CAMPBELLTON BOY DIED IN F.L.D.

James Peters a Veteran of the Great War Succumbs After Short Illness.

On Thursday of last week Mr. Hald Peters Shalla received a telegram that his son James Peters was seriously ill at St. John's, Nfld., and he immediately left for that city.

Tuesday another telegram was received by relatives here stating that the young man had expired, and a further despatch said his body would be forwarded to Campbellton for burial.

Deceased, who was about 21 years of age was one of the brightest young lads in the Asseyrian colony here and all will regret to learn of his early death. While in Montreal he joined the 148th McGill unit and went overseas, where he was decorated for gallant services on the field. He was invalided home, and about a year ago went to St. John's, Nfld., where he had a sister living.

GUN PLAY AT NASH'S CREEK

Frederickton, N. B., April 6.—Revolver shots were fired and a sub-inspector under the liquor act was badly beaten in a fracas Monday night at Nash's Creek, Westmorland County. The parish priest was giving an entertainment and, having learned that some hoodlums were planning trouble, he had applied to the chief inspector, Rev. W. D. Wilson, for assistance. James Dickson, of Chatham, and John Gammon, of Bathurst, were detailed for duty there and were on hand when the rioters arrived and, it is reported, made an attack on members of the priest's party.

When the inspectors attempted to arrest some of the men who appeared to be under the influence of liquor a free fight followed during which the marauders used revolvers—happily without effect. Dickson downed one man but was tripped and received severe treatment at the hands and feet of the visitors before Gammon could rescue him.

Finally they drove off the attack and took one prisoner, who was charged with having liquor in his possession and also with interfering with the inspectors in the discharge of their duty. Other members of the gang may also have to face charges.

COUNCIL MEETING LAST EVENING

Fire Alarm Improvement Held Over Until Next Meeting—Other Matters.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the clerk's office last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors McKay, Ingram, Matthews and Bissett.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A letter from Wm. Flann re work at dumping ground asking for \$1.75 per day until May 31st, and \$15.00 per month for balance of season, was read and laid on the table.

A resolution was read from the Campbellton Board of Trade, asking the town to appoint a delegate or delegates to accompany the bridge delegation to Ottawa and press for the transfer of the L. N. E. lot east of Sugarloaf to the town.

Coun. McKay moved that the Council's representative on the Bridge delegation to go to Ottawa be also authorized to attend to this matter—Carried.

The reports of the several departments were read and accounts ordered paid.

Coun. Matthews said that the Fire Protection Committee were not prepared to report on the improvement for fire alarm system. He thought as these called for four thousand dollars, the whole Council should deal with the matter.

Coun. Bissett said that if the fire alarm system was to be worked efficiently a switchboard was an absolute necessity. He would advise the buying of a four circuit board as the difference was only \$215.00.

Coun. McKay moved that the matter of Fire Alarm equipment be held over until the next meeting when the manager of the Electric Light department will be requested to attend to explain the matter—Carried.

Coun. Ingram reported that Mr. Chas. Alexander had agreed to hold the \$10,000 Water and Light bond if the interest was increased to 6 1/2 per cent. per annum.

Coun. Ingram moved a resolution covering this matter which was carried. The bond to run until maturity in 1934 at this rate.

Coun. McKay brought up the matter of the increase to the men at the Electric Light Station. He said that the managers' recommendations did not go far enough. He recommended that two men of the four be given increases. He (Coun. McKay) thought the manager should give an explanation why the other two men were discriminated against. He moved that Dolman and Nelson be given an increase of \$10.00 per month.

Coun. Ingram thought that his matter was settled and should be allowed to stand.

His Worship asked Coun. Bissett if he had anything to say.

Coun. Bissett said that the matter was threshed out and settled and he had nothing more to say.

Coun. Matthews agreed that the matter had been settled and should not again be brought up.

Coun. McKay's motion was not seconded.

Mrs. Du Guay through Mr. Wallace stated that she was establishing a Commercial College and would like to have the encouragement and assistance of the Town Council.

Coun. McKay said that he was sure he could assure Mrs. du Guay of the Council's sympathy in the matter, and moved that Mrs. du Guay put before the Council her request and when she did so it would receive the consideration of the Council—Carried.

Mr. W. H. Wallace was present and asked a number of questions which the Clerk was authorized to answer.

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SLEET STORM DOES DAMAGE

Electric Light, Telephone and Telegraph Wires Down—Trees Damaged.

A severe easterly sleet and rain storm accompanied by a heavy wind set in Monday evening and did considerable damage.

Ice formed on all electric wires and many lines were down. The telegraph and telephone systems were severely hampered. While the town fire alarm system was out of business for a short time and the electric power station had to close down for an hour until things were straightened away.

Many of the trees about town had limbs broken from the weight of ice. Tuesday afternoon the weather moderated and the wires were relieved of their weight of ice.

RAILWAY COM. AT NEW CARLISLE

An important meeting of the Railway Commission was held at New Carlisle yesterday.

A delegation consisting of Messrs. D. Champoux, Jos. Duncan and D. A. Stewart went from the Campbellton Board of Trade, and representatives of business from all points up and down the coast were present to set forth the disadvantages under the Gaspe coast laborers because of the inadequate railway service given by the Quebec, Ontario and the Atlantic Quebec & Western Railways.

