



PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, March 3. The Honble. Mr. Johnston, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor laid before the House—Custom House accounts from the ports of St. Andrews, St. Stephen, Magaguadavic and Welchpool, for the year ending 5th Jan. last.

On motion of Mr. Partelow, the House went into committee of the whole, in further consideration of supplies to be granted for the public service.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £1,500 for the improvement of the Great Road from Saint John to St. Andrews.

To His Excellency the Lieut. Governor or Commander in Chief £2,500 for the road from Fredericton to Saint Andrews.

To His Excellency the Lieut. Governor or Commander in Chief £60 for the road from Waweg to Saint Andrews.

To the Overseers of the poor for the Parish of Saint Andrews, the sum of \$761.7s 6d to reimburse them for expenses incurred by them in support of transient and emigrant poor during the past year.

To William and J. J. Andrews, of Saint Stephen, \$71.1s 8d being for a return of double head money paid on passengers per brig Gratitudine in June last.

To the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, \$600 to enable them to pay off the debt due on the gaol recently erected for that County.

To Doctor S. Frye, 190l. being for services rendered in Vaccinating at Saint Andrews, and attendance on emigrants and poor persons during the late prevalence of small pox.

To Thomas Wyer, Harris Hatch Samuel Frye and John M'Lachlan Esqrs. formerly Directors of the Savings Bank at Saint Andrews, \$791.8s 10d to relieve them from the responsibility occasioned by the defalcation of the Cashier of that Institution.

To Samuel McFarlane, John McCaskill, and Richard Turner, Overseers of the poor for the parish of Saint Patrick, in the County of Charlotte, 171.4s 6d for expenses incurred by them in supporting Thomas Folley, an emigrant pauper.

Wednesday, March 4. To the Reverend Jerome Alley \$31/10s to finish the Madras school in the town of Saint Andrews, and that no further grant be made to this Institution.

To James Albee, Esq. 25l. for the purpose of paying off the debt due on the steam boat slip at St. Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, being a re-approbation of that sum granted in 1838, towards building a wharf or steam boat landing at Salt Water in the said Parish.

SUMMARY OF NEWS.

Bible Printing.—We understand that Mr Alex Gardiner, printer, of this town, has been this week duly authorized by the Lord Advocate, to print the Scriptures, of Faith, and the Larger and Shorter Catechisms. So far as we have heard this is the first appointment, under the new regulation, for printing the Bible.—Paisley Advertiser.

On the 2d of Jan., which is the latest date we have from Spain, a rumour was prevalent that Cabrera, one of the most influential generals of the Carlist faction, had died of the typhus fever.

Cession of the Californias.—The New Orleans prints publish a letter from Mexico, in which it is said that the British minister is negotiating for a cession of the 2 Californias to the power he represents. It is added that the negotiation is likely to succeed, and that these vast territories, a most beautiful, salubrious and fruitful region, blessed with one of the most benign climates in the world, are about to pass under the dominion of England.

New England Newspaper.—It appears from a pretty carefully-collected table in the Boston Almanac, (though, by the way, we see some errors in the list of our city papers) that the number of newspapers in Maine, including semi-weeklies, &c. is 43; in New Hampshire, 15; in Connecticut 30, Rhode Island, 15; Massachusetts, 109, total 248 in New England.—Those who are curious in such matters may amuse themselves by comparing these returns with the respective populations of the States. Massachusetts would be found greatly a-head in such a calculation, having over double the number of papers than New Hampshire and Vermont have together. The two last are just equal to each other, if to the New Hampshire list be added, as it should be, Hill's "Monthly Visitor." In Boston much the largest proportion of papers to the population is found as might be expected—being 46 (at least) to 80,000, inhabitants, or one to every 1739.—Quebec Gazette.

Bermuda Feb. 1. It will be seen that her Majesty's Government is ready to furnish the funds for creating a Light House, with the most powerful burners, on Gibb's Hill, at the south western entrance of the Island, if the means requisite to keep up the Light are supplied by the Colony. Our Legislature at their next meeting, will, we have no doubt, enter on the consideration of this subject with every disposition to make the necessary provision, for the fulfilment of so beneficial and long desired an object.

The accounts from China are rapidly assuming a character more and more belligerent. The latest news from thence dated 5th Nov., and brought by the ship Talbot, describes a skirmish between the British ships of war Vanguard and Hyacinth and a great number of Chinese War Junks in which the latter had all the disaster, with the loss of more than 400 Chinese, killed in the engagement. It seems to us evident that direct hostilities must be commenced or the British trade in China must come to an end, but however unpleasant the alternative, and however Captain Elliott, may have managed matters in these awkward differences, it is plain that he could not have done otherwise than he did on this particular occasion. The Chinese demanded that a man should be given up to them, as an alleged murderer, and upon the chief superintendent's refusal, they pretended to enforce the demand, but with a sorry result.

A steamer, full of passengers, and having on board sixteen hundred kegs of gunpowder, took fire, recently, about 80 miles below Saint Louis, Mississippi. She was immediately ran ashore, and the passengers and crew had barely time to escape when the fire communicated with the powder, and the explosion which followed was most tremendous and terrific. The passengers consisted chiefly of 200 German emigrants, who had with them a large amount of money and baggage, all of which were lost.

The 15th annual meeting of this society took place on Tuesday the 10th inst. After the usual routine of business the committee on accounts, reported the funds of the society to be £309 after discharging every demand; nearly the whole of which is loaned on good personal security—the interest being paid regularly once a year.—When it is considered, that this society was at first only composed of a few persons, who paid in to the Treasurer the small sum of 1s. 6d per month, and that during 15 years every member rendered incapable of following his usual avocations, (having previously been two years a contributing member) received 8s per week, and every widow, (or the friends as the case may be) of a deceased member, £7.10s and that the number of members at this time does not amount to 40, the advantages resulting from small savings on the principle of affording relief only in cases of "sickness, accident, or old age," must be apparent to every person who will take pains to investigate the effects, and the influence such institutions are calculated to exert, when numerously supported. If a limited number of

persons are capable of affording relief in the above cases, and accumulating upwards of £300 in the comparatively short space of 15 years, and an income of nearly £50 per annum, by paying 1s 6d each per month, what immense good might be accomplished, if the working classes generally would make it a point to contribute to such institutions, for their future benefit. The advantages that Benefit Societies possess over every other, are simply these—that the members can neither hazard or misapply such savings, because where any doubt exists, the allowance may be expended under the direction of the managing committee. Even the small sum of 8s per week might often prevent the humiliating necessity of applying for parish relief; and how pleasing might be the reflection to any man, who may become reduced by accident or misfortune, that he is relieved by the fruits of his own industry.

Much might be said in favor of such institutions, but our space will not permit us to extend our remarks at this time. Every man of sober and industrious habits, can join this society, by paying 10s entrance fee and 1s 3d per month. The officers elected are, Mr. Thomas Berry, President, D. D.
