**STRAWBERRY** 

The southern section of vince where large quantities of strawberries are grown, had a heavy rain last Sunday, which the growers say, saved their crops and if the showers continue the pros pects for an average crop are good. The three largest growers in the Sackville district-Tantramar Fruits Ltd.; A.C. Fawcett & Son, and Frank C. Fawcett have between 400 and 500 pickers at work and expect to load 5 or 6 cars for the American markets within the next couple of days.

The smaller growers are equally busy. Several carloads of strawberries were shipped to the American markets last week, in addition to supplying the provincial markets. The strawberry crops from the Upper Provinces, being late this year clashed with the ' Maritime crops with the result that prices were low but there is now a tendency for prices to improve a little. Had it not been for the recent showers one half of this year's crop would have been lost.

RAIN BADLY NEEDED The hay crop has suffered irreparable damage, and grain and root crops have been greatly retarded because of want of rain.

He declared that one of his fellow workers allowed a box of liquor to fall on him causing an injury which necessitated hospital

treatment for some time. Mr. Justice Gibsone declared tha although the p'aintiff did not com plain of the jnjury on the day that ti occurred or on the day following this fact was not sufficient for the court to refuse to believe his statement to the effect that he was injured in the course of his work It been proved how ver said the judge that the plaintiff had been engaged simply to help in the work of handling boxes and cases in the warehouse.
