DCBLIN, July 18, 1850.

Since my last, the Assizes throughout the country have been going on; the amount of crime is about the usual average of the last few years; but no trul of my great interest has taken place, with the exception of that for the murder of Mr. Mauleverer at Crossmaglen, which came on at Armagh on Thursday. Three persons, one for the murder, the others for aiding, were arraigned; one of the latter was the man who drove the car u non the occasion, but the first alone was put upon his trial. The trial lasted for seven hours, returned a verticet of acquittal, there having been some chain wanting in the evidence as to identity. The Jury stated that they gave the prisoner the benefit of the doubt, although they entertained strong suspicion of his guilt.

On Monday night, the Government succeeded, by a majority of one, in the House of Commons, in throwing out Lord Naas' Bill, (the Home-made Spirits in Bond Bill.) for altering the mode of levying the daty on Spirits in Bond, by which the Irish Distiller would be placed on the same equality as the Foreign Distiller. This was one of the numercus measures upon which the M.n.suy were defeated during the present Session, as I mentioned in a previous letter. 
