KILLED ON I. C. R.

Mangled Remains of John Scoby found near Derby Junction.

So fearfully mutilated as to be almost unrecognizable, the body of an Indian, thought to be John Scoby, of El Ground, was found lying by the I. C. R. track, about three quarters of a mile east of Derby Junction, on the northern division, this morning. An empty flask, and a gin-bottle, partially emptied of its contents, were found close by the remains, and the general belief is that the Indian was asleep on the track and was run over.

There is little doubt but that the unfortunate man was ground to death by a north-bound freight special in charge of Conductor Duff, of this city, with Driver Stephen Craig at the throttle. While the brakemen, of this train were passing along the cars at one of the stations north of the point where the accident occurred a splash of blood was noticed on the trucks of a box-car. Further examination revealed that the lower parts of two or three cars were splashed with blood, while in the trucks were found some pieces of flesh and hair, and a small portion of a man's underwear. So far as known, there was no blood, or flesh on the locomotive.

The crew on Conductor Warman's east-bound freight special from Campbellton made the gruesome discovery of the mutilated body this morning. The train was running along at its usual rate of speed after having crossed the Miramichi river bridge on the eastern side of Derby Jct. when the body was observed lying in the ditch. The train was stopped, and examination proved that the remains were those of an Indian, but none of the brakemen were aware of his identity.

Conductor Warman, who arrived in the city at noon today, said the body presented the most fearful sight he had ever seen. Both legs and both arms had been cut off, while the face was battered beyond recognition. The skull had been badly smashed, the teeth being torn away from the jaws from the force of the blow to the nape of the neck.

The body was taken to Chatham and placed in a coffin for burial.

LECTURE.

By Dr. McKenzie of Loggville on Tuberculosis.

(World 5th.)

A large audience assembled at Black River on Friday evening to hear Dr. McKenzie's lecture. The subject, as previously announced, was The Prevention of Tuberculosis. He said in part:

The bacilli of disease were first discovered in 1882. The bacillus of consumption, recently. Some idea of the size of the germ may be gained by saying that a space a little larger than a cent would hold 500,000,000. They multiply very rapidly, millions being produced in a few minutes. Man has subdued the great animals that destroy, but the little microscope germ defies him.

The ravages of the disease are appalling. Montreal alone loses about 1500 yearly. In the United States it is computed that over one million and a quarter are afflicted with it in some form. It has been asserted that in the past 100 years 14,000,000 lives have been lost in war; but that consumption has destroyed over 30,000,000. Sad it is, viewed in any light, but the saddest part is that it strikes men and women in the pride of their youth and early manhood, and womanhood just when they need strength for the burdens and cares of life. Yet little is done to guard against the disease. One case of smallpox recently almost caused a panic in New York, while in that city 10,000 die yearly of consumption and there is no alarm.

Two conditions are necessary to produce a case—first the germ and then second the conditions of health that render the system liable to disease.

There are thus two methods of preventing consumption—first prevent the spread of the germ and second build up the strength of the body.

To prevent the spread of the germ, spitting should be prohibited especially in buildings and in meetings. A sufferer coughs up and spits daily several billions of the germs and any one of them may produce a new case. It should be prohibited in the homes, where infants especially are in danger from the floor and from handling and putting in their mouths.

things picked up from the floor. These are a source of danger, carrying perhaps microscopic particles of the sputum and so contaminating milk and food. Consumptives are usually careful but many suffer a long time before they are aware, and even strong and healthy persons expectorate disease germs of various kinds. It is a habit, dirty, dangerous and unpleasant.

Each person breathes in at all times many disease germs. But in the blood, are cells, called phagocytes that destroy the disease germs if they are sufficiently strong. When germs invade the system, they, whether weak or strong, march to the front and the battle is on. If they are overcome disease settles down, its nature depending wholly on the nature of the germ. The only way to build up the system is by good living—the physiological life especially for those who have a tendency to any disease. Rise early, bathe well, eat good, plain, wholesome food, sleep at least eight hours, attend to dress, especially always have plenty of fresh air and sunshine by day and fresh air by night and take a vacation one day in seven. Here again we are reminded that the highest natural law is spiritual. Tobacco weakens the system. Alcohol must be avoided. It has been shown that heavy drinkers are far more liable to have some form of consumption than total abstainers. The rate is three to one. Alcoholism is fearful in itself but far more dreadful because of what it connotes—ignorance, poverty, disease, and the suffering of the innocent, especially the children. Man should be careful in the selection of his ancestors, quaintly said O. W. Holmes. It is true. Inter-marriage weakens the constitution, makes more liable to disease. Marriage among consumptives should be prohibited, especially among women. Usually death soon follows marriage. For the sake of the children they should hesitate. It is impossible to legislate such must be a law of nature.

As to the treatment of patients at home there is little more to be said. There is no drug specific yet discovered. Pure air, sunshine, food and hygienic life is the best medicine. Fresh air and sunlight exist everywhere in God's universe except in the houses which man has built. It is too often true. Parks with windows closed, blinds closed draw in the miasma of disease. Fresh air and sunlight kill disease germs. "Gold" air is not always fresh air; it too may be vitiated. Ventilation, not draughts, is what is required, so as to supply fresh air every moment. Patients should sleep alone and have their own dishes. The sputum must be prevented from drying and so floating on the air. The germ of consumption becomes enveloped in a case so it can live for months even in the air and light.

The question of the relation between consumption in man and in beast is an interesting one. In 1901 the scientist who discovered the germ declared they were quite distinct and would not inter-act. English scientists took up the investigation. Self-sacrificing persons allowed themselves to be treated with serum from diseased cattle and consumption developed while cattle in turn were infected by germs from human lungs. The disease, in both is the same; you cannot distinguish between them. This makes the danger for joint-petted affection of cattle, especially beef and dairy cattle, imperative, and infected animals should be slaughtered.

Treatment of consumptive patients is expensive. There is only one in Canada run on purely philanthropic lines. But a proposal was made in Montreal recently to organize camps for a few months in the summer where patients could be instructed in proper care and where medical men would give instruction on the nature and treatment of the disease. Each one who attended would form a nucleus when he returned for the spread of this knowledge.

(Shall not our medical men, editors, ministers and all interested in the fight against this fell disease, take up this matter, which would be a great step in advance?)

A very hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker by the chairman, Mr. Myers. The popular doctor will be gladly welcomed again when he comes to lecture.
