

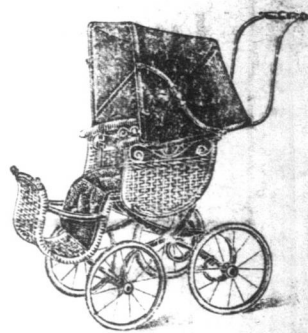

## Linking up the Advertiser with the Dealer.

By M. S. Olds, Advertising Manager of Stein-Block Clothing.

Few people can be found to-day who will dispute the power of judicious advertising. It is looked upon as a prime factor in business success. The merchant who does not advertise is considered a back number by his associates. Advertising has seized hold of the tools of civilization and wrought strongly with them. The printing press is its knight errant and the electric current its torch. Yet advertising is by no means easy to define. I think, if you should ask me to define advertising off-hand, I should say that advertising is the science of promoting distribution.

Now I am not intending in this paper to lay down for you a set of rules that will prove an infallible guide to anybody with so important a problem confronting him. That would be impossible, for the great questions of distribution require special investigation and special treatment, each according to its needs. What I do want to do is to call your attention to a few fundamental working principles that cover in a general and practical way one or two features of successful distribution. I have called my subject, "Linking Up with the Dealer," and I am going to try to tell you a few practical things that may help you in something out the road.

Of course, you must advertise. This can be done in most of the nationally circulated mediums that have been brought into being and continue to be fatly nourished by advertising. The newspapers can help you tremendously to achieve victory in that wonderful battle against indifference, which we call publicity.

There is no profession in which more can be learned from hard experience than advertising. Some of you may be advertising next some day, and I want you to remember these little points that have come up in the course of the day's work:

First and Always—Let whatever you send or write to your customer be as safe and honest as the checks that carry your firm's signature.

Second—Answer your customer's letters the same day they are received. You will earn his respect and his gratitude.

Third—Be frank with him and try to write to him just as you would talk to him, as one honest man to another.

Fourth—Answer his questions minutely and carefully. Sometimes they may seem insignificant to you, but to him they are very important.

Fifth—Do not try to get something from him for nothing. Do not permit him to expect something from you for nothing.

Sixth—Remember that he is probably just as good a fellow as you are, and that he is quick to detect a shortcoming in you and your work.

Eighth, Ninth and Tenth—Be on the square with him from one year's end to the other—and use Common Sense.

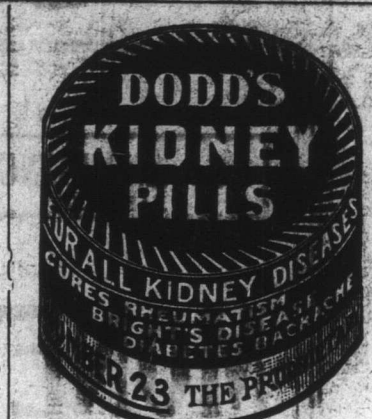

**Over the Falls in a Barrel.**

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 26.—Bobby Leach went over the falls yesterday in a barrel and survived with nothing worse than a number of painful cuts.

The exploit was witnessed by hundreds of people and when the reckless navigator was at last rescued from his iron cage shaped barrel there was a cheer and a feeling of relief that showed how impossible it has been felt that the feat could be accomplished.

It was one o'clock when it was reported that Leach would really attempt the perilous feat of going over the Horseshoe Falls in his barrel. At 2.25 p.m. the launch which had Leach in tow cut the barrel adrift a short distance below Hog Island, Chippewa.

The course had been well chosen for the barrel kept in the channel and gradually drew towards the power house. Opposite the shops of the Ontario Power Company the rocks pounded the queer structure and Bobby got a nasty shaking as the barrel was rolled over rapidly, but his worst experience, next to the actual drop over the Falls, was after leaving the Toronto Power House, and when in direct line for the Horseshoe Falls, the barrel struck a rock with such a force that the cigar shaped wooden end broke off, and Leach's head was

knocked against the side of the barrel and badly bruised, and his right ear cut.

