SIXTH CONVENTION OF UNION OF NEW BRUNSWICK MUNICIPALITIES

Discusses Many Important Problems and Adopts Important Resolutions--Endorses Local Option for Municipalities in Taxation Matters--Permanent Roads Advocated

With a large and representative attendance from the various parts of the province, the sessions of the sixth annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities were inaugurated on Wednesday afternoon at the Town Hall. The undersigned attending the opening also characterized the remaining sessions of the convention and many important matters were added to the volume of business expediently transacted by the intelligent gentlemen, comprising the Union.

The Hon. John Morrissey, Chief Commissioner of Public Works who has been a familiar figure at past conventions, officially opened the sixth meeting. Dr. Sterling, president of the Union was in the chair and he introduced Hon. Mr. Morrissey and invited him to a seat on the platform. He also congratulated Mr. J. W. McCready, the efficient Honorary Secretary on his election as president of the Canadian Municipal Union and invited Mr. McCready to rest on the platform. The congratulations to Mr. McCready were shared by every member present. In the course of a forceful address, the Hon. Mr. Morrissey referred to the previous opportunities afforded him to meet the gentlemen of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities. There were present many new faces and many old members. He was pleased to welcome all to the Union. The sun shone brighter in Miramichi and all we lack are industries. There should be a stimulus for the development of manufactures.

There was considerable discussion on the subject of the permanent road. Good roads were essential in the development of our province and the Commission was a strong believer in the policy of a permanent road-way for the province. It would be incumbent to borrow \$1,000,000, but the auto tax would be larger and in forty years there would be sufficient amount available from this source along to remit the bonds, allowing also for the interest. There would be no tax to the farmers directly or indirectly. Should we not go to work and build permanent roads, as well as guaranteeing the bonds of railways? The speaker in conclusion referred to the absence of Premier Hazen who had gone higher in the political arena. Mr. Hazen is a man who stands high in the opinion of the men of New Brunswick and we feel proud to see him go to the higher office at Ottawa.

Mayor Pedolin extended the welcome of the Town Council and citizens of Newcastle to the visiting delegates. He was pleased to notice the large attendance and anticipated profitable sessions for the Union. Ald. Potts, replying for the delegates, expressed his pleasure at the large attendance. He appreciated the interesting remarks of Hon. Mr. Morrissey who showed such an active interest in the Union. He also was impressed with Mayor Pedolin who was most congenial. The address by St. John also referred to the policy of securing a larger number of capital in the province.

Mr. Hazen said that the people were beginning to appreciate the importance of the question. He congratulated Mayor Thomas on his excellent paper. County Secretary Kelley took a fearful view of the situation and expressed his horror of the importance of reform. He discussed the criminal problem in all its ramifications, related personal experience with courts, and gave a vast amount of information on this important question.

Coun. Cochrane contributed interestingly to the discussion. He dwelt on the provincial reformatory and said that the boys were well behaved. The institution was in every respect a prison. County Secretary Kelley and himself had been appointed to investigate farms in Upper Canada and the United States with a view to establishing a prison farm along the same lines in St. John.

Ald. Wallace, Mayor Pedolin, Coun. G. Sidall, Ald. Potts and others discussed the matter. On motion of Mr. Sidall, seconded by Ald. Potts, the paper was referred to a special committee for consideration and President Sterling named Mayor Thomas, Secretary Kelley and Coun. Sidall.

A resolution introduced by Coun. Sidall and seconded by Coun. Farrell of Fredericton, asking the establishment of a Provincial Detective Bureau, was adopted after a prolonged discussion. A resolution introduced by Coun. Sidall and seconded by Coun. Cochrane, advocating that the government take steps to provide a permanent roadway, was carried unanimously amid applause.

Warden Rogers, moved, seconded by Coun. Sidall, a vote of thanks to Chief Commissioner Morrissey, which was carried unanimously. The latter responded appropriately. Mr. Morrissey seemed especially pleased that action had been taken re. a permanent road way, in which respect he is a great believer.

At the evening session Mayor Reilly read a most interesting paper on Provincial Industrial Development. He dwelt with the immense water power privileges which our country possessed and urged their proper development. He took up the Agricultural phase of the matter, the conservation of our natural products, the matter of new industries and other matters. He gave the convention adequate information to support his contentions. The paper showed careful study and was a credit to the writer.

