London, May 3 .- The British Women' Temperance Association sat in convention from 10 o'clock this morning until 11 from 10 o'clock this morning until 11 o'clock to-night. The day's proceedings were enlivened by a number of speeches, in which bitter personal remarks were indulged in. In the ballot for president Lady Someraet was re-elected by a majority of 69. The minority thereupon left the convention in indignation, declaring that the introduction of politics into the association work would split the organization and ruin the temperance cause.

Anti-Home Rule Demonstration. LONDON, May 3 .- Eight hundred brokers eaded by leaders bearing the Union Jack and wearing Union Jacks of paper in their

and wearing Union Jacks of paper in their hats, marched in procession from the Stock Exchange to-day to a Unionist meeting at Guildhall. Upon reaching Guildhall the brokers sang "Rule Britannia" and cheered loudly for the union, for Lord Salisbury and other Unionist leaders. A crowd assembled, evidently not in sympathy with the brokers, and lent variety to the cheers by necessinal house.

The Guildhall was thronged with Unionists. As Lord Mayor Knill, the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain and other prominent men were entering part of the platform collapsed, and scores of people felt, but none were seriously injured. Mr. Chamberlain delivered an address, in which he reiterated his prophecies of financial ruin as the outcome of home rule. He predicted that Irish demands on the Imperial Parliament would be unending, especially when Great Britain should be involved in war. He declared also that notwithstanding war. He declared also that notwithstanding the protests of the Irish Nationalists a co-ordinate executive in Ireland must ulti-mately follow as the result of home rule.

The Trouble in Cuba.

LONDON, May 3 .- A Madrid cable from the Captain-General of Cuba is published, in which he confesses that his forces are in which he confesses that his forces are inadequate to quell the uprising. Instead of the 12,000 troops he was supposed to have he has less than 8,000, which even under normal conditions cannot be considered strong enough. He adds that several insurgents have yielded, and repeats that the rebellion is not spreading, but is confined to the country around Holguin, 300 miles from Havana. The towns of Holguin and Santiago de Cuba remain loyal. The Spanish Minister of War, besides arranging for the embarkation of seven regiments, has ordered other regiments now stationed in the interior to concentrate at various seaports in case further reinforcements should be necessary. It is reported that the whole Spanish equadron at New York will be dispatched to patrol the coast around Santiago, with order to cut off the insurgents completely from communication with the Cuban exiles.

Second Reading of the Eight-Hour Bill.

Cattle Plague in Russia.

Odesa, May, 3.—A cattle plague imported from the Don country, where 10,000 cattle have perished since January, is ravaging the Southern Governments. Handreds are dying, and this will further impoverish districts already threatened with famine.

Vienna, May 3.—A widow named Altschul, living in Leipa, Bohemia, tried last night to burn herself to death. She saturated her clothes with benzine, stood on a chair and set fire to the lower part of her skirt. Her screams attracted the attention of her neighbors, who extinguished the flame. She will die of her injuries.

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Caprivi's Plea for the Army Bill. Berlin. May 3.—In the Reichstag teday Chancellor Von Caprivi, in advocating
the passage of the Army Bill, said that the
Federal Government was resolved to employ all the constitutional means in their
power to attain their objects. The rejection of the bill would adversely affect the
political situation. Prince Bismarck, the
greatest diplomatic genius seeen in several
centuries, had regarded the strengthening
of the army as an absolute necessity. In
fact, it was an open question whether at
the present moment the army was strong
enough to take the offensive even against
France clone. "We cannot," said the
Chancellor," be indifferent to the fate of
our frontier provinces. The nation desires
to protect Alsace-Lorraine. On the day of
mobilization a well filled cartridge pouch
will be of greater value than a
purse full of money. The rejection of
the bill will create abroad an impression
that there is weakness here. "In the
name of the empire and in the name of
Prussia," concluded the Chancellor, "I
announce that Freieherr Von Henne's proposal is acceptable to us. We beg of you
to assist us to accomplish what we regard as necessary to maintain the peace
of Europe and the security and honer of
Germany." The Chancellor's speech was
received with loud applause.

The Phair Murder Trial at the Spring Assizes.

Burke and Wilson Brought Up from Their Cells.

Witnesses Relate the Circumstances of the Affair.