Over the Cataract.

At exactly 3.12 p.m. the crowd saw the barrel reach the brink of the mighty cataract and disappear in the depths to re-appear minus the other wooden end, in the seething cauldron below the Falls. Contrary to expectations the barrel didn't enter the eddy which carried the others in near the Falls, but swept past the Ontario Power House and then washed around too far for those waiting to reach it until

Mr. Bender took a rope, sprang in to the water fully dressed and quickly reached the barrel, which he pulled in with the assistance of those on shore.

Leach Badly Injured.

All this time the watchers and people at the top of the gorge were anxiously awaiting news of how it had fared with the daring navigator. Many believed that he must be dead.

As soon as the barrel touched the shore a man tapped on with a hammer and a great shout went up as an answering tap came from the man inside. The iron manhole was quickly removed and Leach was found to be in fairly good condition. He was assisted from the barrel. It was thought he had broken his left leg. A stretcher

was quickly secured and the injured man carried to one of the ambulances near at hand where oxygen was administered. Dr. Wilson after an examination declared no fractures had been sustained, but that both knees were badly cut. In explaining the injuries Leach said he had proper protection for his head and was using his feet as a wedge, but in going over the Falls he went feet first and the jar he got when the barrel struck threw his knees against the side. One of the first things he said after being laid on the floor of the shanty, was "Somebody send to my wife and tell her I am alright."

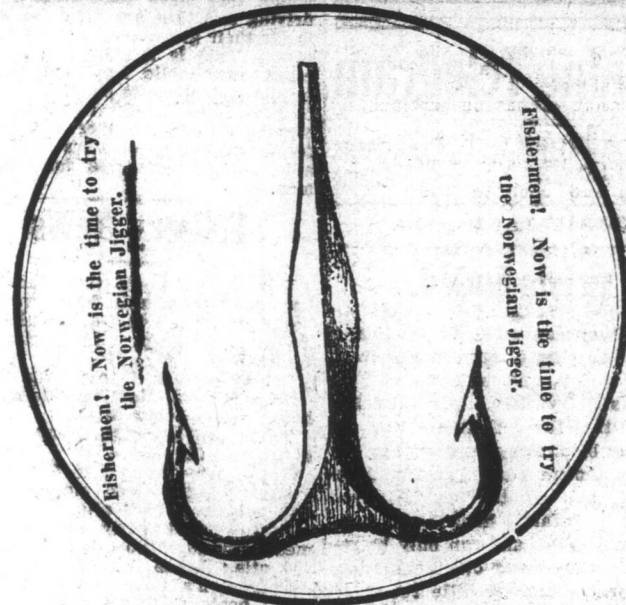

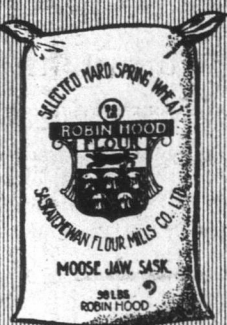

### Crisis Ended.

"The Moroccan crisis is practically ended." So runs a late message from London to-day, and welcome will be the news everywhere. It is pleasing to learn that the difficulties can be overcome by diplomatic means, and that the interests though complicated will be adjusted by negotiations, however prolonged. "War is hell," and cannot be welcomed, and can only be resorted to when every other effort has failed. There can be little room for doubt that the political strife in Britain encouraged Germany to believe that Britain was in no position to take a firm stand. Especially did this appear when the unprecedented display of partisan bitterness occurred last Monday night in the House of Commons, but Germany misconstrued the appearance of things. However far British partisanship will go and it has gone outrageously far in connection with the Parliament Bill, there is a limit to it, and that limit was reached when Germany presumed to take advantage of it. Then indeed a change was seen. First of all, the pro-Beer, Quaker-associate, Lloyd George speaks in martial strain to Germany. Next out of partisan chaos, order springs, and Balfour joins Asquith in making plain that Government and Opposition are as one in face of national danger, and even MacDonald cannot brook that the spirit of the nation shall be broken by Germany.

