ALBERT EDWARD

The Prince of Wales Is 60 Years Old

Today. London, Nov. 9. — Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, was born Nov. 9, 1841. In the coming year, 1901, six centuries

will have passed since an English king, for the first time, conferred the rank and title of Prince of Wales upon his eidest son. During this long period no Prince of Wales reached an age as ad-vanced as that of Queen Victoria's heir is at present. No one held that position as long as Prince Albert Edward, In this respect he has surpassed his grand-uncle, who was Prince of Wales more than 57 years, and succeeded to the crown as King George IV. in his 58th year. In point of time the tenure of the present prince's position is as unprecedented as the length of Queen Victoria's reign is in British history. With the exception of William IV., there has been no English king who was not younger at the time of his ac-


cession to the crown than the Prince of Wales is now. The title of Prince of Wales is not a continuous title. It is never conferred upon one who is simply heir-presumptive, and it was, therefore, in abeyance during the reigns of George IV., William IV., and the four years of Queen Victoria's reign preceding the birth of the present heir-apparent. It is less generally known that even when a Prince of Wales has a son, like the present prince, the title is not hereditary, in point of law, but upon the accession of a Prince of Wales to the throne or upon the death of a Prince of Wales during the sovereign's lifetime merges in the crown, and a new creation becomes necessary. If the present Prince of Wales should succeed to the crown, his son would not immediately be Prince of Wales, though he might be called so by courtesy. But the new king would certainly create his son and heir Prince of Wales. If the Queen should survive her eldest son the title of Prince of Wales would also be extinguished, and the present Duke of York, though he would become heir-apparent at once, would obtain his father's title only

under a new creation. AN ALIEN MUST GO

Ordered To Be Deported on or Before Saturday.

Hamilton, Nov. 9.—Edward Williams, officer for the enforcement of the alien labor law, has made a thorough investigation of the alleged importation of aliens to work at the Hamilton Steel and Iron Company's blast furnace (the smelting works). 


street.

After the Battle.

Except in Ontario-of which we may speak again-the Government has been, in the Dominion at large, sustained overwhelmingly. The latest figures are follows: Government, 131; Opposition, 73: Independents, 4: with deferred constituencies, four of which were Liberal previously and will likely go Liberal again.

The Government did not, in 1896, have any such majority as it had four years later when Parliament was dissolved. It began in 1896 with about 34. But through the growth of its popularity, as manifested in the bye-elections, it rose to 48 of a straight majority.

The Government again went to the country on Wednesday last, and it comes back some twenty stronger at the start, than it did immediately after the election of 1896. Doubtless the same process of winning bye-elections will again go on; and as before the legislation offered will be of a character to command the support of fairminded "Independents." The trouble with the Government will not be that its majority is too small.

After the wheat and chaff of recounts, protests, and the like, have got through the fanning-mill, the clean-up will show the Government can rely from the start on a majority from every province except Ontario, and in Ontario, the final clean-up, and a few bye-elections, may put that province in a position less unenviable than the position it now

Among the reasons for the temporary recession of Ontario must first be placed the gerrymander. Like interest. the gerrymander works away steadily. day and night. "Thanks be," the gerrymander will soon disappear! The next most potent reason was a state of orcourse, was the raising by Conservatives of the race and creed cry in this province. It was raised as openly as they dared by many of the leading Conservative speakers and newspapers. When they denounced "Tarte," for example, it was one of those convenient cases where more is meant than meets the ear: and what was done in this way from their platform and presses, was bettered in private canvass. It was impossible that this could be without some effect. But unfair tactics often prove a boomerang, and every word of incendiary appeal against the electors of Quebec only reacted against the Opposition in our sister province. Naturally, we would have preferred, for our own credit, to see a larger part of the Government majority from Ontario; but if it is otherwise, the tactics of the Opposition must accept the blame. With the repeal of the gerrymander, and with real organization, Ontario will henceforth be the banner province of Liberalism.

While Quebec has sided with remarkable unanimity with the Government, it is a matter for great pride that a large majority of the English people throughout Canada have been equally appreciative of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues. And it is pleasant, as showing an absence of any improper racial feeling in Quebec, to observe, as the Toronto Star points out, that the ridings in Quebec where the English people are congregated, all supported the Government with only two exceptions. The exceptions are Sherbrooke, a strongly Conservative riding, in the Government candidate was defeated even in a byelast year, and Compton, where Rufus Pope, the party they would have to pay a heavy duty organizer, is personally strong. The Chinese Crisis. In the Atlantic Monthly Mr. J.

crisis in China. After all the contributions of this kind we have had during the last three months, there is not much that is new in it. Indeed, while we have plenty to learn about China in general, so much has been said about this particular situation, that it is difficult to find anything new about it. There is, however, one point brought out at the beginning of the article that is worth emphasizing. Let us not imagine that because we have read much about the Chinaman lately, we understand him. He is very hard to understand. Here is testimony cited by Mr. Angell: "I have studied him carefully for forty years. Often I have flattered myself that I had sounded the depths of his nature and had come to understand him thoroughly. But just as I was rejoicing in complacency on my success, suddenly some new mystery in him revealed itself, and I discovered that my work was not done. I cannot yet with confidence tell you what the Chinaman is. He eludes inspection. He does not like to tell his deepest beliefs. If he does, and you ask him the reasons for them, about the only thing you can be sure of is that the reasons he gives are not the real reasons." A good illustration of this last point is the fact that there is still a difference of opinion among

