It is hinted that McLean is ambitious regarding the position held by Mr. Borden, but that he has no support beyond himself. There are several others who would like the position—which, by the way, is worth \$9,500 a year—but they have no following. How it will "pan out" is a question no person can at present answer. But it is likely D. W. P. will tell us all about it after it comes to pass.

In London for Entertainments During Roosevelt's Visit.

London, April 10.—The first State Ball of the season, at Buckingham Palace, will take place at an earlier date than usual, to enable an invitation to be extended to Mr. Roosevelt and his family. So many splendid entertainments are projected by Anglo-American hostesses in honor of the Roosevelt visit that it is said \$15,000,000 will be spent in London that way during their visit, and the coming season will be one of the most brilliant on record.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Coffee pots and teapots in which borax water is boiled two or three times a week are purified and entirely free from musty taste and odor.

When anything has burned in the double boiler, instead of replenishing the steamer part with hot water, use cold water for the same effect.

Vaseline rubbed into the eyebrows will make them grow heavier and darker. For the same reason it should never be rubbed anywhere else on the face.

To remove the odour of fish or onions from pans, wash in good soda, then place pan inverted over the flame of the gas range or put in hot oven for a few minutes.

To warm over oysters left from patties, add a little milk and a little fresh seasoning and heat them in a small saucepan in a vessel of boiling water.

Cut a couple of pieces about an inch long from an old garden hose and slip them over the faucets and you will save many necks in china and such things.

Bites of insects as well as summer rashes will cease to give pain if bathed in borax water, and it is also quite efficacious in curing burns, scalds and wounds.

When without ice and desiring to make pies in warm weather, measure the required amount of lard and cold water and beat them together until the lard is cooled.

Bicycle cement will repair holes in tire bags, but should not be used for

Hot water bottles. Nothing short of vulcanizing will repair the latter so as to resist hot water.

If you have not a fish kettle and strainer for boiling a fish whole, try the expedient of placing the fish on a plate and putting the plate and all on a piece of cheesecloth.

When the hands get hot and uncomfortably moist it is a good idea to wash them in hot water and then rinse them in cold water to which a desertspoonful of borax has been added.

When milk is burned, pour it at once into a pitcher and stand it in a basin of cold water until it is cool, when it will be found to be quite free from the burned smell and taste.

A delicious salad is made by paring large, sweet peaches. Cut a section from the top of each and carefully remove the stone; fill the cavity with mayonnaise and serve in lattice cups.

A Second Chamber.

Lord Rosebery's plan to modify the composition of the membership without an express enactment dealing with its relation of the House of Commons.

The Rosebery plan appears to be at the first glance only a generous surrender of the legislative rights of the hereditary peers of the United Kingdom. Its effect will be far different. It takes away from the Crown its ancient and unlimited prerogative of creating members of the House of Lords and destroys the only effective means known to the Constitution of bringing the House of Lords into subjection to the Will of the People as declared at the polls. If the Ministry and the House of Commons should suffer the Crown to be deprived of this ancient right, exercised on the advice of a Ministry responsible to the House of Commons and in the last resort to the Electorate, and should substitute nothing as effective in its place, the Electorate would be deprived of its sole Political Sovereignty.

There would be established a competing political sovereign, co-ordinate in power with the present electorate. This new Sovereign would be the hereditary peers and their associates who would exercise the new House of Lords franchise. There would be two political sovereigns; one representing land, beer, banks, shipping, trade, a ring of capitalists; the other representing the common people.

Premier Asquith's plan is however far different. He proposes to weaken the power of the class Rosebery is endeavouring to strengthen. He is not concerned at present with the composition of the House of Lords. He is trying to take away from the House of Lords all control over Money Bills, and by this means to strengthen the power of the People. He is also desirous of limiting the power of the House of Lords over other legislation.

Yesterday we set forth reasons why some modifications is desirable in his proposal that three times of asking by the Commons in the same Parliament should be sufficient to place any legislation on the Statute book.

If Premier Asquith is successful with his bill to lessen the power of the House of Lords, he proposes after-

At the regular weekly meeting of the City Council held last night almost a full board was present. Mayor Gibbs presided.

