

"Shipments of aquor in bond through this port from Europe to Canada will be stopped by the decision, announced at Washington today, that the shipment of liquor to one foreign country from another via the United States is illegal according to collector of customs Charles M. Sleeper. More than sixty thousand cases have been received here this winter and tranferred by rail to Montreal and other Canadian points.'

As St. John is the most convenient Canadian port for winter shipments, it is expected that large quantities of barreled and bottled goods will be diverted to this port.

Born in England







Some Eng lish and American authorities take somewhat the same ground. Others of great prominence, declare that Germany is quite able to pay the indemnity demanded of her. They show conclusively that the per capita taxes of Germany are considerably lower than those of Great Britain, France and Italy.

It may be interesting to note that during the next few years in Canada the interest alone on our war debt will amount to fourteen dollars per head per year, or about twice the amount the Germans are asked to pay per head for reducing Europe to ruins. Germany is determined to get clear as far as possible from suffering the punishment due to her crimes against the world, even if she has to grovel and whine to accom plish it, but France and Belgium to whom she showed no mercy are deter

Fire Loses Were Heavy In Canada In 1920

Ottawa, Feb 9-The fire loss in Canada in 1920 was approximately \$27,400,000 equal to about \$3.42 per capita on an 8,000,000 population. \$17.10 per family, according to fig ures made public today by the Commission of Conservation.

"An anlaysis of the fire loss, says the monthly bulletin of the com mission, "discloses certain facts which are not creditable to the business of the country, and, which account in part for our high cost of protection in

Canada, as compared with Europe." One half of the fire waste was caused by 72 fires, practically all in commercial property. Fires causing dam age of \$10,000 and over, numbered 301. The bulletin expresses the opnion that rigid enforcement of the penalties for carelessness in this respect would do more to reduce the fire waste than any other influence that might be brought to bear.

Gold In Nova Scotia

The gold mining interest at one ime exceedingly prosperous in Nova Scotia has for some time been on the wane. Though it cannot be accurately determined when the yellow metal was first discovered, vet under French egime names were given to places such as Bras d'Or, indicate that in an early period of our history gold was found. At a later date than French occupation we find important gold districts flourishing, and interesting incidents are recorded concerning the opening up of these districts.

At Port Dufferin, Halifax Co, a one time a most flourishing gold mining region, and an Indian was the discoverer Hunting for his cow in the forest brought about the Providential opening up of this district. The Indian in search for his lost cow, stumbled over a hillack. The toe of his boot upturned the surface soil, and when he regained his feet specimens of gold bearing quartz rock appeared The Indian's accident gave rise to the opening up of the Port Dufferin region from which large quantities of gold have been taken.

In the year 1853 Capt. C. L. Est ange an army officer on a moos hunting expedition found unmistakable tracks of gold in Tangier. Its discovery caused quite an indux of population, which at one time clmost eached twelve hundred. The late Rev. John Sprott sometimes visited this locality and preached in the open air, the audiences varying from 400 to 800.

Soon in the Counties of Hants Halifax and Guysboro, gold mining districts were opened up, and the quantity produced in 1860 before the adoption of sworn returns was estimated at 6000 ounces. The total declared quantity of gold produced in the Province during twelve years was 337,000 ounces, which valued at four pounds sterling per ounce, was worth £48,000 and the yield was much greater than in Australia...

This interest so flourishing in days gone by, gave employment to a large number of men. At Mount Uniacke in palmy days, not less than 300 men of the sterling manhood of our Pro vince were found there handling pick, shovel and drill. Gold mining in Nova Scotia is now seldom spoken of nor written about. Like ship building it has declined. Whether or not it shall be revived remains to be seen. Its history is not devoid of interest and at one time our mining regions furnished a large contribution to the Province's financial exchequer. To the Antiquarian it affords a theme of some interest, and who knows but ere long a revival may be observed out of the present depression, and ounces of this precious metal may again be produced in the little peninsule by the sounding sea.
