**CROWN'S CASE FINISHED**  
The Hyams' Previous Records Not To Be Told at Present.

**SEVERAL DOCTORS EXAMINED**  
All Say Two Severe Blows Were Given—Coroner Atkins, the First Witness for the Defence, Tells Why He Did Not Hold an Inquest.

Toronto, May 14.—The sequence of the evidence of fact which has been well sustained since the trial commenced was broken yesterday morning, when Mrs. Hyams' testimony was abruptly terminated by her illness.

The Crown called witnesses to prove the telegrams already referred to in the evidence, and which were sent by Willie Wells on January 14, regarding the purchase of the farm.

Uriah J. Jones of Pickering, the uncle of the dead boy, of whom the farm, for which the \$1,000 held by Hyams was to have been paid, was purchased, came into the box, and identified the telegrams to purchase the farm. He testified to receiving telegrams from Will Wells, relating to his visit to Pickering to see the purchase. He received one from Will on January 14, asking him to meet his nephew at Whitby, and then two days later he got a dispatch announcing the death of Will Wells.

The most important evidence brought out was that by Expressman Fox, who told of the alterations that were made to the now famous elevator under the supervision of the Hyams brothers.

The witness then gave his version of the events of the morning of the murder, and testified that he was at the warehouse at ten o'clock on the morning of the death, but he could not get in at either door.

He had turned to leave, when Harry Hyams called him and led him into the building. As he entered he saw that Harry's hands were bleeding, and he asked for an explanation.

Harry's answer: "Fox, we had had an awful accident here this morning; Willie Wells is killed." The witness was not whether he said that it was the elevator or the weight that fell on Wells.

Fox then described the condition of the body, and the positions of the weight, hammer and chisel.

There was a sensational story woven into this witness' evidence which was uncorroborated by Mr. Oler's asking Fox if he ever talked over the death with Dallas Hyams.

"Yes, sometimes, in the warehouse, we spoke of it," he said. "But I didn't want to say anything more about it, because he would have to bring in other persons, and I don't want to get sides said the story must come out, and then Fox said:

"Mr. Dallas Hyams told me to go to B. D. Humphrey, the undertaker, and tell him to keep his mouth shut. The reason of this was that Mr. Sullivan, of the Ontario Laundry, came to see me with another man, and told me to tell Hyams to keep his mouth shut or that they would open on him. It seems that Hyams had been saying something about a bank clerk named Wilson, a friend of Sullivan, who had borrowed some \$500 from Hyams. He also told me that they were going to see Mr. Humphrey, and so Hyams, when I told him this, asked me to tell Humphrey to keep his mouth shut."

Toronto, May 15.—Mr. Oler showed the value attached to the evidence of Fox by submitting him to another re-examination yesterday.

To Mr. Lount Fox said that it was five days after the death that he saw Dallas. The latter had a scratch on his nose, but he could not swear that it was the first time he saw Dallas that he had the scratch. Mr. Lount told the witness why he was so sure that Dallas had the scratch on his nose, and that he was allowed to go.

Thomas Chambers, a livery stable proprietor at 108 Mutual street, said that he sent out a hack on Monday, January 6, at the warehouse.

Jerry Riordan, who held the position of driver on a one-horse car along Church street in the Colborne street and went west. He was uncertain about the circumstances, and K. H. Nix, the Street Railway Company's rickmaster, was called to give the driver's "time." In order to show at what hour the car passed up Church street, he was asked to give the time which the witness prepared its case was shown when this witness testified on the fact that Mr. Oler was down to see him about Riordan's time.

The man who shaved Harry Hyams, A. Gaudreay, a barber, testified that it was about half-past eight on the morning of the alleged murder when Harry came in. He was shaved and left the shop, and within fifteen minutes the barber heard of Wells' death.

She testified that she had been employed by the Hyams in 1893; that she addressed letters, but she never knew of any business being done there. She testified that on the Saturday afternoon Harry Hyams called at her house and left some letters to be delivered on the Monday morning before he came down to work. She had only been sent to deliver letters once or twice before. She got to the warehouse on Monday at 11.45, and found the east door locked. Harry opened it, and said that there had been an accident. Then he told her about Will's death.

