





It is the first really complete life of the celebrated humorist that has been written, and naturally contains everything that an industrious hero-worshipper in America or in Europe. In these endless anecdotes, infinite table-talk, a profusion of letters, material which reveals Mark in every mood. Mark ived so long and led such a varietwists and turns of his career. He was his parents were very poor, he obtained little schooling and was apprenticed to a printer when he was 13 years of age. At 20 he became a pilot on the Mississippi, a few years later wandered to Nevada, then to California, next to the Sandwich Islands, and finally landed in New York. During those eventful years he had been printer, editor, gold miner, lecturer, by turns. His famous story, "The Jumping Frog," was published in 1867, and his "Innocents Abroad" in 1869, and from this latter date his ink-well became more of a gold mine than any he had seen in the west. In 1873 he settled at Hartford, Connecticut, and made and lost money at an astonishing rate. Mark seemed to have little skill as a businessman. For instance, he lost at one stroke as much as \$200,-000 over a type-writing machine about which he knew next to nothing. firm in Hartford with which he was identified, he incurred a terribly heavy debt, which took him many years of hard work to pay, but, like Sir Walter Scott, he paid off his creditors to the last dollar, and this is one of the finest chapters in his career.

Mr. Paine tells a great many funny stories about the humorist. Mark was continually pestered by manufacturers of medicines and other articles for his indersation of their wares "Dear Sir" he once wrote to a patent medicine vendor, "I try every remedy sent to me. 
THE FIRST WORD—Whatever else you do, do not cry-at least, don't let anyone see you do so.

Dear Sir,-Yours of Oct. 1 to hand. have taken this matter up, and would call your attention to the fact that the ontract with the commission gives no fixed rate which the town is to pay for its power. Under paragraph 2 (a) the own agrees to pay for power at th rate paid by the commission at Niagara Falls, and under 2 (c) to pay annual interest at 4 per cent upon its portion o the capital cost, subject to adjustment annually. Under paragraph 2 (d) to pay the sinking fund charge on its share of the capital cost, subject to adjustment annually, and under paragraph 2 (e) to pay its share of the line loss, operation. naintenance charges, etc., subject to annual adjustment. You will also note bat paragraph 2 (g) obligates the municipality to pay for three-quarters of the power supplied or contracted for, but this applies only to the power at Niagara Falls, and not to the municipality's portion of the capital cost, operation, etc. Secton 10 provides for the annual ad-Secton 10 provides for the annual adjustment and apportioning of the amounts payable by municipal corporations for such power, and such interest, the such power and such interest.

### HOME RULE AMENDMENT | SENTENCE OF DEATH WAS VOTED DOWN

Commons Refused to Accept Arthur Ellis Found Guilty of Law's Clause That Would Fetter Free Action.

London, Oct. 23.-The House of Commons this evening resumed the debate on the amendment to the Irish home rule bill moved yesterday by Waldorf Astor, the Unionist member from Plymouth. The amendment sought to prohibit the Irish Parliament from making laws whereby anybody may be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law or equal protection of the laws. Premier Asquith, in opposing the

amendment, said that the acceptance of it would be equivalent to acknowledging that in Ireland alone, of all the Empire, it was necessary to fetter the free action of the Legislature, imposing restrictions not imposed anywhere else. The Premier asserted that the amendment merely said that the Irish Parliament should not pass legislation which no civilized Parliament would think of passing. Andrew Bonar Law, the Unionist leader, in replying to the Premier scored a point, reminding Mr. Asquith

that he voted for the insertion of the identical words of the amendment in he home rule bill of 1893. 299 to 197.
