NATIONAL HONOR OF THE JAPANESE IS NOW AT STAKE

General Regret Felt at Tokic Over Action of Governor Johnson.

Government Is Having a Hard Time Trying to Pacify Public Opinion.

Tokio, May 20.—The news that the California alien land bill had been igned by Governor Johnson was reeived here with regret, although it. had been discounted in official and non-official circles. 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

MR. BORDEN IN TORONTO.

The "counter-demonstration" in To ronto duly came off according to pro gram. It was well organized and suc cessful. The crowd was large, the people shouted, the flags were waved, an electric Dreadnought flashed over the platform, and disappeared when the light was turned off. The audience was enthusiastic; even the cheers that greeted the mention of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's name did not materially dampen the jubilation.

It was a foregone conclusion. In Tory Toronto there is no difficulty about getting up a Tory crowd to cheer a Tory orator. If Mr. Borden had come with his original naval policy of 1909, when he joined with the Liberals in advocating a Canadian-built navy he would have had the same applause. If he had been advocating Canadian independence, and separation from the Empire, it would have been the same thing. Enough to show that it was a Tory policy, in the inter-

When it came to the speaking there was an echo of his parliamentary speeches. He did not say why he de-"emergency," but he did not say where it was, whether in the North Sea, as he had it six months ago, or in the Mediterranean, where Mr. Churchill has since located the proposed Malay-Canadian fleet. He denied any alliance with the anti-British Nationalists, though he did not deny that they were voting with him and sitting in his cabinet. He denied that his policy was one of continued contributions, but said nothing about his former announcement that a Canadian navy could not be built for 25 or 50 years. Finally, he warned the Senate that if it did not think as he did on this quesshould proceed to reform it, the duty and usefulness of that body, of course, being to indorse all acts of a Conser-Liberal masures. Mr. Pelletier, the Postmaster-General, was there to speak for the Nationalists, which he did by declaring that they were all Liberals. It was an amusing exhibition. WIPING OUT A STAIN.

Volleys of cheering rang through the British House of Commons on May when the Under-Secretary for India Mr. Montagu, proudly announced that opium traffic between India and China was dead.

Seventy years ago Gladstone said: "I am in dread of the judgment of a Unionist government?" God upon England for our national iniquity towards China. Three times since then the House of Commons proneunced the continuance of the trade -"morally indefensible." The origin of the problem was once described by Lord Morley in these words:

"British subjects insisted smuggling opium into China, in the teeth of the Chinese law. The British agent on the spot began war against China for protecting herself against these malpractices. There was no pretence that China was in the wrong, but war having begun, Great Britain felt bound to see it through, with the result that China was compelled to open four ports, to cede Hong Kong and to pay an indemnity of £600,000. So true is it that statesmen have no concern with paternosters, the Sermon on the Mount, or the vade mecum of the moralist."

This began a chapter in British hisfory upon which all Christians must look back with shame and humiliation, but which is now happily closed. Mr. Montagu's announcement came as a pleasant surprise. A treaty with China in 1906 provided for the gradual extinction of the traffic, India retaining the right to send 16,580 chests of opium to China this year, 11,461 chests next year, 10,200 in 1915, and 5,100 in 1916, when the trade would cease. But the British and Indian Governments have now waived these rights, and not an ounce of the poppy will go to China this year, the Indian Government forfeiting £11,000,000 by the prohibition. Mr. Montagu said the decision had been prompted by the evidence of the sincerity of the Chinese Government in stamping out the growth of opium on Chinese soil. So long as China remained steadfast in the pursuit of her cancer is caused by excessive nutrition present policy, the Indian Government would not avail itself of its treaty soon obtain general recognition.







Three Thousand Longshoremen Want Increase in Pay and Shorter Hours. [Canadian Press.]






