a fair reduction. Excitement in Tipperary over the affair is intense.
