REMOVAL OF ALIENS BILL.-Considers ble misapprehension, has, we believe, arisen in the minds of foreigners residing in this country, as to the intended operation of the 'Removal of the Aliens Bill," introduced into the House of Lords on Monday last, by the Marquis of Lansdowne. The object of the proposed measure is simply to give to the Secretary of State and the Lord Lieutenant the power to remove from the united kingdom, by warrant under their hands respectively, aliens of disreputable character, whose presence and conduct may be deemed dangerous to the peace and so-cial order of these realms. Under the sixth clause of this bill, it is provided that foreigners who have been domiciled and settled in this country for the last seven years cannot in any way be affected by the act.—The London Times, April 15.
