The Montessori System.

This new system of teaching has been attracting almost world-wide attention. Mothers of little ones have for some time been experimenting successfully with the system.

At the Montreal Woman's Club a few days ago, Miss Cameron, of the Royal Victoria College, speaking of Modern Educational Methods said: "I'm not going to give an eulogical newsworthy education, because I haven't any, I feel I belong to a system of education that is passing away. I am not sure we shall need books at all in the next generation."

She was rather sceptical of all the new educational systems, including the Montessori system, which aims at the training and perfecting of the physical and mental powers of the child for his future work in the world.

Miss Cameron said, "I know we need more method, we need teachers, more instructive, more criticism. Give us as much instruction as possible."

Dr. Montessori, from Rome, Italy, was the founder of this system some few years ago, when she started classes in Rome for defective children.

Dr. Montessori does not speak English fluently and therefore her recent lecturing tour on this continent an interpreter was necessary. Monday was one of the cities which she visited and consequently increased interest was aroused there in regard to the system. Finding that the defective children under her methods learn much more quickly than normal children, she applied it to all kinds of classes. A principal of one of the Montreal schools was among the first to introduce the system in Montreal, beginning in 1912 to apply the method to his own little girl nearly six years old. Since then a detailed account of his success, but a few facts may be interesting. Probably because she had not to learn by this method, which is based on the child's own activity, by the end of a month she could read at least two hundred words of all syllables. In sixteen days she had mastered as much pure arithmetic as the average scholar on the old system masters in one year. She could manipulate numbers up to 13, adding, subtracting, dividing and multiplying.

The parent and teacher feels convinced that there must be a great future for the system, if no other reason than the success of his own experience. This educationalist made all the didactic apparatus for the Montessori catalogue. Children are by this method taught to dress themselves, to wash hands and face properly. They are taught that it is a social sin to be dirty.

"It is much easier," says Madame Montessori, "to wash a child than to teach it to wash itself, but a child is not being educated until it washes itself."

The children are taught to eat quietly and nicely. They take turns in waiting on each other. Later they are shown how to care for plants and animals. This "alliance game" has wonderful effect of teaching them to be quiet at all times.

Our New Citizens.

The annual report of the Department of the Interior for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1913, is just to hand. A review of its pages affords an excellent index of the remarkable growth of Western Canada.

The homestead entries taken out in the four western provinces totalled 33,699 and represented a population of 84,069 souls. In the previous year the homestead entries were 39,151, representing a population of over 200,000 people.

The homesteaders were drawn from all lands and climes. The north gave up the south held not back and the sons and daughters of east and west came to Canada to find land in the last "great west."

That we have a problem on our hands is quite apparent when we point out that over 5,500 of the homesteads were taken by Austro-Hungarians, over 2,000 by Norwegians, over 3,000 by Russians, nearly 6,000 by Swedes, Rumanians, Germans, Belgians, Hindus, Chinese, Japanese, French, Hollanders, Greeks and a dozen other nationalities are represented in this population.