Very valuable information was contributed by Ald. Potts, Coun. Sidall, Mayor Thomas, Secretary Kelley, Coun. Cochrane, Ald. Wallace, Ald. Potts, Dr. Sterling and others. Coun. Hiltz moved, seconded by Coun. Polley, that the meeting express its appreciation of Mayor Reilly's work in the preparation of such an admirable paper. Carried.

Dr. Sterling in extending the vote of thanks, asked Mayor Reilly to prepare a paper on similar lines for the next convention. At the session of the convention on Thursday morning, Mr. Kelley introduced two very important resolutions, which were seconded by Coun. Sidall. Mr. Kelley ably explained the purport of each resolution, the first dealing with a Juvenile court and Children's Aid Society and asking the government to take steps for the establishment of the same. The second affords power to Municipal boards etc. to expropriate lands for public purposes. There is considerable difficulty encountered at the present time to secure lands for public purposes. Both resolutions were carried.

The first resolution was the report of Mayor Thomas, Secretary Kelly and Coun. Sidall on the form of a very excellent paper. The discussion on the second resolution was participated in by Coun. Donovan of St. John.

Ald. Stuart's very excellent paper on the system of Taxation was very well received and he came in for much congratulation on his efforts. Ald. Potts, Ald. Butler spoke on the paper and both seconded a proposed resolution, moved by Ald. Stuart, the consideration of which was adjourned until the afternoon session.

Ald. Stuart's motion to empower Municipalities to change the system of assessment, if they deem it advisable, was carried and his resolution to qualification for candidates for municipal honors was not voted on owing to the fact that sufficient notice had not been given.

DEATH OF JOHN C. SLAYTON AT SIERRA MADRE

Word has been received here of the death of Mr. John C. Slayton a native of Grand Rapids who removed to California about three years ago. Mr. Slayton was married to Catherine M. Currie a daughter of Daniel Currie of Campbellton. The deceased gentleman was proprietor of the Sierra Madre Central Meat Market and left his business in his usual health one evening, but on retiring to rest complained of a pain in head. The doctor was summoned and a specialist from Los Angeles called in, but Mr. Slayton succumbed after nine days illness.

The body was taken to Grand Rapids for interment by Mrs. Slayton who was accompanied by her two sisters Miss Jennie and Margaret Currie from New York.

Vote of thanks were extended to the retiring president, Mayor and Town Council of Newcastle, Secretary McCready and the press.

Ald. Stuart's paper was on motion ordered to be entered in the minutes. In the absence of Secretary McCready on Thursday, P. St. J. Bliss efficiently filled the duties of that office. Everything passed off pleasantly and the Union concluded one of its most profitable sessions with a supper on Thursday evening tendered by the town.

NOW PREMIER BORDEN IS IN CHARGE

The Liberal Ministry Resigned Office on Friday—The New Cabinet Announced

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—At 3 o'clock
this afternoon, Sir Wilfrid Laurier
tendered the resignation of himself
and colleagues to His excellency
Earl Gray.

Before leaving for Rideau Hall,
the premier assembled in his office
all the staff of the privy council
and in a few sincere and graceful
words expressed his personal
thanks to each and all for their
uniformly faithful and efficient
services. He assured them that
he would always be glad to be of
any possible service to them in
promoting their welfare and happi-
ness.

Then he drove alone to Rideau
Hall, where he formally tendered
to Earl Gray the resignation of
his government and recommended
his excellency to call on R. L. Bor-
den to form the new government.
After that Sir Wilfrid drove home
and this evening spent his first
real case-free hours in the welcome
quiet of his library.

Mr. Borden was summoned by
his excellency at 6 o'clock this
evening, and immediately drove
to Rideau Hall.

The incoming premier accepted
the trust which his excellency
imposed in him, and in accordance
with the usual procedure asked
for a brief interlude to select his
colleagues.

WOODLOT INSPECTION

BY GOVERNMENT

Increasing difficulty is being found
in obtaining an adequate supply of
hardwood lumber for the industry
of Canada. The hardwood tracts of
the eastern provinces for a long time
have not been able to meet the
demand, and in 1910 60 per cent of
the hardwood used in Canada was
imported from the United States.

The United States, although with a
much larger supply of hardwood on
hand is also seeing that the annual
consumption far exceeds the annual
growth and that the virgin supply is
being rapidly reduced.

