TORONTO, April 30.-A profound sen sation was caused here through the discovery of two powerful dynamite cartridges with

WIRE AND FUSE ATTACHED under the Crown Lands office, Parlia ment buildings. They were found by a son of one of the caretakers, about 2.30 this afternoon. A thorough search was then made by the officials, and TWO MORE CARTRIDGES

were found under the steps approaching the Speaker's chamber, having also wire and fuse attached. It was apparent that the dynamite had been placed in position to-day, as the cartridges could not have failed to be discovered had they been there before. The officials state that no suspicious looking persons were seen around to-day or lately. The excitement around the Parliament buildings reigns supreme. The cartridges are about six inches long by an inch and a half in diameter, and are called

THE PRESS PIONEER.

Kingston, April 28.—This morning Dr. E. G. Barker, city registrar, died at the advanced age of 85 years. He was generally considered the father of the Canadian press. In 1834 he founded the British Whig, and in 1849 he began the publication of the Daily British Whig, the first daily in the Daminion. Same twelve years ago he retired from jour-nalistic duties, the paper passing into the control of his grardson, E. J. B. Panse. Last New Year's eve the paper celebrat-ed its 50th anniversary, and the 85th birthday of the veteran editor. 





Enough water is then kept constantly in the saucer to give the sand the consistency of mud, and it is then given a light and a warm place. By this simple means any one can root cuttings of all kinds quickly, and almost without

House plants thrive better in the kitchen than in any other rooms of the house, because of the moister atmosphere that prevails here, as a result of the steam escaping from the stove or range utensals. In green-houses similar but improved conditions exist also, which accounts for the comparative case found in growing plants in these structures. These facts point to the impertance of supplying some moisture in the atmost here wherever there are plants, if we would have fine specimens. Water-ing as freely as is admissible for their health, aponging the leaves all over occasionally, and setting some vessels of water among them, are some of the easy ways of accomplishing this. A suffic-ency of moisture to suit the plants will be not in the least injurious to the health of persons.

Cutting Potatoes for Seed.

J. Barden, of Wells, Vt., gives an interesting account of some experiments he made last summer in planting cut and uncut potatoes. Three rows, each long enough for 125 hills, were planted to Burbank seedlings, one rew with whole seed, one with one piece to the hill, and another with two pieces in a hill. At digging time the single-piece row yielded six bushels, the two-piece row; eight bushels; while the row planted with uncut potatoes produced ten bushels.

These were very marked results, yet, in order to have an experiment of this kind teach all we would like to know about planting cut or uncut potatoes, we ought to know whether the hills were of uniform distance apart in each case, and also whether the pieces were cut to single eyes, or whether they were large also whether the pieces were cut to sain gle eyes, or whether they were large potatoes cut in two. The whole seed, we believe, was from large, selected potatoes. Now, as prices ruled last season wears, included in the wall of the house lanting and harvesting time, it might at planting and narvesting time, it might still be a question which seed was the most economical to plant? Again, seed cut to single eyes should be planted with a great many more hills to the acre, than would be judicious if using large whole seed. If Mr. Barden dropped his single eyes two or three feet apart in the row, we should suspect that he used too little-

seed to obtain a full crop.

The question of whole or cut seed is one that is surrounded with too many difficulties to be answered at once, and for all time.

It has been our aim when discussin the question, rather to study the laws which control the growth of the potato, than to attempt to lay down infallible rules, as guides for action. If one understands the nature of the plant he is cultivating, he will be better able to adopt the conditions to each other than adopt the conditions to each other than may exist at the time. All potatoes are so cheap this apring that those who wish to experiment with large, whole seed, can do so with little exra cost. Our preference is for single eyes, if all other conditions are within control, and we would prefer the pieces should be cut from large, smooth seed; but if the price was high, we weald not object to those which were just below market size. But in either case we would want the rich soil, and in the very finest state of tilth, se that every piece would start and make an early and strong growth. The album in which specimens of the various counterfeits discovered are pre-served, also contains some interesting proofs of the extraordinary darability of the notes. There are three notes for brown, and that is the only effect their long exposure to salt water has had. We are shown in a small case covered with a magnifying-glass a few charred fragments of paper for which the Bank paid £1400. 
