



I wish you would save some of the local papers, Acadians and Advertisers, and send them to me, even if there isn't much in them they'll look good over here. I don't like the English papers a bit; doesn't seem to be anything in them worth looking anything in them worth looking

at.

'The food they are giving us here is great. Good old oatmeal porridge for breakfast every morning is quite a treat for us. Really everything is fine; and while we are quarantined everything is carried—right to the huts. We are living just like lords. Not a thing to do but eat and sleep.