Toronto, May 15.—The evidence of Mrs. Harry Hyams was delayed this morning until the Crown fixed the date on which it is said that Sullivan warned Dallas Hyams through Fox, the expressman, to let up on pressing Wilson or something would be exposed. She was carefully cross-examined by Mr. Lount. The history of the courtship and marriage were repeated.

Mr. John Wright, a practical plumber, proved by actual experiment that the weight could not have been severed from the hook. This seemed so convincing that it is probable that the theory will be abandoned by the defence.

Saunder Gaudreay, a money lender, by his evidence, pointed out that the prisoners were in need of money before Wells was killed.

Another witness described blood stains which he saw on a pair of Harry Hyams' trousers.

Mrs. Hyams was most positive in her evidence, and she has doubts that her husband told her a story which from the evidence already given is shown to be a subterfuge.

Richard Adams, a broker and money lender, said the warehouse business was one in which there was very keen opposition and he would not expect new hands to succeed very well, and he was not at all surprised if he did no business between November and February.

The Important Events in a Few Words for Busy Readers.

The annual meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America has been postponed till the last Tuesday in July.

The Boards of Trade of Vancouver and New Westminster, B. C., join in the request for the appointment of a board of Customs experts.

All the union coat handlers employed on the wharves at Montreal went out on strike on Friday because of the employment of non-unionists.

No. 1 Manitoba hard wheat, all rail, Montreal, sold Friday at \$1.00 per bushel. White wheat on the Toronto market sold at 87 cents a bushel.

General Herbert's residence in Ottawa is advertised for sale and his family are reported to have engaged passages to England for the 15th of June.

Importations into Canada during April aggregated \$3,000,796 and the duty paid was \$1,498,481. The value of the exports for the same month was \$4,900,804. Owing to the extreme range of the Lee-Metford rifle used by the Imperial troops, vessels have been warned to keep 8,000 yards away from the stop butts at Halifax.

The commander of the Fishery Protection Service has notified the Marine Department at Ottawa that there are fifty American sealers on the Nova Scotia coast.

Mr. T. B. Gillard, who was for a number of years mayor of the village of Wallaceburg, and warden of the County of Kent in 1891, died on Thursday night, aged forty-nine.

Many residents of the Niagara peninsula on Friday petitioned the Dominion Parliament to enact an alter law on the lines of the one in force in the United States.

The Rev. Father Dumortier, S.J., of Guelph, on Friday celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his induction as a priest, which took place on the 17th of May, 1845, in the Lyons cathedral.

Dr. Fred. Morden, of Demeriville, Ont., who graduated from the University, Kingston, a year ago, securing the gold medal, was found dead in his office, at eleven o'clock Sunday night, in the room of the late Dr. Morden, who was the steamer Niagara, loaded with lumber, bound down the new canal, was entering lock early Wednesday morning. The cause of death was attributed to the deck and was drowned.

The Dominion cruiser Petrel on Thursday night captured five miles of fishing nets in Lake Erie near Port Huron harbor. The owners of the nets, who are U. S. citizens, have been ordered to pay \$100,000. Mr. Sifton, Attorney-General of Manitoba, arrived in Ottawa on Saturday afternoon. The appointment of a permanent forestry commissioner to inquire into and administer the various interests involved in the preservation of our timber resources.

**AMERICAN.**  
The Earl of Westmorland has arrived in Washington to deliver a series of lectures to the British Embassy.

The Salem Wire & Cable Company and the Findlay Company of Findlay, Ohio, have advanced their price for wire ten per cent. The advance affects six thousand men.

The 18th annual convention of the Western Great Lakes Association, composed of gas engineers of the United States and Canada, opened at Pittsburgh on Wednesday.

The British Association of the United States have come to an agreement as to the holding of a conference on the Behring Sea fishery on the 17th of July in Washington in October.

A number of sheep belonging to people living in Minnesota have been killed recently by dogs belonging to Indians who live in Canada, and the owners of the sheep claim damages.

**FOREIGN.**  
The Queen will visit formally upon a new parish church in Crathie.

It is believed in English political circles that the government will be held towards the end of July.

At the approaching opening of the Balmoral Palace in London, the powers and the United States will be represented by their best men-of-war.

