The Ring's Defense.

In its issue of last week the Western Chronicle seeks to answer the damaging arraignment of the Municipal Council, which has been published by the Kings County Temperance Alliance.

Our contemporary, while not denying the fact, fails to give a single reason why the taxation has increased forty per cent. in the last eight years.

Such trifling sophistry will deceive no one. Everybody knows that there is a ring majority in the Council that rules the county irrespective of the wishes of the minority.

It is almost to be expected that this minority for the extravagance practiced by the administration of the majority merely because they have seats in the Council.

Even more absurd is the Chronicle's attempt to hold Councillors Reid, Anderson, Donaldson and Parker responsible for the remarkable increase in the amount paid for the Councillors' services, which has risen from \$292.20 in 1906 to \$505.30 in 1909.

Even the Western Chronicle should be able to see from these figures who is responsible for the increase of expenditures in this particular.

In referring to the charge made by the Alliance that an inspector of the choice in 1906 was able to put up a very effective and successful campaign of Scott Act enforcement and at a cost to the county of only \$75.54.

From a perusal of the accounts it can readily be seen that the increased deficit is due to more expensive legal services and the total failure of the inspector to collect from the rum-sellers the fines after they had been imposed.

It is really touching to hear the Chronicle, whose traditional attitude in reference to the temperance reform is pretty well understood, exult over the discomfiture of its friends, the rum-sellers, occasioned by the new order of Scott Act enforcement.

It would be more touching still were it not generally realized that conditions from a temperance standpoint are today worse than they have been for years, and that under our present expensive system of law enforcement we are fast approaching a free rum era.

But we are told that the Alder shot camp was quieter this year than usual. It is true that owing to the commendable activity of the Y. M. C. A., which slightly drew hundreds of men away from the temptations of the cantons to their attractive building, conditions were better than they otherwise would have been.

From the charge made against the present administration of county affairs, and the weak and halting defence offered to these charges, it is apparent that our unsuspicious matters will stand very serious consideration.

The fact that the Wet Council has increased our current expenditures to three years to the tune of almost \$6,000, and has entailed us in senseless litigation which the county knows from experience with Scott Act matters some high, should furnish the categories of the county with food for thought.

Acadia's New President.

The services in connection with the public inauguration of Rev. George Barton Cutten, Ph. D., as president of Acadia University took place yesterday and were of a very successful and inspiring nature.

The weather was very favorable and a large gathering assembled at 10.30 o'clock in College Hall to participate in the exercises.

The students of the College, Seminary and Academy occupied seats in the body of the hall, and to the strains of the professional skillfully rendered by Prof. Ringwald the long procession of Governors, Senate and Faculty marched in and took seats on the platform.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Webber, after which Dr. Manning, chairman of the Board of Governors, gave a well-wordsed address tracing briefly the history of Acadia, after which he introduced Prof. George Trumbull Ladd, LL. D., of Yale University, who gave an able and most exhaustive address on 'The University and the State.'

An exquisitely rendered vocal solo by Miss Davis, of the Seminary Faculty, Dr. Cutten was duly inaugurated by the chairman.

The inaugural address of Dr. Cutten was on 'Acadia as a denominational college' and was most interesting. It was listened to with close attention by the large audience, and the service then closed by singing the national anthem.

At 1.30 o'clock in the afternoon a banquet was held at the Royal Hotel. About 60 guests sat down to the well arranged table, and did ample justice to the good things provided by Host Goudey. The catering was first-class in every respect and was highly commended on. Mr. I. B. Oakes, Secretary of the Board of Governors, presided and called upon all to rise and drink to the toast of the king, which was followed by the singing of the national anthem. In a neat address the chairman then called upon the following who made suitable addresses: Canon Powell, of Kings College, Dr. Forrest, of Dalhousie; Dr. Allison, of Mt. Allison; Judge Longley, Dr. Mackay, and Dr. Ladd. Dr. Cutten made a few remarks and the banquet ended by singing 'Auld Lang Syne.'

Swallowing a Square Yard of Land. Capacity of swallow varies very much. Most of us have heard of the American who, after a visit to his doctor, told his companion that he had discovered his saw-mill down his throat, added that he was going to get another, but the doctor had advised him this time to run it by water.

Mary a first in drink, and it is a 'out time that working people took some notice of the value of what they are swallowing.

In these days the chief desire of most men is to get a little plot of ground for themselves, on which to build a house, which they can cultivate and call their own.

Why not get this plot of ground? If you only drink a pint of beer a day you swallow enough land in a year to build your house on and give you a respectable sized garden; you swallow 365 square yards of land—a good sized field—for every time you drink 2d of beer or spirits you swallow a yard of good land.

You think this nonsense? Well, listen for a moment. Take the value of an acre of land at £40 (and you ought to get land for that, which is not swallowed would give good crops and feed good cattle year after year) in £40 there are 9,600 pennies, so if you drink costs 2d you may put that in £40 there are 4,800 drinks. Now, in an acre of land there are 4,800 square yards, just a yard to a drink. Just keep this in mind and next time you want a drink say, 'No, I'll keep the land' and put 2d in a saving-box.

And when you have done this six times, put the 2d into the saving-box. And when the shillings have accumulated, you will have little difficulty in becoming a landed proprietor, and you can continue the saving till by means of your building society, you can build a comfortable little cottage. And then continue it, and lay by for old age, so that you can end your days in your own home, amongst your own people, and not in a workhouse.—Hard Facts, Leaflet.

The Catch-My-Pal Crusade in Ireland.