Thus it seems that there is a great gulf between the Chinaman and the European or American. They are such different specimens of humanity, they find it hard to understand each other. Mutual ignorance, mutual misunderstanding, mutual contempt, sums up too much of their dealing with each other. Mr. Angell shows how the government of China, under a despotio emperor or governing board, and of widely separated provinces with equally despotic governors, tends to weaken what we call patriotism. Though they have a large country and an immense population, it is difficult for them to unite in a general movement, or to co-operate in defense of their country. In his opinion the Boxer movement might have been put down at first with vigorous action-not quite so vigorous as that of Tso Tsung Tang. an able Chinese general, who was sent to put down some secret societies, and did it quickly. When asked how it was done, he said, calmly: "Oh, in six weeks I cut off the heads of about fourteen hundred of them." But in this case the dowager empress supported the Boxers.

One Effect of High Protection.

An English newspaper, commenting on the fact that "our American cousins" are handicapped in their export trade by the lack of a mercantile marine worthy of the name, says: "But cannot bring themselves to face the fact that they will get one only by relaxing their harsh protectional system." This journal goes on to say that American consuls have been ordered to report to Washington as to the means of finding markets for American coal in Europe, and the consul-general at Berlin has given the following practical advice: "It is for the marine customs of the United States to devise a collier for the Atlantic coal traffic, a vessel of large carrying capacity, low cost of construction, with sufficient engine power to steam seven or eight knots an hour, and give steerage way in all weathers, equipped with the best machinery for handling cargo, and with minimum requirements as to size of crew, and consequent operating expenses-a vessel, in short, built specially for the export trade."

This is quite a problem, but if low cost of construction is possible any where, it is not in the United States, and if their ships were built abroad on them. So, as long as the republic keeps up its present high tariff, the problem set by this consul-general cannot be worked out; and, indeed, as long as the present system is kept up. The Daily Mail points out that England has thus far failed to make any return for Canadian loyalty and urges that some compensation be made for Canada's fiscal concessions.

MAKING THE BEST OF IT. Windsor, Nov. 9 .- Some of the Windsor Conservatives do not express much regret that many of the Conservative candidates met defeat, and say that there are others who would do the party a favor by retiring to private life. They blame these men for di-viding the party before the elections in 1896, and say that the Conservatives will not regain power until an entirely new set of leaders is placed at the head of affairs. The present financial condition of the country has been an important factor in the campaign just ended: The people are prosperous, and by the vote Wednesday they have shown that they have confidence in the administration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Has the City Drift Been Checked?

The census office announcement that the 155 largest cities in this country have gained almost exactly the same number of inhabitants in the past decade as between 1880 and 1890 is reassuring. For it indicates that the expected trend toward city growth has not developed in the dangerous degree which was feared by some sociologists. The exact statistics of the entire population will, of course, be necessary to show whether there has been any marked disturbance in the proportion of those living in the cities and those living on farms. This revelation about the 155 largest communities, however, is a strong indication of the ultimate showing, for it is highly probable now that the percentage of city gain will not offset that of country gain, both being a natural growth.

There are many factors now to encourage country life which did not exist ten years ago, and to these the expected check in the cityward tendency is due probably in part. The electric railway has encouraged suburban living, while steam railroads have increased in mileage to the advantage of the rural districts. The trolleys are even rivaling the steam lines now in commanding the patronage of the farmers. The telephone, greatly cheapened by improvements and competition, has softened the isolation of country life, and the bicycle, bringing with it in a measure the betterment of the country roads, has facilitated communication and contract. The free delivery of the mails in the rural regions, too, has had its effect in encouraging the farmer to remain on his farm, for he has by this means and others been placed in almost as close reach of the world beyond as the city dweller, whose annoyances have not been ameliorated in the same degree as those of the agriculturist.

But there is probably a deeper industrial reason lying beneath this condition. The city movement of the years prior to 1890 was caused in a large measure by the opening of new opportunities for young men to engage in profitable business in the commercial centers. The wonderful development of trade and manufacturing which followed the war, and more particularly marked the reaction after the panic of the early seventies, drew heavily from the farms. At the same time colleges began to throw open their doors more generously to the farmer's son and daughter. Every factor of life beckoned to these young people to migrate. But doubtless the statistics will show now that the tide has turned again and is flowing toward the farm once more. The industries have reached an even rate of development. The demand for college-bred men has fallen off somewhat. The opening of new markets for agricultural products has stimulated farming. The introduction of labor-saving machinery has encouraged the farmer's son to remain at his task, once so laborious, now profitable and comparatively easy. His estate has been bet-tered, in short, to a greater degree than that of any other single class, and it is a hopeful sign that the tendency toward congestion, with all its social and moral and physical evils, has been even in part checked, while the more wholesome life of the country has been stimulated.




