The skirmishes recorded daily by Lord Roberts are petty affairs, in which scores of Boer combatants are engaged where formerly there we're thousands. General Kelly-Kenny, who commanded the sixth division in the terrible march across the veldt, has been relieved from command that Bjotemfontein, and General Hunter has taken his place. Either Lord Roberts or Lord Kitchener is picking out men who have special capacity for fighting the Boers. The new tactics seem effective. The scattered bands of Boers are constantly harried and allowed no rest. The lines of communication are strongly guarded and are not seriously menaced. The Boers are alert, but only able to operate on a small scale against outposts, and their cattle and horses are constantly taken from them and here and there small squads are killed, captured or taken prisonillness and desertions. NECESSITY FOR LAW REFORM IN CIVIL CASES.

Col. Denison, police magistrate Toronto, and himself a lawyer, is strongly in favor of law reform in civil cases. He thinks the present system too costly, besides being unsatisfactory. Some time ago Col. Denison in his police court expressed very strong opinions as to the large costs which lawyers were able to charge in civil cases. He considered in fact that when these costs amounted to nine tenths of the sum recovered, so that the client received only the remaining one-tenth, the latter could hardly be expected to be perfectly satisfied with the result. Incidentally, the Colonel remarked on law procedure in general, and expressed the hope that the system of civil law practice would some day be reformed. The Canada Law Journal, in its issue of the first of October, took the matter up and in an article headed "A Law Reformer," attacked Col, Denison in a somewhat severe and patronizing manner. The Colonel's suggestions are "crude as they are comical," he "does not pretend to know much law, but he knows something el e of more value, 'he receives a salary which, in proportion to the amount of time spent, is vastly greater than the fees received by any minister of the crown, chief justice or other official in the Dominion;" and soon after this pleasing little introduction, the learned editor proceeded to attack Col. Denison's position. He denied that legal charges in the province are enormous, they are on the contrary, very mod-

erate compared with those in other countries, a fact which Col. Denison ought to know." The latter's suggestions as to reform are neither new nor valuable, and if he were an authority at all upon law, he would never air his ignorance. This is in substance how the editor crushed the police magistrate of Toronto.

The Colonel, however, in the Journal of November 1st, returns to the subject, and we must say, makes out a strong case. After disposing of the errors into which the Journal had fallen as to attacks upon the profession and so on, and disposing of the editor's allegations as to his being highly paid and doing nothing, the worthy magistrate states his own views as to the administration of justice in civil cases. The fundamental proposition which he days down is this: the state having taken upon itself the duty of settling disputes between its citizens, it should see to it that this duty is performed at the least possible cost. "But," Colonel Denison asks, "Is this the case? By no means," he answers, and then he gives an amusing account of the progress of a suit, from the time when the action is launched until, having passed through two or three appeals, in each of which the previous judgemnt is reversed, it reaches the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, where the final decision is given, which is more likely to be right than any of the previous ones, as the judges "have no appeal above them, and do not trouble themselves so much about precedents as about justice." "Then what happens?" Col. Denison asks. "One man wins, and the other loses neither being altogether in the right neither altogether in the wrong, but one gets everything, the other loses everything. . . The total costs in a case like this would probably amount to thousands if not tens; of thousands of del'ars, and it might have been as satisfactorily settled without expense, and with just as much certainty, if the parties had tossed a copper to decide it at the start." The conclusion of the whole matter is, according to the Colonel, that the State should legislate so that the judges should decide disputes quickly, simply, without formalities, and without re gard to anything except the absolute justice in each case; that there should be only one appeal, which should be final, and that musty precedents, perhaps the mistakes of men gone by, should not be worsh pped or followed to create injustice. If the State did this, did away with all fees of every kind, and hired the lawyers at fixed salaries, to assist the judges in bringing forward evidence, there is no occasion why disputes could not be settled in one-tenth of the time and at one-twentieth of the expense now incurred."

The Law Journal treats the Magistrate's letter in a jocular vein, especially in regard to the "copper-tossing idea." Our own impression is, that while some of his suggestions may be Butopian, he has the better of the argument, and that the Journal, seeing this, is now inclined to treat the whole matter as merely a jest. But there is a great deal of truth in Col. Denison's remarks, just the same.

SIR WILFRID'S UNFORTUNATE PO SITION.

The Huntingdon Gleaner (Liberal) of Nov. 15 says, editorially: The oninous feature of these (election) returns is that the Government has been supported only in the smaller provinces and in Quebec. The chief province of the Dominion, the one that has the greatest population and which contributes the largest share of the revenue, has condemned the Laurier Government, and the fact stands out that the Government is going to rule by means of the members of Quebec This is most unfortunate, for it gives a handle to those men who during the recent campaign worked the cry of race and creed for all it was worth. We are sure no man can deplore the absence of an Ontario majority more than Sir Wilfrid, and it is in consonance with his spirit of tolerance and desire to propitiate opponents that he will do his best to restrain his Quebee followers, so that no occasion be given for the renewal of the dread cry of Quebec domination. During the next five years he will have a difficult part to play, and on his success depends whether Confederation is to remain intact.