The residents of King's Road asked for water. The Engineer will report on this also.

P. J. Hatton will be allowed to erect a shed on Clapp's ground for advertising purposes for one month only.

The plans of a garage for the Reid Nfld. Co. were approved, also plans of houses for E. Dawe, LeMarchant Road; E. Holwell, Gear Street. Mr. Murgford will be requested to submit plans of the building he is about to erect.

The Water Waste Inspector reported that there were quite a number of defective sewers to houses on New Gover Street and also leaky water pipes. The owners will be requested to have repairs made.

The Engineer reported on repairs to Cochrane Street sewer. Widening of Harvey Road would begin next week, also laying pipes on Cabot St. After passing the weekly reports the meeting closes.

Six Dead From Poisoned Whisky.

Westerly, R.I., April 9.—Six deaths within the last few days, all apparently from poisoning as a result of whiskey drinking are to be investigated by the authorities.

Following the death last Thursday of Henry Larrow and Chas. R. Hood, Larrow's son-in-law, it was discovered that two women had died under similar circumstances within a day or two, and two more deaths ascribed to the same cause occurred. Wm. D. Perrin of Ashaway, four miles from here succumbed this evening to an illness which began last night after he had taken some whiskey, and at 2.30 to-night Edward Doherty of this city was added to the death list. Doherty was said to have purchased some liquor in Westerly for a cold, he took some of it last night and soon after became ill.

Two Workmen Crushed to Death.

SOUTH ROYALSTON, Mass., April 9.—Trapped within the huge bore, two men were carried down to death when four sections, each 3½ feet long, of a huge concrete chimney at the local plant of the American Woolen Co. collapsed to-day, and hurled down seventy feet to the ground. Louis Fornier, 25 years old, was dead when taken from the debris. Wm. Gray, 54 years old, of Bridgeton, Maine, died on a train while being rushed to Greenfield Hospital. Both men received terrible injuries.

A pathetic feature of the accident is that the chimney which was being built by a Chicago firm, was in charge of Chas. A. Gray, of Bridgeton, and a son of one of the victims.

The victims were at work within the upper part of the chimney when it crushed down carrying them with it. The cause of the accident is not known, but is supposed that the sections destroyed had not hardened sufficiently to withstand the weight of the men. Fornier leaves a wife and two children, and Gray two sons and a daughter.

The United States and Newfoundland Questions before the Tribunal at the Hague.

America has always been the chartered libertine of diplomacy. No other nation would venture to put forward such preposterous claims as she advances. In 1818 at Ghent the American envoys representing a foreign nation claimed the same fishery rights all over British North America as when they were Colonials. Every dodge was used to put off the meeting at the Hague, and now when the time is at last fixed negotiations are started for a Reciprocity Treaty. Is the intention honest? I believe so, because just at this time there is a determined public outbreak against the corrupt Protectionists Ring and the Trusts. We see proof of this in the combination of Democratic and Liberal Republicans who depised the Protectionist Autocrat Speaker, Tom Cannon. It is the same power now that is working for Reciprocity.

To those who have a knowledge of the principles of International Law, the questions that are coming up before the Hague Tribunal present no great and difficult points for solution:

(1) The inhabitants of the United States have only ordinary fishing rights on our coasts. That they are not in any way extensive is proved conclusively by two facts: The rights granted to the French around the same shores, and the plain general language of the Treaty.

(2) The Americans claim to be free and immune from the payment of light dues, entry at the Custom House and our Regulations to prevent the destruction of the fishery. In this position they are opposed to all their own great jurists and statesmen, who have constantly advised them to conform to all reasonable local laws. The most important point on this subject is the question of Sovereignty. Because a nation makes a treaty with another power, it does not except by express words abrogate its sovereign rights. In this treaty as in the one with the French the sovereign rights are expressly set forth: "The island of Newfoundland shall belong of right wholly to Great Britain." By international law the sovereign power has at all times the right to protect its revenue from smuggling, and in consequence to make all foreign vessels coming into its ports to enter at the Custom House in the usual way. Under the same rule all foreign vessels using its sea lights when they come within our jurisdiction must pay the usual light dues. In the comity of nations there are of course limits to the exercise of the sovereign power under a treaty with a foreign nation. Customs, light dues, &c., must be general regulations of a reasonable character, and of general application, alike to the foreigner and the resident. All our regulations and laws applicable to the coast will bear this test. The contention of the Americans on these points are absurd, and no European jurist would listen to them for a moment.

