

**WILLIAM ANDERSON'S DEATH**  
Mr. Wm. Anderson, who for many years was one of the active citizens of Chatham, and closely identified with its social, business and religious life, died on Saturday aged 82. He was superannuated as an officer of the customs a few years ago, and has been confined to the house by ill health since then. He used to take a keen interest in water sports, and added to his list of Chatham sports the participation of the World began. He put up a racing rig on a custom house boat, and sailed a great race against several craft. We mention this as showing how, even as a man past middle life, he took a keen interest in the innocent outdoor recreations of his fellow citizens. He was a very active member of St. John's church and a model citizen in every respect. His only son, Robt. H., is manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in St. John's. His daughters are Mrs. Rev. Dr. Fraser, Owen Sound; Mrs. J. S. Benson, Campbellton and Miss Katie. Funeral Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock.—World.

**THE SPROUL ESTATE**  
A meeting of the creditors of the late William Sproul of Campbellton, who assigned on Dec. 29, 1908, took place at Dalhousie on Friday. The closing incidents of Mr. Sproul's life were very peculiar and his assignments only three days before his death constitutes an occurrence, which is unique in the experience of even the oldest lawyers. His estate instead of being administered in the manner of the ordinary decedent's is accordingly being treated as that of a bankrupt. At the meeting at Dalhousie, R. A. Corbett of this city, who was building for Mr. Sproul a large hotel, was represented by J. King Kelley. Mr. Kelly also appeared for other interests as did A. E. G. MacKenzie of Campbellton. It was decided to make James Kelly assignee of the estate instead of Sheriff Stewart. The hotel property now building on the old Royal-Commercial site, is to be held by the creditors, and the assignee has instructions not to sell. Mr. Corbett has a mechanic's lien on the building for \$15,000. A concrete foundation has been built for the hotel and \$1,700 worth of work has been done on it.—Sun.
