Salisbury at the Lord Mayor's Banquet.
London, Nov. 11.—At the banquet in
connection with the installation of Joseph
Savory, Lord Salisbury replied to the
toast "The Government." He said he regarded as a good omen of peace throughout
the world the fact that the Czarewitch was
thant to visit India as the guest of the garded as a good omen of peace throughout the world the fact that the Czarewitch was about to visit India as the guest of the Queen. He felt that this visit represented the growth of friendly ideas in Russia with reterence to India. Touching the African agreements made with France and Germany, he said they tended to cement the relation of England with those countries, while the negotiations with Italy were making progress towards a successful issue. Although the dispute with Portugal has not been so happily arranged, still the position did not justify any sinister apprehensions. Referring to the trade with the United States, Lord Salisbury said that the McKinley tariff law would certainly affect some portion of British commerce. Free traders could rejoice over the recent electoral victories as a protest against extravagant and utter selfish protection, but they must still face the prospect of prohibitive tariffs. England had no retaliatory schemes, as she had reduced her own tariff to the lowest point. Referring to the relations between labor and capital, the Premier said that if they had an eight-hour bill, forbid-ding men to exercise their strength and skill an hour or two more, thus imposing hindrances on production, they must be prepa. It omeet, as a natural result, the victorious competition of other countries where labor is not so embarrased. The Government, he declared, "Jourd not interfere at all in disputes between capital and labor. State interference would do more harm than good, and the differences would in course of time adjust themselves. He defended England's desire to augment and consolidate her territory, on the ground that all other countries were protective, and compelled her to depend on trade within the Queen's empire for the vital force of British commerce. He regarded this tariff question as the world's conflict of the future.

He wants everyone to believe that he has no fear of death, that he would rather be killed by the hangman than in a railway accident, but he displays great anxiety lest his body should fall into the hands of the doctors or be stolen from the grave. He requested his spiritual adviser to do what he could to prevent such an exigency. FRAYERS FOR THE CONDENNED MAN. Prayers were offered for Birchall in most of the churches here Sunday. Rev. Dr. McMullen prayed for him both morning and evening in Knox Church, and at the Congregational Church a portion of the evening service was devoted to silent prayer for Divine mercy for the condemned man, Birchall having been previously notitied of the time when the prayer would be offered that he might join in with his own supplication if he thought fit.

The London Conference Mission Committee of the Methodist Church met yestereay afternoon at 2 o'clock with the following members present: Rev. Messes. J. R. Gundy, of Essex Center, president of the Conference; W. T. McDonagh, London West; J. G. Scott, St. Thomas; Dr. Pascoe, Aylmer; J. Graham, Ridgetown; J. W. Annis, Chatham; John Learoyd, Windsor; Dr. Aylesworth, Strathroy, and Thomas Cullen, Sarnia. The only business of any limportance transacted was the distribution of amounts granted to the various missions in the Conference, as portioned by the General Board of Missions.

Immediately after their adjournment at
to'clock, the Special Committee met for
business. In addition to the above-named business. In addition to the above-named gentlemen the following were present: Rev. Messrs. A. L. Russell, Exeter; Win. Hayhurst, London; B. Clement, Petrolea; Dr. Sanderson, London; W. W. Shepherd, Muncey, and W. Rigsby (secretary), Wyoming. The only action taken by this executive body, in addition to the minor items, was the mosting of permission to chairmen to emp young men, with the intention of subsequently taking them out into the work of the ministry as probationers.

In the evening the annual missionary meeting was held in the same church. The addresses were for the most part illustrative of missionary work, and delivered in an entertaining manner, which deprived them of the monotony generally supposed to be attacined to such subjects. The president, Rev. J. R. Gundy, occupied the chair. In opening with an address he alluded to the gratifying result of missionary efforts in both foreign and domestic fields, and the encouragement of being enabled to appropriate a larger amount to the work this year than in any previous. An ample share of thefunds would go to the domestic mission work. There were some disposed to regard domestic missions, as not having the same importance as foreign labor, but in the speaker's opinion, it was of greater moment than the work in Japan and other distant fields. It was from the domestic missions, when they had graduated to self-sustenance, that additional help and funds were to be provided to assist in the foreign work. He would request Rev. Mr. Lanceley to read a statement of the mission results.

Rev. E. B. Lanceley, pastor of the church, referred to the prudent extension of the work and the healthy growth of the society's income, with the bright outlook of the future. They had 498 domestic mission, 371 domestic workers, 371 paid agents in connection with the domestic bagards, and 39,724 members. In the city of London a mission which received \$200 last year was now independent and was contributing instead. In the Indian work there were 47 native missions, 3 missionaries, and 4 284 native missions.

THE "TIDAL WAVE" OVER THE

For the first time in its history the United States tried what is known as the Australian system of voting in the recent Congressional elections. The system is almost identical with the Canadian method of registering votes at elections, and our neighbors have been rather slow in completing their count. 