Of the cause of his failure to carry Ontario we may be allowed to say a few words from The Gleaner's standpoint. From the time he broke from the traditional policy of the Liberals in subsidizing railways, in taking up public works that were in no sense Dominion undertakings, but mere bribes to constituencies, and in neglecting to repeal duties levied for the benefit of monopolies, we said he would lose the support of those Liberals who had regard for the principles wlich the name Liberal represents, and who were not units of a mere party ma-We submit the result has prov ed this. Had the Government been one of retrenchment and economy it would not have lost 16 constituencies in Ontario and had its majorities reduced in many others. Surely the Ontario re turns speak of Liberals who did not vote, or of Liberals who preferred Opposition candidates to men like Mc Mullen, who had been false to all their professions while in Opposition: Coming nearer home, Huntingdon and Chaterguay are in evidence of the number of English-speaking Liberals who stayed at home on polling day or else voted against the Government randidates. Whatever else the elections may show, they prove that broken pledges, extravagance in expenditure, and increase in debt have

Ether was applied and an incisjon was made below the breast bone and in the stomach. A tube was inserted. The patient has since received pourishment through the tube. It is hoped that he may be permanently penefitted.

"I am afraid to go through that dark ravine with you. It is a lonely place, and you might overpower me and kiss "If you are afraid of that," said the







A FILIPINO TRAGEDY

INSURGENT SHOT BY AMERICAN OF-FICER PROVED TO BE HIS SON-

Was Stolen by a Chinese Nurse - Major Rockefeller's Son Joined Assinaldo's Forces-The Two Met in a Hot Fight, and the Father Killed His Boy, Learning the Truth Later-Stricken With Remorse, He Deserts.

How stranger is truth than fiction! For this is a true story, with a tragic ending—an ending that has made a gallant officer of the United States army a deserter and exile because of remorse, says the Columbus correspondent of The New York Journal. Charles N. Rockefeller, a young New Yorker, enlisted as a private in a New York regiment at the out-break of the civil war. In 1863 he was made a first lieutenant in the One Hundred and Seventy-eight New York infantry, and for gallantry in action at Fort Blakely, Ala., on

April 8, 1865, a medal of honor was awarded to him. He was honorably mustered out in 1866, and business took him on a trip to Winona, Minn. There he wooed and won Miss Evangeline Re-Lieutenant Rockefeller again joined the army as second lieutenant in the Ninth infantry. He was then stationed in Columbus, O., and al-ways afterward called Columbus his

A child was born-a boy. He was called Robert. When the little one was a year old, in 1870, Lieutenant Rockefeller was detailed on duty in Hong Kong, where he was, with his wife and baby, until 1872. While stationed at Hong Kong Licutenant Rockefeller lived with his family at

Bennett's Cigar Store | the International hotel. A Chinese nurse looked after the little boy. In 1872 he arranged to sail for San Francisco. Two days before the date set for sailing the Chinese and the baby disappeared. Hong Kong was searched. Large rewards were offered, but no trace of nurse or child could be found. The broken-hearted young lieutenant and his wife were compelled to return to the United States without the little one. Mrs. Rockefeller died soon after her arrival in San Francisco, and the griefstricken father rejoined his regiment. He saw service with the Ninth in the Indian wars and in Cuba, and when his regiment was ordered to the Philippines in the spring of 1899 he went along. He was then a captain and was known throughout the army as a particularly daring sol-dier. Soon after his arrival at Ma-

nila was made a major and transferred to the Sixth infantry.

Major Rockefeller at the head of three companies of troops scouted the country around San Beoir. On one occasion a vicious stand was made by a body of insurgent troops led by a handsome and dashing young white man, who fought like a fiend. He charged right up to the American lines. Major Rockefeller shot him dead, and the insurgents fled. Major Rockefeller directed that the body be searched, and papers found revealed that he was Paul Stanhope of Hong

response to one he had written near-ly a year before. The letter was from the American consul and recited that in 1879 a white boy had been placed in the Jesuit college in Hong Kong by a Chinese woman, who said that he was 9 years old and that his name was Paul Yen. The name of the Chinese woman who had nursed the Rockefeller baby was Yen. In 1881 the boy was adopted by an English merchant in Hong Kong of the name of Henry Stanhope. He gave the boy his name and reared him well. The young fellow was well known in

Hong Kong as Paul Stanhope. He was of an adventurous disposi-tion and some two years ago joined Aguinaldo's army. It was this young man that Major Rockefeller shot and killed in the engagement with the Filipinos.

When Major Rockefeller read the letter—it had been chasing him around the world for nearly a yearhe realized that he had slain his own son. He dropped out of sight as mysteriously as the baby had dropped out of sight in Hong Kong. From Manila he made his way to China, and by devious routes to Santa Barbara, Honduras, where he intends to remain, according to a letter received a few days ago from