The Spanish steamer Graciosa, bound for Antwerp for Lisbon, was lost off Capones during a typhoon, and only two of those on board were saved.

Count Goluchowski had an audience with Emperor Francis Joseph on Saturday, and was afterwards sworn in as Imperial Minister of Foreign Affairs in succession to Count Kaloky.

A telegram from Dron Wednesday says the native tribesmen have made a night attack upon the British post at Kamlet. Seven coolies are reported killed and twenty wounded.

A number of warehouses and factories near the leather market, Bernersway, were burning on Friday. The fire started within a few hours, and caused not only inconvenience but much damage to small firms. The defect in the German Belshagor of the Anti-Violence bill and the Tobacco Tax measure has been a bad blow to the Government, and as a result it is said that there are serious dissensions in the Cabinet.

The Imperial Privy Council has granted permission to the Attorney-General of Ontario to appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of Quebec last week, in reference to the Governor-General's action in regard to the liquor laws.

Lieutenant-Governor Schultz, of Manitoba, calls attention in his annual report to the depredations of American whalers in Hudson's Bay. He is of opinion that without some control over the slaughter of the whale, walrus, and seal, the last of these creatures in Canadian waters will be destroyed. He advises the adoption of more restrictive measures.

**ANOTHER PARKHURST.**  
A Hamilton Minister in Disgrace Goes Out Investigating.

Hamilton, May 18.—Rev. R. S. Boyle, pastor of James street Baptist church, disgraced himself last evening, and in company with a Herald reporter secured admission to the Star theatre, occupying one of the boxes throughout the performance. He had been there a considerable time before the management was aware of his presence, and the character of the show was not different from what was given earlier in the week. Parts of it are far from pleasing to the public, and his conclusion, Mr. Boyle stated that while it was less immoral than he had been led to believe, it was not enough to warrant the City Council in refusing the theatre a license. Probably his experience will furnish material for denunciatory sermons.

**JUDGE TOMS DEAD.**  
The Senior Judge of the County of Huron Passes Away.

Goderich, May 14.—Judge Francis Toms, senior judge of the County of Huron, died this morning after an illness of two weeks. Deceased was one of the best known men in the western part of Ontario. The funeral will take place here on Thursday afternoon.

Mr. Edward Blake.

London, May 20.—There is a rumor abroad to the effect that Mr. Edward Blake intends to resign his seat in South Longford, retire from the arena of Imperial politics in Canada, and devote himself to his profession. It is learned that there is positively no foundation for such a story. Mr. Blake will not only continue to do material assistance to the Home Rule party in the House of Commons, but it is on the cards that he will continue to do so in the National Federation League.

**A Ministerial Caucus.**  
Ottawa, May 16.—The first ministerial caucus of the session was held yesterday morning. There was a large attendance of senators and members. Several congratulatory speeches were made and many subjects concerning the party welfare were discussed. The premier promised that when the Government had decided on a policy in regard to Manitoba schools and the Hudson Bay Railway, they would lay that policy before a caucus previous to announcing it in Parliament.

**Ontario Society of Artists.**  
Toronto, May 15.—The annual meeting of the Ontario Society of Artists was held last night and the following officers were elected—Honorary President, Hon. G. W. Allan; President, M. Matthews; Vice-President and Treasurer, W. C. Spang; Secretary, Robt. E. Gagen; Auditor, Jas. Smith; Executive Council—Robt. E. Spang, E. Foster, Miss G. E. Spang, W. D. Blatchley, F. S. Challenger, A. M. Manly, R. W. Curtis, T. M. Martin and W. Revell.

**The Military Camps.**  
Ottawa, May 15.—An extra of the Canada Gazette has been issued ordering about forty rural battalions out for their annual twelve days' drill, beginning in Ontario June 18, and in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces June 23. The London camp will consist of the 1st Hussars, 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th Battalions, and the Niagara camp of the 2nd Dragoons and 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Battalions.

**J. F. Van Wert More Power.**  
Ottawa, May 15.—Judge McLaughlin, Messrs. J. C. Crocker, E. J. Jackson, J. P. of the County of York, had an interview with Deputy Minister Newcombe yesterday. They want an amendment to the criminal code giving more power to justices of the Peace in the way of treating petty offences, and in place of sending them to the County Jail.