(3) As to the rights of Americans to employ foreign fishermen on our coasts. This is expressly forbidden by the Treaty, which gives the fishery rights on our coasts solely to "inhabitants of the United States," and we have absolute authority by law to make our own people, within our own territory, obey our laws.

(4) The territorial or landing rights given to the Americans under the Treaty of Ghent are very clearly and strictly defined. They are four—obtain water, buy firewood, shelter from storms, and a port for repairs, and for no other purpose whatsoever. That they should enter at the Custom House and pay light dues is quite clear, following the arguments I have laid down.

In my next I will discuss the headland question—on the former points that I have discussed our position is simply impregnable—on the same principles as I have laid down: We have the right to make general regulations applicable to all alike to prevent the wanton destruction of our coast fisheries.

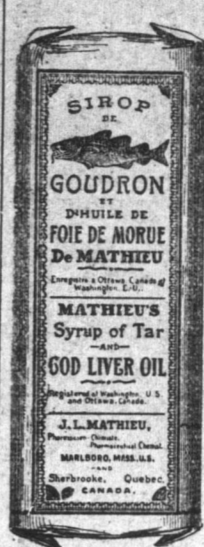

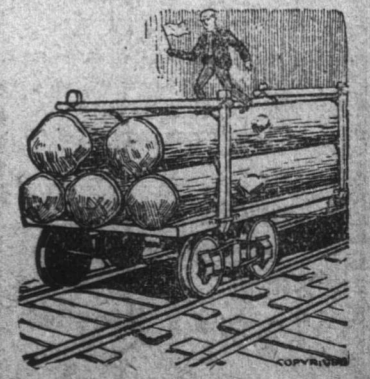

LONDON, April 11.—Oxford men have not escaped the lynx eye of the Tailor and Cutter expert who goes about seeking metaphorical holes in the clothing of the nation's gentlemen. In a recent issue of that paper it is stated that many of the Oxford students show a lamentable lack of common sense in their dress, or, at any rate, certain parts of it. LONDON, April 15. Arthur J. Balfour, in the House of Commons in a letter to one of his supporters said that after a consultation with his colleagues he has reached the conclusion that under the fiscal policy of the Unionists, wheat grown within the Empire should be imported free of duty.

Big Lock-Out.

BERLIN, April 15. A lock-out in the building trades of Germany began at 6 o'clock this evening. Between fifty thousand and two hundred thousand workers already are known to be affected, but reports have not yet arrived at headquarters. Although the employers of Berlin, Hamburg and Bremen have not yet participated in the movement, and negotiations for a peaceful settlement are continuing, the lock-out is a most widespread one. Bitter feeling divides the employers and employees. Most of the contractors are determined to work for the defeat of the Trades Unions. It is estimated that ten per cent. of the employers have declined to join the lock-out being in sympathy with the men's demands. The building material manufacturers have joined forces with the employers in several cities in resolving not to deliver materials to those employers not obeying the lock-out.

Terrific Explosion.

HAMBURG, April 15. A terrific explosion occurred in a building in the warehouse district this afternoon. Several persons were killed and three great warehouses were set on fire. Many casks of oil were stored in the buildings.

Balloon Hall Collapses.

MUNICH, April 15. Two men were killed and six severely injured yesterday by the collapse of a balloon hall which was under construction for the Perseval. As a consequence the airship passenger traffic has been postponed indefinitely.

Roosevelt Reception.

LONDON, April 15. At a special meeting of a Committee of the London Corporation it was decided that the Guild Hall reception to Mr. Roosevelt should be held on May 31st, instead of May 25th, as previously announced.

For Channel Flight.

