





#### Bulgarians Cut Off Turk's Water Supply

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON. To-day The water supply of Constantinop was cut off to-day by a large Bulgar-ian force at Derkas and Tchatalja from which the water supplying the Turkish capital is drawn. It is stated that Bulgarians occupied the re gion between Tchorlu and Tchatalja and completely surrounded the Turkcolumn formed of detachments from marching on Kavala, a seaport in the Aegean Sea. The column includes Bulgarians from Kuruk and Greeks from Yenid Vardar and Salonica.

#### **Turks Begging** for Mediation.

Special to Evenng Telegram. LONDON, To-day. If as reported the Bulgarian attack on Tchatalia forts has already begun doubtless the Turks may be fighting small engagements with a view to de-laying the Bulgarian advance, but it is hardly likely the Bulgarian army is sufficiently recovered afer its recent exertions to undertake a sustained battle. The Bulgarians are now long distance from their base of sup plies. A four days' battle must have necessitated a renewal of supplies food and ammunition. That part of the Servian army has been called the aid of the Bulgarians is held by some to indicate the Bulgarians real ize it will be no easy task to reduce Constantinople. The Porte is redoubling their efforts to save the capit tal, and has made a second appeal to France for mediation, but there is no sign the Powers will move in the matter, unless the Allied States make similar appeal. Photographs of otters and water birdsof various kinds have recently been obtained with a moving-picture camera by Dr. Francis Ward, of Ispwisch, Eng. In order to secure the pictures and remain unobserved by the animals, Dr. Ward built a concrete tank fitted with a window and mounted his camera in an underground room behind the aperature. Among the pictures obtained are hose of an otter engaged in a fish hunt, herons, penguins, black-backed gull and a water hen. The penguin was observed as a fisher, the photographs disclosing clearly how the bird uses its wings as oars both on the surface and while under the water. The air bubbles in the feathers of the water hen convert it into a mirror in which are reflected the colors of its surroundings. The fish are seen swimming around the legs of the heron which piece of carelessness enables the bird to gain a square meal with-

NEW YORK, To-day. was elected President and Thomas R. Marshall, Vice President, by sweeping majorities. They carried the country by a majority that will pass the 350 mark in the Electoral College with its total of 531 votes. The size of the popular Democratic majority is yet uncertain. Wilson Taft, 6. The next Congress will be Democratic with big Democratic majority in the House of Representa-tives, and the Senate will probably be Democratic, In nearly every State Taft ran third, Roosevelt apparently capturing the large majority of the old Republican vote. Democrats swept New York and elected Salzer Governor. New York gave Wilson a plurality over Taft of about 205,000. Wilson's vote in the State was 698,000, Taft's, 493,000, Roosevelt's, 419,000. Roosevelt carried Illinois by about 75,000; Ohio, Taft's own State went overwhelmingly for Wilson, electing Cox for Governor. Wilson not only carried Massachusetts by a great ma-

souri. As the night advanced returns from the West began to come. These early estimates were confirmed, Montana, New Jersey, New Mexico were added to those that seemed certain for the Democratic candidates, while attering returns from San Francis-Los Angelos made it probable that California might join the Wilson-Marshall column. Rhode Island also became a doubtful State on the re-turns near midnight, based on better reports. Early returns gave an apparent victory for Taft in New Hampshire and Vermont, but the Taft pluralities dwindled as midnight approached to a very few hundred votes in each State and they seemed likely has apparently 33 States, Roosevelt, 9, in Utah as reflected in dispatches up to midnight gave indications that the State might be carried for Taft. Making the boomerang perform igure eight in the air is compara ively a common feat and all sorts of omplicated figures are produced, in cluding a double eight. The test of a sure thrower is to make the stick ome back obediently to his feet af er engaging in these flights, so he will only have to stoop to pick it up. One very useful throw which is often used by the natives in hunting wild fowl and other small animals consists of standing behind some parrier which cuts off the view and hen hurling the instrument in a lirection away from the game so that it turns in its flight and goes straight among them, where it perorms a number of gyrations and is retty sure to cause considerable

In throwing the instrument mor mack than actual muscle is requird, though the movement must be apid and straight. It is thrown at an angle usually of about 45 degrees n the air, and just as it leaves the hand it is given a slight upward ierk which imparts to it a spining motion. It is this spinning motion the curve of a thrown baseball, that roduces the eccentric results.

## Man-Eating Tigers.

About four thousand men were eaten by tigers in India between 1900 and 1904. A large proportion of these unfortunates perished during periods of famine, when the beasts are made bold by hunger and are driven to the plains in search of water. The deaths caused by tigers in India constitute thirty-seven per cent. of the whole number due to wild beasts. All tigers are not man eaters, but when a tiger has once tasted man's flesh he will not be content until he has had more of it. Where flocks and herds abound, however, man is rarely a victim of the tiger. An old man eater is usually very clever and tricky and can avoid the most skilful hunters. 