This is probably the first step towards having the government take over these railroads.

The deceased was a son of the late Henry Gould one of the pioneers of the place. He was of a very quiet disposition and was highly respected.

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



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

THE GRAPHIC'S STAND.
The Graphic again wishes to state that it is not supporting Mr. W. H. Wallace's candidature for the Mayoralty, much as the Tribune would wish to have it appear that we are the "man behind."

Mr. Wallace as a citizen of this town has a perfect right to be a candidate if his friends wish him. If he wishes to use space in the Graphic to set his views before the ratepayers it is at his disposal, just as it is at the disposal of any other candidate or candidates, who may wish to use it. As we stated before we are entirely independent in this election and are only interested in seeing that the best men are selected in the best interests and for the advancement of Campbellton.

FOR TOWN MANAGER.
The Tribune wishes to intimate that Mr. W. H. Wallace is the only one in the coming contest who favors the employment of a town manager. We have this to say that we have had frequent conversation with His Worship Mayor Murray and he has publicly stated that he is in favor of the employment of a town manager, and went so far as to bring the matter of special legislation up, he was informed by the town solicitor that the town had all the necessary power to employ such a manager if it was considered the proper course to pursue. Many of the present councillors also are in favor of the employment of a competent man to manage the affairs of the town under the direction of the Town Council.

STICK TO THE TRUTH.
The Tribune in its issue of yesterday states:—

"When the bonds amounting to \$20,000 which were authorized by the ratepayers have been issued to assist in the payment of this building (Fire Station) are sold then the town's overdraft will have been entirely wiped out."

If the editor of that paper had called up the Town Treasurer or even any one conversant with town finances he could have received information which would have enabled him to truthfully set this matter before the electors, but he had no inclination to do this.

What are the facts.
On Jan. 1st, the town started in with an overdraft of \$19,548.32. From the first of the year to March 31st, the revenue amounted to \$14,000 while the expenditure was approximately

\$35,000 or a further deficit of \$21,000 which makes the overdraft at the present time over \$40,000.

Of this amount the new Fire Station represents an expenditure of between twenty and twenty-five thousand dollars, and when the bonds authorized (\$20,000) are sold the amount of overdraft will be reduced by the amount they sell for, so the overdraft will not be entirely wiped out as the Tribune states, but will amount to at least \$20,000 or nearly double that of a year ago.

There are doubtless reasons for the heavy increases in the expenditures in various departments, and such increases should not be hidden but placed squarely before the ratepayers so that they will have no false conceptions of the town's financial standing at the present date.

The present year will be an exceedingly hard one for our ratepayers. Besides this heavy overdraft the town faces an additional appropriation for schools \$15,000 in excess of last year, and there are needed large additions to our electric light, fire alarm, water and other plants which will represent thousands of dollars.

It is better that our ratepayers should honestly face these matters and prepare for a heavy increase in our tax rates.



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Canada's Population.

Canada's population, estimated by the Census Branch of the Trade and Commerce Department at 7,825,102. The census branch has based its estimate for the year 1919 on the known increase of population, as shown by the census of 1901 and 1911. Such calculations have in the past proved to be conservatively correct. The estimates for the various provinces are:

Ontario	2,820,809
Quebec	2,235,528
British Columbia	718,650
Saskatchewan	754,080
Manitoba	618,903
Alberta	587,770
Nova Scotia	518,761
New Brunswick	368,760
Prince Edward Island	83,728
Northwest Territories	18,481
Yukon	8,513

It is thought that the figure for British Columbia may be a little high, inasmuch as immigration into the province between 1901 and 1911 was heavy, but showed a falling off in war years. Saskatchewan, it is also noted, claims a population of 833,000, or an increase of nearly 100,000 in slightly more than two years.

Estimates of city populations based on figures prepared for local assessment purposes include the following:

Author of "Beautiful Snow."

The best known of the several poems entitled "Beautiful Snow" was published anonymously, and its authorship, so far as we know, is still in doubt. That there were many claimants to the authorship is borne out—in an exaggerated form—by the story from Chambers' Journal, that some one gave a public invitation in the early 80's to the author of "Beautiful Snow" to attend a meeting in Chicago, and 750 authors turned up, many more sending regrets. A story rather the reverse of the foregoing, used to be told about four gentlemen of London, England, who decided to give a dinner party, each of the four to invite the most disagreeable man he knew. On the appointed date, Sir William Harcourt was ushered in and all four gentlemen rushed forward to greet him as their guest. The story was an invention of political opponents probably, for Sir William was not a disagreeable man, but quite the reverse.

Preparing for Canada Census.

Though the Canadian census will not be taken until June, 1921, preparations will soon begin, as it is a huge, slow task to organize and appoint communicators and enumerators in every electoral district. In 1911 there were 9,703 enumerators. The appointments this time will be made by the Civil Service Commission and the patronage of C. E. member of Parliament will be eliminated.

Trophy for Chatham.

The captured machine gun No. 5658 has been allotted to the city of Chatham, and it is now in Toronto waiting shipment to the Western Ontario city. This is the machine gun which was captured by the late Col. Pl. Miner, V.C., the Chatham hero, who has placed the name of that city among those deserving the highest honor for war achievements.