Daniel O'Connell, the great Irish statesman, reformer and lawyer, frequently said that he could drive a coach and four through the laws enacted in his day. Judging from the acts passed by the renowned split government of Newfoundland one could drive something larger than a coach and four through them. Such stupidity on the part of legislators is disgraceful.

### Tourists Complain.

We learn that letters and even telegrams were received to-day from tourists who were here on the Stephano and Florial complaining of the excessive rates charged these people by St. John's. This summer has specially evidenced the fact that our tourist traffic is quickly growing and that a few years hence it will be a valuable asset for the Colony. However if our visitors continue to act so unfairly to strangers arriving here we will soon see a falling off in the number of visitors coming to our shores. The people who have complained, very much aggrieved over the manner in which they have been treated while driving and they are fully determined to air their grievance in the American press. This is a matter which concerns our public men and business people and pressure should be brought to bear immediately to impel the Municipal Council to meet and arrange for the formation of a just and equitable schedule of fares for our cabmen.

Reception at Bell Island

Such Enthusiasm Never Witnessed on the Iron Isle.

At noonday on Thursday, July 27th, the tooting of the whistles of the D. I. & S. C. and Nova Scotia Co. together with the loud reports of many firearms from crowds gathered on the Beach, and the blasting operations, specially arranged for the occasion on the cliff over looking the eastern end of the island, announced that His Excellency Monsignor Stearn and party were nearing the island on board the magnificent yacht Fife.

The Beach, hill, streets in vicinity and meadows were crowded, and fully 4,000 thousand people must have witnessed the landing of the Papal Delegate. As the yacht neared the wharf it was noticed that His Excellency was accompanied by His Grace Archbishop Howley, Bishops March and Power, Monsignors Sinnott, Reardon and Vetch and several clergy including our esteemed pastor, Fr. McGrath, who had met the party at Portugal Cove. Cheers were given for His Excellency, The Archbishop, both Bishops, the Clergy, His Majesty King George V. The party were met by the committee of Catholic citizens of the Island of which Magistrate Power was Chairman. A splendid double tram was awaiting His Excellency, and accompanied by a huge procession including over 30 carriages and 4,000 people the party proceeded to St. Joseph's Hall amidst many salutes and loud cheers. Six arches suitably decorated had been erected for the occasion, and bunting was displayed everywhere. On arrival at the terminus of Chapel and Main Streets the procession opened ranks and His Excellency and party drove through accompanied by great cheers. Arriving before the Hall they were met by the Ladies' Committee of which Mrs. O'Donnell was President. The school children had assembled there, and robed in pure white, carrying baskets of flowers, the children strewed flowers comprising yellow and white and colours before His Excellency. On entering the Hall the party were escorted to the stables, and an address was presented to His Excellency by Magistrate Power, to which His Excellency replied in a neat speech. The hall was thronged and thousands were unable to gain admission. After the presentation Benediction was imparted by His Lordship Bishop Power, and it is no exaggeration to say that the beautiful church of St. Michael's, built a few years ago by Fr. McGrath, never held such a large congregation within its sacred precincts. His Excellency gave the Papal Blessing in the Hall, and after the party had been photographed by the usual many camera bands, they were entertained by Rev. J. J. McGrath at luncheon.