By practical
demonstration it has been proven
that waste land if planted in young
hardwoods, will prove a profitable in-
vestment at the end of twenty-five
years or more, and will improve the
productiveness of the surrounding

farm land. In the eastern provinces
of Canada and Ontario, particularly
are large tracts of such lands, covered
at present with an unprofitable
tree growth, which through being
sandy, rocky or low lying, cannot be
treated as agricultural lands.

The Forestry Branch of the Department
of the Interior is taking a practical
interest in the farmer's woodlot of
Ontario, in an effort to make other-
wise useless land supply hardwood
lumber to an eager market, with
profitable returns to the wood land
owners.

Parties interested in
this matter should correspond with the
Department at Ottawa, which is al-
ready giving practical assistance on
important tracts. Foresters will be
supplied by the Department to look
over tracts of timbered land, estimate
the quantity of timber, advise as to
what species to encourage or plant
according to the locality and general
conditions, and suggest a general
working plan. Such scientific know-
ledge, the result of former investi-
gations, will be of great benefit to
private owners and should be sought
after at once.

YOU CAN MOVEMENT AGAINST SAVE MONEY NE TEMERE DECREE

Toronto, Oct. 7.—With the church courts of every Protestant body in Canada committed to a policy of opposition toward the Ne Temere decree, a new movement has been started by the evangelists of the Canadian Protestant alliance in Toronto. Every church of Canadian Protestants was represented. A public educational campaign by means of large mass meetings will be inaugurated. Finally a petition will be taken to the Government, and a demand made that the marriage laws of Canada will be placed beyond church interference. Petitions will also be laid before every provincial government in the dominion. As British Columbia and N. B. control their own marriage laws and retain the privilege of granting divorces, separate appeals will be made to them. The government of Ontario will be asked to take steps at the earliest possible moment to have the court of appeals determine the extent and jurisdiction of the province and of the parliament of Canada on the subject of marriage laws.

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—That the pepper used throughout Canada has been found to contain 40 per cent adulteration for the last thirty-three years, has been shown by a pamphlet issued by Mr. A. McGill, chief analyst of the Department of Inland Revenue. All kinds of adulterants have been used, including wheat husks, ground cottonseed shells, maize, and different kinds of foreign starches, but the common adulterant is ground olive stones.

YORK COUNTY BOY PRAISES NORTH SHORE

(From Daily Mail)
Mason's Mountain,
Restigouche Co., N. B.

Mr. Editor—Much has been said of the beauty of the Restigouche River, so it was with curiosity and expectation that I left the cars at Metapedia P. Q. After a dreary wait of two hours at the station, I started across the Restigouche River, and I may say right here, that its lovely beauty went far beyond my greatest expectations.
Soon after my arrival, I visited "Catherine Cottage" which is built of logs. There are steps leading from the highway road down to this picturesque cottage; around the cottage runs a wide veranda, and from the veranda are steps leading down to waters edge. Tall trees bend over the cottage as though they were protecting it from the winds and storms.

From the veranda can be seen the broad sweep of that far famed stream known as the "Restigouche." On either side rise tall mountains, crown with white snow. It is a beautiful sight to see the last rays of the sun lighting up the mountain tips, with a golden splendor. Nothing to disturb the quiet evening air but the cry of the gulls or the hark of the wild geese. And falling into a dreamy listless mellowing of the times, when in the quiet dusk of evening the Red man's birch canoe, loaded with the spoils of the chase, glided down the placid stream to the wigwam, nestling close to the mountain. But as the scene is changed, instead of the wigwam, I see the white man's house close to the beach, and here and there on the mountains are cottages of well to do farmers, and the lights in their wigwams wink and blink like great shining stars.

But though the Restigouche has grand and awe striking scenery, yet I think it cannot compare with the Miramichi in its simple beauty.

A NATIVE OF YORK COUNTY CROPS GOOD

Hon. Dr. Landry, Commissioner of Agriculture said recently that while his department had not received full reports in regard to the crop production throughout the province, his information was that the farmers generally had enjoyed a very successful season. The field, root and fruit crops, having turned out well. As regards the potato crop it had turned out exceptionally well, and the indications were that the price of this article would be high this fall, as the reports indicated that the Ontario potato crop had proven a failure, and there would be a big demand for New Brunswick potatoes from the Montreal market.

FOUNDING THE MIRAMICHI

The Department of Public Works is undertaking some boring and sounding operations in the Miramichi river, near Mr. R. N. Malloy, has arrived from Fredericton to superintend the work. The work is preliminary to the laying out of the new bridge across the Miramichi.