Both Prisoners, They Allege, Fi ed at the Detective.

John McGrory Says Burke Was Badly

Used by Phair.

Big Crowd of Spectators-Ladies Soon Evacuate the Court Room-How the Prisoners Looked-The Challenging of Jurors.

John Burke and Thomas Wilson were John Burke and Thomas Wilson were placed in the dock at the Spring Assizes promptly at 9 o'clock this morning to stand trial on the charge of murdering Detective Harry Phair, on Oct. 13 last.

The prisoners were dressed in black, and although a trifle pale, did not show any

Wilson appeared to be very nervous and fidgeted around, his eyes roaming everywhere, and it appeared impossible for him to keep still. There was a large attendance in the court room, many of whom were of the fair sex. This crowd increased as the day advanced, until every seat was occupied and many

It was with considerable trouble that a jury was at last selected. In the commencement of the challenging Mr. McPhillips challenged for Wilson. Mr. Lount, Q.C., held that as the prisoners were both on trial for the one oftense the challenges should be on behalf of both of them. The judge ruled in favor of Mr. McPhillips and the challenging continued.

THE CROWN'S STATEMENT.

Mr. Lount, Q.C., then addressed the jury on behalf of the crown. He dwelt on the enormity of the case that was about to be tried. He enumerated the different phases of murder and pointed out the distinction between premeditated killing and killing with malice aforethought. With deliberation that showed cruel malice, he said, Henry Phair had been slain by one of the prisoners, at the instance of the other. Mr. Lount then read the law with regard to cases of drunkenness or disorderly conduct on public highways. It was a be submitted to the jury that the prisoner Burke was a loose, idle and disorderly proson, under one or both of the definition eited by the speaker. If the man was clearly proven to have been disorderly of drunk, then his arrest without a warrant was perfectly justifiable, and Burke had no right to resist, neither had his companion Wilson any right to assist him in that direction. That very act of itself was a deliberate one, a malicious act; an act that took the provocation away and did not permit of the jury reducing the charge to manslaughter. There was deliberation all through. After Burke arose from his feet he slowly unwrapped his weapon and with the words, "G——your soul, throw down those handcuffs or I will shoot you!" He then shot. This was characterized by Mr. Lount as a deliberate, willful act, one un protected by provocation and actuated by malice and bad intent. It was to be shown during the trial that Burke hod said in jail, several days after the arrest, "I gave that Rider, the ———, one in the side anyway." This showed malice and intent, because they knew that Rider had arrested their boy companion a few months before, and was known to them. They had simply mistaken the man.



## Ontario Legislature.

Provisions of Minister Ross' Plebis. cite Bill.

The Voting to Take Place on Jan. 4, 1894.

How the Opinion of the Iwo Sexes Will be Secured-Bill to Livide the Duties of York's County Crown Attorney Carried.

(From Our Own Representative.)
PARLIAMENT HOUSE, TORONTO, May 3.— This afternoon the Minister of Education introduced his bill for the taking of a plebiseite on prohibition. He said the bill provided that the voting on the question should take place on Monday, Jan. 4, 1894, the day of the municipal elections all over Ontario. There was a desire on the part of the Government to have the fullest pos-sible expression of cpinion on the question, and the above-mentioned date had, there fore, been selected. It was not the intention to take a vote in the unorganized dis-tricts of the north, as the vote would in them have to be taken much later tion to take a vote in the unorganized districts of the north, as the vote would in them have to be taken much later than in other portions of the Province. The desire of the Government was to obtain a simultaneous vote. The voters entitled to cast ballots would be divided into two classes, the men entitled to vote at Legislative elections, and secondly, the widows and unmarried women entitled to vote at municipal elections. It was intended that yellow ballots be given to the men and blue ballots to the female voters. By this means the opinion of the sexes would be secured. The returning officers would be empowered to appoint two agents for the party or organizations in favor of the yeas, while the nays would likewise be given the privilege of appointing two agents for each subdivision. The expense of the voting would be defrayed by the various municipalities. Mr. Ross then at considerable length detailed his history as a temperance man, and said that he had always been a strong advocate of prohibition. During a great portion of the time he was in the House of Commons he had been chairman of the committee on prohibition, and had been instrumental in having a commission appointed to travel in the States, and secure information on the question.