About 2 p.m. the party set out for the mines and were accompanied by some 20 carriages all carrying banners and draped with Papal colours. While the procession passed Murphy's Hotel the C. C. C. Band who had just arrived from St. John's, being delayed unavoidably at Kellgrens, played suitable music. Arriving near the entrance to the Dominion office and opposite Burke Bros. the first arch erected by the employees of the D. I. & S. Co. and bearing amongst the many mottos "The Mines Tribute," was met. Here several hundred people had congregated and the arrival of the ecclesiastical party was announced by a volley of musketry. On behalf of the miners in a neat speech, Mr. F. J. Jardine presented His Excellency with a large bouquet of the Papal colours. The party accompanied by Mr. J. J. McDougall, C. E. with the D. I. & S. Co., where shown through the large power plant of the concern, after which the party drove to the N. S. mine hoist, said to be one of the largest steam hoists on this side of the Atlantic. On the way they passed through three more arches, one erected by the Basha family, another the "Syrian Tribute" and another by the employees of the N. S. Co.; while the party were proceeding around the whistles of the D. I. & S. Co. and N. S. Co. power plants and steam shovels were blowing full blast, while volley after volley of musketry was also fired off. When the hoist had been visited the procession drove around the principal streets of the Mines passing in front of the R. C. Church and Hall. As the procession drove out Main Street en route to the Beach the Delegate gave his blessing to the crowd assembled. At the top of the Beach Hill the C. C. C. Band joined in the procession and discoursed splendid music on the march. Arriving at the Beach the celebrated party embarked immediately for Harbor Grace, and with the band playing the Pope's March, the masses cheering, the whistles tooting, and volleys of musketry resounding, His Excellency departed after having received an ovation and reception the equals of which was never known before on Bell Island.

Recollections of Regattas.

"IN THE GOOD OLD DAYS GONE BY."

Forty years ago, on the 3rd August, 1871—after an interval of eleven years, during which no Regatta was held here—the boats used on Quidi Vidi Lake were white and jolly boats; the gigs built by Lewis and others, and rowed in previous Regattas, having entirely disappeared. The racing in 1871, however, were remarkably well contested. The whole space on the north side of the Lake, from the water to the main road, was literally packed with spectators, between eight and ten thousand people being present, including two excursion parties, one from the "Bay Metropolis," the other from Carbonear. Although liquor was sold in pretty well all the tents, yet it is worthy of note that no serious accident of any kind occurred during the day. Then, again, there was comparatively little actual drunkenness among "the boys" who indulged. In those days they knew when and where to "draw the line," and so, as Burns happily puts it, "they were not full, but just had plenty."

In 1872—the year following—another very successful Regatta was held on the historic Lake, when Lewis the Pilot's boat took the two silver prizes—a tea urn and a coffee urn. These were given by a Mr. Wilson, manager of the Theatrical Company then playing at the Avalon Rink. That evening the public house opposite the Rink was destroyed by fire, and Mr. R. J. Parsons, editor of the Patriot newspaper, who lives next door, suffered considerable loss in consequence.

On the 8th of August, I think it was, that same year, 1872, a scull race took place on the harbor, the course being from the "Queen's Wharf" to "Chain Rock and back; the contestants the change boat and "row it again." The two rival oarsmen on this occasion were Mr. James Fletcher, storekeeper at Messrs. J. & W. Stewart's, and Mr. John Hayward, book-keeper at the Commercial Bank. The latter won easily in both heats. It was the first scull race on record here and the reward of the victor was a very beautiful silver tea urn.



**Particulars of Death of John Wall.**

The friends of Mr. John Wall, of Harbor Main, had more particulars by Saturday's mail, of the fearful death which overtook him at Northern Ontario. He worked at the Porcupine in the West Dome mine, and shortly after going to Porcupine secured a claim which his friends believe is of considerable value. A friend of his named McCourt, of Antigonish, who worked with him for 13 years near Butte City, went with him to Cobalt and thence to Porcupine, so that it was he who furnished the friends of the deceased with particulars as to his death. When the configuration swept near Porcupine and the other mining towns and camps it was driven by a wind which had a velocity of 60 miles an hour and nothing could withstand it. McCourt with others took refuge in the waters of a lake and thereby saved themselves, but poor Wall with other miners under the direction of an experienced old miner named Weiss went into the shaft of the West Dome Mine and one of them emerged from it alive. They were all either suffocated or burned when the smoke and fire rushed down the shaft or killed by the terrific explosion which occurred there. Mr. Wall's body, however, was not disfigured, and his corpse was found at the bottom of a shaft with several other fellow miners. Mr. McCourt secured his trunk and effects and is sending them on here to his friends. In a list of the dead published in the Montreal Herald his name appears and his address is given as Butte City, Montana.

