SUCCUMB TO HARDSHIPS

Exposed For Hours To Zero Weather by Order of the German Commanders.

BY HENRY WOOD.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

With the French Armies in the Pathway of the German Retreat, Via Paris.—More than three hundred women, children and aged men are known to have succumbed to the hardship, the exposure, the brutelity, the starvation which the Germans imposed upon the French civil population immediately preceding and during the retreat. In Chauny alone I learned officially today the victims number 150. They were buried, coffinless, in a corner of the villages. Deaths are still occurring daily among the refugees now under French care.

Along the roads leading from Ham, Guiseard, Chauny, Tergnier and La Fere to Neyon, where on Tuesday I personally met only refugees fleeing afoot from the German bombardment, I encountered today long automobile convoys.

After taking munitions and supplies to front points, where fighting is going on, these automobies were returning laden with refugees too sick or too exhausted to proceed afoot. These were mostly the aged. Many were dying from hardship, exposure and starvation, but as they declared, dying happily, knowing their villages were redeemed and surviving loved ones freed from German domination. Barbarous Orders.

Barbarous Orders.

Many of those casualties resulted from Germans' barbarous "inspection" orders immediately before they started to retreat. In temperature raging from zero up they were gathered in on open squares. The sick were carried on stretchers, the exhausted and helpless were borne by their less helpless friends From 6 o'clock in the morning—the hour set for the inspection—these ill-clad, ill-nourished refugees, were forced to await in the freezing cold—without shelter, without food—for five or six hours before the German officers arrived. London, March 26—Via Reuter's Agency.—The immense artillery effort which Great Britain is putting forth is strikingly illustrated by the army appropriation account for 1916, which shows that the net expenditure for the army was £543,187,548. This amount includes: Pay, £98,157,-156; supplies and clothing, £212,960,815; quartering, transport and remounts, £96,373,107; of which the sea transport of troops cost £30,687,382.

The sum of £5,570,320 was credited to the Indian Government for ordinary expenses of the Indian expeditionary forces.

INTERNED GERMANS TAKEN TO AMERICAN FORTS BY MARINES OF THE STATES

Victoria, B. C., March 26.—If the Legislature accepts an amendment to the civil service bill offered by Capt. Hayward, the independent soldier member for Cowichan, the proposed new civil service of the province will not be open to any person of military age and able for overseas service who has been appointed to a Government position since the outbreak of the war, or who might otherwise be appointed, in the future up to a point six months after the declaration of peace. In other words, the captain proposes that all the present employees of the Government eligible for active service who have been appointed to a many point and no new appointments of men eligible for overseas duty may be made up to the end of a period of six months after the close of the war.

HEAVY SACRIFICES BY THE GERMANS

Paris, March 26.—The French war report says: The Germans made heavy and useless sacrifices, the statement says, in several attacks yesterday on positions captured by the French between the Somme and the Oise. Wherever they approached a French position they were thrown back by counter-attacks.

The statement follows: Between the Somme and the Oise the Germans made repeated attacks during the night on the front between Essigny and Benay. All these attempts were checked by our fire or repulsed by our counter-attacks. Serious losses were inflicted on the enemy. We maintained completely the positions captured yesterday. Always Going Ahead.

"South of the Oise our advance continued notwithstanding the state of the ground and the bad weather. We pushed forward our patrols beyond Folembray, south of the lower forest of Coucy.

"North of Rheims our batteries caused the explosion of a munitions depot of the enemy east of Du Godat farm. Elsewhere the night was calm. "Five German airplanes were

THE WAR SITUATION

Desperate resistance is being made by the Germans to the smashing attack of the French upon the defences of St. Quentin. Heavy counter-attacks were reported, but Paris declares General Nivelle's troops have held all the ground won, the positions captured on Sunday being completely maintained LOST KEY POSITION.

Apparently this means that the Germans definitely have lost the strong key position at Essigny, four and a half miles south of St. Quentin, which is essential to the protection of St. Quentin on the south. Military critics have pointed to the probability of the whole German wing in this sector being forced back to the Oise if this position, which the French captured yesterday, was no regained by the Germans

GAS WAVES FOR RUSSIANS.

In view of the verified reports from Petrograd that the Germans have been concentrating heavily on the Russian northern front for a drive toward Petrograd, considerable interest attaches to the announcement by the Russian war office today of a German attack on the Russian line below Dvinsk. It is in this region that the beginning of a German offensive might be looked for. The Petrograd statement reveals German preparations for the attack by means of gas waves. The assault followed, but according to the Russian announcemen was repelled by the defensive fire.

Paris, March 26, noon.—Notwithstanding the bad weather and the difficult state of the ground, the French continued last night to advance south of the Oise. The war office announces that French patrols reached Folembray, south of the Forest of Coucy. HONORS WITH FRENCH.

Paris, March 26 .- The battle of St. Quentin continues to rage with unabated fury. The honors of the last twenty-fou hours' fighting have been with the French, who are pushing forward steadily, taking all the precautions that the nature of the operation call for, and in the face of desperate resistance by the Germans. The advance is necessarily slow, owing to the character of the ground.







Indomitable Energy of French Too Much for Fritz to Overcome.

OPEN COUNTRY BECKONS

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Saturday, March 24 .- Via Beauvais .- The rapidity of the German retreat has somewhat diminished, but the French advance continues eastward of the St. Quentin Canal. Fightng between the advanced rear guards as been sharp at various points, but the Germans have been unable to withstand the pressure of the French forward movement. All obstacles in the way of the oncoming French are overcome with indomitable energy and irit with which the men are im nore than ever since they left the renches for the open country.

OTTAWA. March 25.—Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, stated today that he would not be surprised if the total subscriptions to the war loan, including the sixty millions from the banks, would aggregate \$250,000,000.

The issue was for \$150,000,000. An official statement issued by Sir Thomas says:

"While the subscription lists of Canada's third war loan closed or Friday, several days must yet elapse before the mails from distant points carrying thousands of subscriptions are received. Sufficient applications, however, have 'come to hand' to warrant the minister in stating that the loan is an unqualified success. When all the subscriptions have been received it will be found that the loan has been considerably oversubscribed, without taking into account the subscriptions chartered banks or conversions into this loan of bonds or stock of any other issue.'