PARIS, April 15. The new Dirigible Balloon, Bayard Clement the Second, which is being built by a private company near Paris will, according to an official note just issued, be purchased by the French Government. The balloon will soon attempt a flight between Paris and London. England was represented to be a possible buyer.

Four Dreadnoughts.

VIENNA, April 15. In the Reichstag the Finance Minister admitted that the Government was going to build four additional Dreadnoughts. He added, however, that he had not yet advanced a farthing for such purposes.

Chinese Riots.

Special to Evening Telegram.

HANKOW, April 15. The situation at Changsha, the capital of Hanan, is most grave. The rioting began by the natives in revenge for the action of Chinese officials in cornering and controlling the export of rice. The Governor's Yamen, in which the missionaries had sought refuge, was set on fire by the rioters and destroyed. The missionaries and other foreigners fled and were taken aboard a merchant steamer in the harbor. The British Consulate and Custom offices have been abandoned, and two more British gunboats are hurrying to the scene. No fatalities are reported. The properties known to have been destroyed are the buildings of the China Inland Mission of the Methodist China Inland Mission and Norwegian Mission.

Excursion Projected.

A meeting was held by one of the city amusement clubs last night to discuss the proposal of having an excursion to Botwoodville the coming summer. The idea is to go to Botwoodville in one of the "Venture" steamers and there take the train for Bishop Falls and Grand Falls where they will spend the day.

Trades & Labor Council Is the World to End?

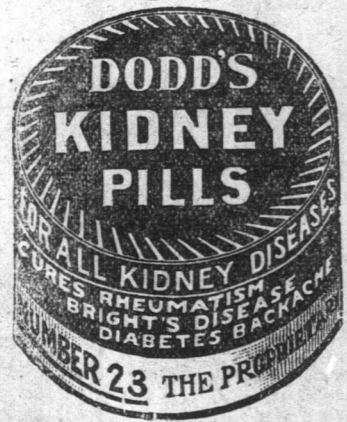

The mails take three and four days from Carbonear to this place, notwithstanding that we have four couriers to go that distance, and letters have in several cases been eight and nine days reaching St. John's. The present daily mails are only a nuisance, unless some arrangements are made to accelerate the movements of the couriers. Under the Liberal Government our mail system was conducted in a manner satisfactory to the public and we had no cause to complain. The present system is giving considerable dissatisfaction and causing great inconvenience to the public generally, and we trust that the members for this district will give their immediate attention to this important matter without delay, as it is certainly unjust to have our mails lying up two and three nights on the North Shore. Cave In at Tilt Cove Mine.

By letters received this mail we learn that there has been a cave-in in the open cut at Tilt Cove Mine, and only the fact that the men working there happened to be attending John Warren's funeral prevented a disastrous loss of life.
Particulars of the accident to Warren say that he sustained compound fracture of leg and arm and some broken ribs, one of which pierced the lung. Dr. Smith attended him, amputated arm and set the broken leg and ribs, but he died 22 hours after.
The mine stopped working till Monday, and it is fortunate they did so as part of the wall just over where they had been working fell, burying and making it now necessary to climb over the brow to get to the mine. A big pillar of valueless black iron stands now in the way, and six men are engaged blasting. If it falls the right way another years work is probable, but if the wrong way its mass of some 15,000 tons may completely block any further work.
The main deposits are now nearly worked out, and although considerable prospecting has been done, nothing has come of it. It is reported that the Cape Copper Co. are to acquire Bate Verte. There is also a report that something good has been found at S. W. Arm of Green Bay, and that we may hope for a mine there soon. However, Tilt Cove may not be as near done as reported, for it has been going to close eight years and is not closed up yet.—The Sun.

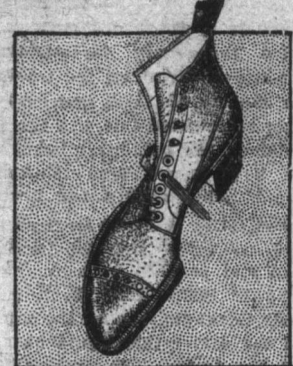