**Jumped Overboard.**

At 8 o'clock Saturday evening a young chap named Norman, who resides on Henry Street, caused a sensation by rushing from his house down through McMurdo's Lane and down on Ayre & Sons wharf where he jumped over the head of the pier into the waters of the harbor. It was fortunate that the schooner Hattie Bess was laying at the pier else Norman would have drowned. Her skipper, Edward Peckford jumped into a boat and saved the man who it is thought intended to commit suicide. He was taken to the station by the police and his mother furnished him with dry apparel. He had been quarrelling with his brother and ran away from home. He believed that he followed him closely and decided the only way to get clear of him was to jump overboard.

**Cable News.**

NEW YORK, July 30. A London cable to the Times says, that while European opinion is practically unanimous that the Moroccan trouble has taken a distinct turn for the better, it is learned on good authority that a move is in contemplation by the British and French Governments which might capably make the situation one of far greater tension than it has yet been since the Panther arrived at Agadir. This highly dangerous move is to despatch to Agadir British and French warships of equal tonnage and armament to the Panther and Berlin. In case either of these German vessels, or both as the case may be, are not withdrawn from the Moroccan port by a date yet to be fixed. As before cabled, it was decided, jointly, by the British and French Governments, after the news of the Panther's arrival at Agadir was received, to take steps of this kind. The decision, however, was not put into execution, one consideration being that it might be regarded as provocative. Keen regrets have been expressed in various English quarters that such a step was not at once taken.

**Did Good Work.**

Head Const. Peet and the officers who were with him fighting the forest fires out near the Freshwater Road, arrived back at 8 p.m. Saturday. There was a large stretch of woodland on fire when the men went there Friday, and that night and Saturday they worked hard to keep it from advancing on cottages, barns and stables. Their efforts were successful and the rain of Saturday evening and night did much to quench the fires which raged in several sections of the country.

**Overcome by Gas.**

Saturday at 2 p.m. as Mr. Edward Ellis, foreman of the Gas Co., was supervising work at the gas mains on King's Road, after tapping a hole in the pipe the plug was not replaced as quickly as it might have been, and Mr. Ellis, who was near the cut, inhaled the fumes and was so much overcome that he fell in the trench. Men hurried to his aid, took him out of the cut and kept slowly walking him up and down the street until the air revived him. Sergt. Mackey and others were quickly on the scene on learning of the matter and gave their best efforts to bring Mr. Ellis around.

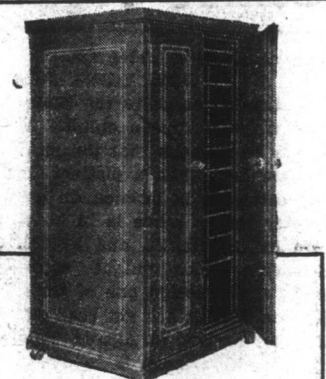

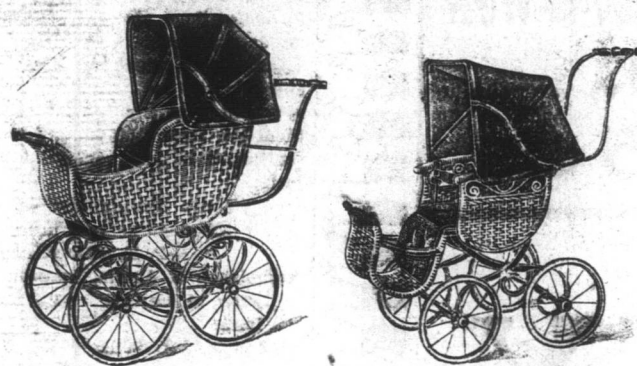