**Swallowed Carbolic Acid.**  
Kansas City, May 15.—John Shaw, fifty years of age, committed suicide at the Colorado Hotel, by swallowing carbolic acid. Shaw left a long letter, in which he said he was a banker in Warwick, Ontario, western Ontario, at one time, but failed and went to the United States.

**Admits His Guilt at Last.**  
London, May 17.—The People publishes a sensational statement by the Duke of Devonshire, claiming that it is a virtual confession of the fraudulent attempts to obtain the Tisbury estates and title. His admissions that he is Arthur Orton, the son of a butcher of Wapping.

**Montreal City Hall Controversy.**  
Montreal, May 15.—The Provincial Board of Health is suing the corporation on account of the unsanitary condition of the City Hall, which has long been a disgrace. The penalty claimed is \$25 a day, from March 1 last.

**Zimmerman's Name.**  
Toronto, May 15.—A. F. Zimmerman, who attempted to kill his wife by hitting her on the head with a hammer and afterwards stabbed himself in the breast, has been committed to a lunatic asylum, and will be taken to the Asylum at once.

**FINANCE AND COMMERCE**  
Toronto Breadstuffs Market.  
Toronto, May 20.—Wheat on Saturday was unsettled, and holders were in the position of not knowing what to do. All eyes were attracted by the rapid fluctuations in Chicago, and all sorts of predictions were made as to the course of values. Red and white wheat, west, was quoted nominally at 96c. There were no straight bids at that reported, but sales could probably have been made there. Manitobas were again higher. Holders asked 95c for No. 1 hard, for to ask and west. One lot of 10,000 bushels scored west sold, west, at 96c. This is equal to about 96c for No. 1. Holders of wheat of all sorts, Fort William, could not be induced to offer.

Flour—Manitobas are very strong. Some holders are now asking \$4.70 for patents and \$4.50 for makers; but others still quote \$4.60 and \$4.50. Sales can be made readily at the latter figures. Ontario straight roller is held at \$3.20. Milford—Bran is easy at 81c, middling wheat and shorts are scarce and sold at \$17 Toronto freight.

Charcoal—Selling at \$4.10 for car lots of rolled oats in bags on track.

Flour—Quiet and firm. No. 2 C.P.H. west was quoted at 92c and odd cars to millers bring rather more.

Quota—Continue firm. Car lots of white sold high freight west at 395/10 and mixed at 96c.

WAS NEY EXECUTED?

REV. J. A. WESTON'S REVIEW OF THE TESTIMONY FOUND IN HISTORY.

The American Ney looked like the Marshal—Admitted that He was the Great Ney, and knew All About the Napoleonic Wars.

The long-heralded volume by the Rev. James A. Weston, upon the "Historic Doubts as to the Execution of Marshal Ney," has made its appearance. Mr. Weston is not a mere theorist, or the first who has doubted that Ney really fell on the morning of his supposed execution. Many European historians have uttered such doubts. It fell to Mr. Weston to make this investigation, which has occupied him during some of his leisure time for twelve years, because of his personal acquaintance with so many who had known the man who, in North Carolina, passed by the name of Peter Stuart Ney, and who at times freely stated that it was the Marshal.

MARSHAL NEY.

News came of Napoleon's death on St. Helena. Ney followed him in his school-room, and with a pocket-knife. He was a superb horseman, and his mounted was more than any other soldier. He was killed by the Duke of Wellington on the 19th of October, 1818. He was a man of great energy and courage, and his death was a great loss to the French army.

THE LIFE AND WORK OF FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE.

There are very few instances on record of a great public woman and particularly a great heroine, having throughout lived up to her reputation. If she has done some great work—there are very many women of world-wide celebrity whose work has not been great—she is apt to be forgotten in the steady march of time and the progress of thought and life.

THE WILTON MEMORIAL WINDOW.

By the Author of "The Soldier's Friend."

It was a window 275 years ago. "The Complete Angler" was first published in 1653. It was a book of fishing, and it has continued without alteration to the present time. Through his famous "Angler" is in good part obsolete as a manual of fishing, it lives in literature by charming simplicity of manner, its pastoral freshness and poetry, and the pious and peaceful spirit which breathes from its quaint pages.