WORLD'S METHODIST CONFERENCE

Delegates Represent 30,000,000
People—Better Conditions
for Workmen Demanded.

Toronto, Oct. 4.—The fourth Ecumenical Methodist Conference opened here to-day.
Delegates representing 30,000,000 adherents are present.
Toronto, Oct. 5.—Dr. Carroll stated that in ten years the membership had increased only about 1,000,000 considerably less than in previous decades.
Of the representatives from England nearly one-half are laymen, but nearly all are preachers. Of the 20,000 sermons that are preached every Sunday in Wesleyan pulpits, 16,000 are by lay preachers.
Rev. S. Ogata of Japan advocated union of all Christians into one church.
Toronto, Oct. 6.—During the last year there were 2,528 Methodist foreign missionaries. These included 918 ordained men and 120 physicians—53 of the doctors being women. Native workers numbered 20,847; missionary stations and sub-stations, 6,762; representing 708,105 baptized Christians, and 1,444,294 adherents of whom 458,195 were Sunday school teachers and scholars.
The ordained ministry of Ecumenical Methodism at the beginning of 1910 was 52,968 of whom but 2,322 or five per cent. counting foreign and native were in the mission fields.
Our means as expressed by the income of the missionary societies in 1910, totalled about \$7,000,000, representing about eighty cents to each of the 8,715,434 Methodists.
W. C. Pearce is responsible for the statement that during the past two years 500,000 men have taken up the systematic study of the Bible in the Sunday schools of America.
Toronto, Oct. 7.—Papers on Christianity and social problems by two British M. P.s and former Vice-President Fairbanks of the U. S. A. were features of to-day's session.
The keynote of the church should be more religion in business, and more business in religion, said Charles W. Fairbanks. "Inequality of wages for men and women, working under like conditions, is an affront to the spirit of Christian religion."
A paper by Arthur Hender son, M. P., of London who was detained at home by government duties, was read by T. R. Farnes, M. P.

THE WAR FOR POSSESSION OF TRIPOLI Indian Moslems Appeal to Britain to Interfere in Behalf of Turkey.

The bombardment of the city of Tripoli (capital of the province of Tripoli and a town of 40,000) began on October 3rd, and the batteries were silenced next day. The people of the town and retired inland. The forts were demolished and many Turkish soldiers killed. Not a Turkish shot reached the Italian fleet.
The Turkish soldiers gave proof of extraordinary courage. Frequently they exposed themselves unnecessarily. It appears from statements made by the prisoners taken that the Turks did not at first realize their inferiority.
Despatches reaching Rome from Tripoli indicate activity among the Italian forces at various points along the coast in preparation for the landing of troops. The Turkish soldiers in Tripoli are said to be in a demoralized state, and although some of them are within five miles from the city of Tripoli, and are protected by small forts on the hills, they have not even attempted to molest the invaders.
The Italians have hoisted their flag at the ports of Benghazi and Tobruk in Cyrenaica.
London, British India, Oct. 7.—The council of Moslems of all India has appealed for the intervention of the British government in behalf of Turkey. It has advised also a boycott of Italian goods.

Leading authorities on apple culture from Ontario and Nova Scotia have been on hand to judge the exhibits and deliver addresses. 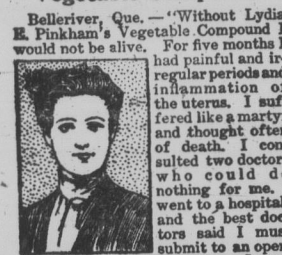

RELIEF COMMITTEE
ISSUES STATEMENT
OF AFFAIRS.

Copy of Auditor's Report.

The books of the Relief Committee have been returned from the Auditor-General who in his report says:—

In accordance with the appointment by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, I have made an audit of the accounts of your Finance Committee and beg to hand you herewith a certified statement of same.

RECEIPTS—The total amount of cash subscriptions was \$184,233.24. The sale of cottages brought \$7590.00. Miscellaneous receipts amounted to \$435.25. The interest credited by the banks was \$1182.13. So that the total cash received was \$196,440.62, and the same was deposited in the banks doing business in Campbellton.

DISBURSEMENTS—The sum of \$70,000.00, contributed by the Dominion Government was handed over to the corporation of the town of Campbellton, to be used solely for the purpose of paying the interest on the bonded debt of the town at the time of the fire.

For general relief purposes, the sum of \$114,166.77 was expended, so that the total disbursement amounted to \$184,166.77, leaving a balance of \$9243.85 unexpended.
