Our contemporary, while not denying the fact, fails to give a single reason why the taxation has increased forty per cent. in the last eight years.

Such trifling sophistry will deceive no one. Everybody knows that there is a ring majority in the Council that rules the county irrespective of the wishes of the minority.

It is almost absurd to blame the members of this minority for the extravagance practiced by the administration of the majority merely because they have seats in the Council.

Even more absurd is the Chronicle's attempt to hold Councillors Reid, Anderson, Donaldson and Parker responsible for the remarkable increase in the amount paid for the Councillors' services.

From a perusal of the accounts it can readily be seen that the increased deficit is due to more expensive legal services and the total failure of the inspector to collect from the rum-sellers the fines after they had been imposed.

It is really touching to hear the Chronicle, whose traditional attitude in reference to the temperance reform is pretty well understood, exult over the discomfiture of its friends.

From the charge made against the present administration of county affairs, and the weak and halting defence offered to these charges, it is apparent that our unsuspicious matters will stand very serious consideration.

The fact that the Council has increased our current expenditures to three years to the tune of almost \$6,000, and has entailed us in senseless litigation which the county knows from experience with Scott Act matters some high, should furnish the categories of the county with food for thought.

Acadia's New President.

The services in connection with the public inauguration of Rev. George Barton Cutten, Ph. D., as president of Acadia University took place yesterday and were of a very successful and inspiring nature.

The weather was very favorable and a large gathering assembled at 10.30 o'clock in College Hall to participate in the exercises.

The students of the College, Seminary and Academy occupied seats in the body of the hall, and to the strains of the professional skillfully rendered by Prof. Ringwald the long procession of Governors, Senate and Faculty marched in and took seats on the platform.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Webber, after which Dr. Manning, chairman of the Board of Governors, gave a well-wordsed address tracing briefly the history of Acadia, after which he introduced Prof. George Trumbull Ladd, LL. D., of Yale University, who gave an able and most exhaustive address on 'The University and the State.'

An exquisitely rendered vocal solo by Miss Davis, of the Seminary Faculty, Dr. Cutten was duly inaugurated by the chairman.

The inaugural address of Dr. Cutten was on 'Acadia as a denominational College' and was most interesting. It was listened to with close attention by the large audience, and the service then closed by singing the national anthem.

At 1.30 o'clock in the afternoon a banquet was held at the Royal Hotel. About 60 guests sat down to the well arranged table, and did ample justice to the good things provided by Host Goudey. The catering was first-class in every respect and was highly commended on. Mr. I. B. Oakes, Secretary of the Board of Governors, presided and called upon all to rise and drink to the toast of the king, which was followed by the singing of the national anthem. In a neat address the chairman then called upon the following who made suitable addresses: Canon Powell, of Kings College, Dr. Forrest, of Dalhousie; Dr. Allison, of Mt. Allison; Judge Longley, Dr. Mackay, and Dr. Ladd. Dr. Cutten made a few remarks and the banquet ended by singing 'Auld Lang Syne.'