This has been demonstrated by the land and mortgage bank experiments. The government warehouse, or sub-treasury plan, is also open to many objections. No provision is made for the immediate redemption of such currency as the government would issue under this plan. It is also very decidedly class legislation. The product of the farmers' labor would be accepted at these warehouses, while the products of other men's labor would be rejected.

Our money should represent value, and be such as will procure "on demand" any commodity for sale in the country. Money that is not redeemable on demand should be subject to discount. No decree of a government can prevent this any more than it can modify the results of the multiplication table.

It has been shown frequently that as a standard of value for deferred payments, a bushel of wheat is a surer measure of value than a given quantity of gold. The gold discoveries in Australia and California produced tremendous fluctuations in the value of gold, and there is no certainty that a whole mountain of gold may not be discovered any day in Central Africa or elsewhere.

If such a thing did happen and gold became as plentiful as sand or clay, would the world be any better off if it were all coined into dollars? If plentiful it could be used in the action of the same desarrow and reasons. into dollars? If plentiful it could be used in the arts in many ways not now dreamed of; but in the form of dollars gold serves no purpose that a comparatively contless piece of paper would not serve as well.

The supply of gold is in no proportion to the quantity of other commodities. It bears no ratio to the population or to the products of the world. If next year should be a

year of scarcity of other commodities there might be no change in the quantity of gold; if a year of plenty, there still might be no more or less of gold.

Thus if the world produces much or little the same total of gold must serve te purchase the total of the other commodities. So the producers, as a whole, get no more in the aggregate for a large product than for a small one. This is discouraging to the producers, but it will always be so so long as one or a few commodities are the basis of our money.

to the producers, but it will always be so so long as one or a few commodities are the basis of our money.

Our total of money should at all times represent the total available product of the country, but it need not, and should not, have intrinsic value.

Intrinsic value money is necessary amongst savages, where few can read and where few governments are strong enough to guarantee paper money.

Money is the mere implement of the arithmetic of industry, not the product. Dollars, whether of gold or paper, are but the counters for keeping tally of the game. Money simply serves as a medium of exchange, and should be only a representative of commodities more convenient to carry about than the articles themselves. The ultimate object of all money is to obtain for the possessor, food, clothing, etc. Then why not make food, clothing, and all useful and needed commodities, the basis of our money, and not gold, silver, wampum, beaverskins, or any one or two commodities.

Why should it be necessary that while one man is making a coat and another is making a pair of shoes, a third man must go to the mountains and dig out gold, in order that the tailor may exchange his coat with the shoemaker for a pair of shoes? It is evident that the labor of one man is wasted, when gold is used for such a purpose.

The following seems to be a simple, sound

The following seems to be a simple, sound and feasible plan for issuing money:

The issue would be limited exactly to man's power and inclination to do productive work. There could be no over-issue, nor need there be any under-issue.

It would be a money that would have elasticity, and would exactly and automatically adapt its volume to requirements.

It would represent value and be redeemable on demand in any commodity for sale in the country, and would itself be an actual representative of those commodities, which commodities might be gold, silver, lead, iron, wool, flour, beef, or any commodity at the will of the holder. Gold money cannot command more.

When our supply of gold gives out, as it did during the war, we have to fall back upon the national credit, and whether good or bad, that is all my nation has to fall back upon. The basis of all national credit is the power of the people to produce useful articles. Even gold itself—the god of our financiers—actually rests upon a similar foundation. It is of as little value as lead, if it cannot command useful articles. Then let us make all "useful articles," and not gold alone, the basis of our money.

In other words, they hold that as women must obey the laws of the land they should have some say in the making of them. They believe that the great reforms they have at heart can never be entirely successful unless they have a right to go to the polls and aid their enforcement with their votes. Thousands of energetic women are determined association a fighting body, just as similar associations on this con-tinent have become. The cry of "politics" wasraised against Lady Henry Somerset and her associates, but that noble woman held that such a cry should not deter those who thought with her from taking a stand for what they believed to be right, and by re-electing her the British Women's Temperance Association, in annual convention assembled, have indorsed her views. RESULTS OF THE LATE SPRING.

