Canada and The Navy.

Dispatches from Ottawa as well as from London indicate that the conference on imperial defence has resulted in a decision that each colony concerned will maintain, under its own control and direction, a naval force in some way commensurate with its presumed requirements in case of war.

When relief finally came there were but five left alive, four men and a boy and these were exhausted that they had to be carried by the rescuers to the boats.