Business generally has been put back by the late spring, and the wholesalers of London have had no exceptional experience. With cold rains, chilling winds, and muddy roads, there has not been that free purchase of goods that usually accompanies early spring, and money has not been so plentiful as it otherwise would have been. Traders, while naturally far from satisfied, are inclined to be philosophers, and hope to make up some lost ground when summer weather sets in. The exports and imports of the country have been large, and the only question that remains is how much of the goods represent money borrowed, or to pay interest on debts, for about all our transactions with foreign creditors are in gcods.

Advices from the Northwest are not at all cheering, remittances being very slow, owing to the low prices farmers have received for their products, and the fact that so much of the money has been swallowed up in paying for debts incurred in past A number of failures have been re-

corded in recent months, and some poor results have followed the realizaof estates. But no insolvents in Ontario that we have heard of equal, in point of paucity of dividend, those of two poot and shoe merchants in Quebec. Etienne Metivier, of Victoriaville, who failed some time ago, has recently paid his first and final dividend of 3 cents on the dollar.
Upon liabilities of \$4,510 61 he pays \$135 34. Thomas Tobin, of Sorel, has paid 15 cents on liabilities of \$328 01; Gabriel Miles, of Grand Pabo, paid 113 cents on the dollar upon liabilities of \$3,350. There is altogether too much credit afforded to unstable traders, to the injury both of nerchants and their customers, for after all the losses in trade, like the taxes on goods, fall mainly on the consumer.

The outlook for the farmer is not so gloomy as some have pictured it. A prominent seedsman in this city, who has made a study of seasons, informs the writer that during his experience as a merchant and farmer he has seen seasons later, colder and more wet, followed by an abundant harvest. The fact is that if one wants to sow outs in our climate he can safely do so up to June 1. The same way with corn. That commodity, planted in this district as late as June 20, has turned out exceedingly well. Indeed, it is reasonable to take a philosophic view of the situation, and to hold that it is far better to have inclement weather now than at the end of May or beginning of June, which has often happened in years when spring weather has come early. The lateness of the season need give agriculturists little cause for alarm, if we have good weather steadily later on. At present fall wheat in the majority of western townships looks exceedingly well, and hay, though backward, is coming along admir-

Shortage in sunshine has kept back the pasturage, and the make of May cheese will consequently be considerably lighter than usual. But, in view of the fact that British merchants only want the finest grades now, and have a lot of second grades in sight, it is probably as well that the earlier marketing will be light. 

Accompanied by her husband, she went to the office of Dr. E. C. Longneeter early in the evening to have four teeth extracted. The dentist advised the use of gas, and Mrs. Lipp consented. She did not yield readily to its influence, and the usual dose was increased. She immediately fell into an unconscious state. After three teeth had been extracted the husband grew frightened at the appearance of his wife. Her face had become pallid, her breathing was light and no pulse could be found.

"My God, she's dead!" cried the husband as he seized her hands and covered them with kisses.

The dentist assured him that she was all right, and then drew the fourth tooth. When he endeavored to restore the woman to consciousness he was horrified to find that every effort failed. Her husband hurried for a physician, but just as the doctor entered the room the woman died. She had been in the chair only ten minutes. It is likely that Dr. Longneeter may have to answer to a jury for criminal carelessness.

Mrs. Lipp was the mother of two children, and had been married but five years. Her husband is prostrated with grief, and it is feared he may lose his reason.

TO CUT OFF LICENSES.

Niegara Liquor-Dealers Doing Business on the Basis of a Bogus Census.

Niagara Liquor-Dealers Doing Business on the Basis of a Bogus Census.

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 3.—In August, 1883, a census of this town was taken while a great excursion party was here which gave a population of 5,336, being about 2,000 more than the actual number of inhabitants. This gave the town several liquor licenses more than would be legally allowed upon a bona fide census. The town has prospered since that time, but the last Dominion census report necessitates a reduction of three licenses from the number now issued. Last week a deputation from the town waited upon the members of the Government at Toronto with the view of procuring special legislation to allow the three extra licenses to be continued. This aroused the indignation of the temperance people, and the effort was strongly condemned in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches on Sanday. An indignation meeting was called, when the people expressed their opinion of this effort by speeches and resolutions. A deputation consisting of Rev. Messrs. J. Crawford, T. A. Moore, and J. B. Brown, and Mr. W. Wilkinson was appointed to present this feeling of the temperance people to Sir Oliver Mowat to-morrow.
