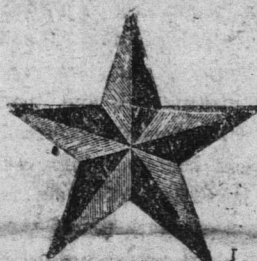

Well, then, if you should lend a friend some small sum of money and he, with the best intentions in the world, should forget all about the debt, would you remind him of it or let it go?

Chorus of answers, "Let it go, of course."

Apparently, this is one of the cases where the rule of "As Ye Would" is considered to have no force.

—Once upon a time a very funny thing along this line happened. Two young girls—well, call them Eleanor and Grace, because these were not their names—were in town shopping. Eleanor fell short of money, and of course Grace promptly opened her purse to her friend, who dipped into it to the extent of \$1, after ascertaining that it would not embarrass Grace and promising to return it the next day at church. The next day was a rainy Sunday; neither of the girls went to church; the debt was not paid, and, as Grace happened to have plenty of money just then, was forgotten by both.

A week or two later Eleanor telephoned to Grace to remind her that it was the birthday of a mutual friend for whom they usually bought a gift.

Grace was too busy to go in town and asked Eleanor if she would buy the gift, promising to settle with her later. It was just before the holiday season, and, in the rush of the present buying and other preoccupations, she promptly forgot all about the matter. But when her money began to run low—as money is apt to do just before Christmas, she did remember to her—and she said to herself that, of course, a dollar was a little matter and didn't make much difference to her, but she DID think it was very careless of Eleanor.

In the meantime Eleanor, who remembered Grace's debt but not her own, was reflecting, "And to think I called her up and reminded her about that present and then went to the bother of buying it, and she hasn't even paid her share. Of course, a dollar isn't much, but it's the PRINCIPLE of the thing that counts."

Wasn't that an odd situation to come about for lack of a little candor? Each girl felt a bit aggrieved. Neither had any right to be.

Post Office Building.

BY GEORGE FITCH.

One of the favorite diversions of his government is to erect post-office buildings. Many hundreds of the edifices have been begun in the last half century and almost all of them are not complete.

Post-office buildings are of various magnificent affairs, but this cannot always be discovered by looking at them. One should look at the appropriation in order to make sure. An appropriation of \$200,000 for a post-office building is a sublime and splendid thing, but the building itself is usually neat, unimpeachable and designed in a way to give an architect queer and almost unbearable aims.

Two hundred thousand dollars will build a ten-story skyscraper for a private citizen. But when spent for post-office buildings it will only build a modest coop, for which \$75,000 more must be appropriated in order to add front steps and a door knoop.

The reader must not infer from these remarks that the government is swindled by dishonest contractors. His is far from being the case. The government is merely particular. It loves to build massive granite ceilings and cut stone stairs and it is ever happy except when paying the highest possible price. If the government were to build a dog house or the post-master general it would select a site as far as possible from the dog's haunts and would there erect a magnificent gothic structure ten feet square at a cost of 30,000, postponing the building of the post until another appropriation could be maintained.

The government's greatest feat in post-office building so far was the hickory post-office. This splendid structure, begun twenty years ago, as finished just before the appropriation for a new and adequate building was obtained. It is the saddest post-office in the world and is admirably suited for storing lemons.

Post-office buildings are a fearful unattractive design, but can always be hid by one peculiarity. If the stranger in a city discovers a rare and costly building placed well outside of the business district, where only two pedestrians and a sleeping cab horse are visible, he need have no hesitation about going in the great front doors and hunting for a place to buy a stamp. He is in a post-office.

Gems of Ethiopian Kings Recovered.

Jewels and Gold Found in Ruins of Royal City of Meroe.—Rare Stone Carvings.—Official Buildings of Queen Candace's Ancient Capital Now Coming to Light.

London, Jan. 23.—The story of Queen Candace's ancient capital should make interesting reading when the excavations now in progress under Prof. Garstang are completed. The royal city of Meroe lies between Aabara and Khartum, on the Nile.

The story of these discoveries is indeed one of the most romantic pages of modern research; no one, unless it were Prof. Sayce, had imagined or could have inferred how extensive the ruins of the city were, nor how remarkable in character. When the excavators first arrived, three or four seasons ago, the only visible trace of ancient handiwork was a simple line of wall and three or four carved stone rams in the same vicinity.

Now, however, all is changed; the stone rams are found to line the avenue of approach toward the great Temple of Ammon, which in more ancient history was one of the chief features of the city. The stone wall which rose in isolated ruin is found to be only a portion of a great enclosure, inside which there are coming to light the stone built palaces, official buildings and the royal baths which form the royal city of tradition.

The broken potsherds begin to tell their story and to disclose to expert examination three main successive periods of local activity; the first subject to Egyptian influence, the second marked by an influx of Greek ideas, and the third suggesting a Roman occupation or colony.

The historical material confirms

these evidences, showing the city to have been founded about the eighth century B.C., possibly when the Ethiopian power in Egypt began to decline before the advance of Assyria, impelling the king and the court to seek the security of a refuge further to the Nile than their previous capital of Napata afforded.

Many tombs of the Necropolis have been examined and show that development of local funerary art as customs pursued a parallel course. These are archaeologically divided into three separate groups corresponding to the main historical divisions, and it would appear, to the groups of pyramids.

Even a fourth period, later in date than the third century A.D., is suggested in some of the northernmost tombs, agreeing with evidence, as yet not fully developed, which the excavators have remarked amid the ruins of the city. This is accordant with the last historical reference to Meroe, found in an Ethiopian text published by Bent, which records the sack of the city, apparently its overthrow, in the seventh century A.D.

Adjoining the royal palaces, which a considerable hoard of traditional gold treasure and jewels of the Ethiopian kings has been recovered, there was found an extensive series of buildings forming the royal bath. The excavation of these is still proceeding, but so far as it has gone it has been rewarded with remarkable and instructive finds. Statues of local execution based upon familiar classical ideas decorate the colonnades and the facade of its central feature, this was a sort of plunge and shower bath, fed by cascades of water from a system of storage tanks and water conduits.

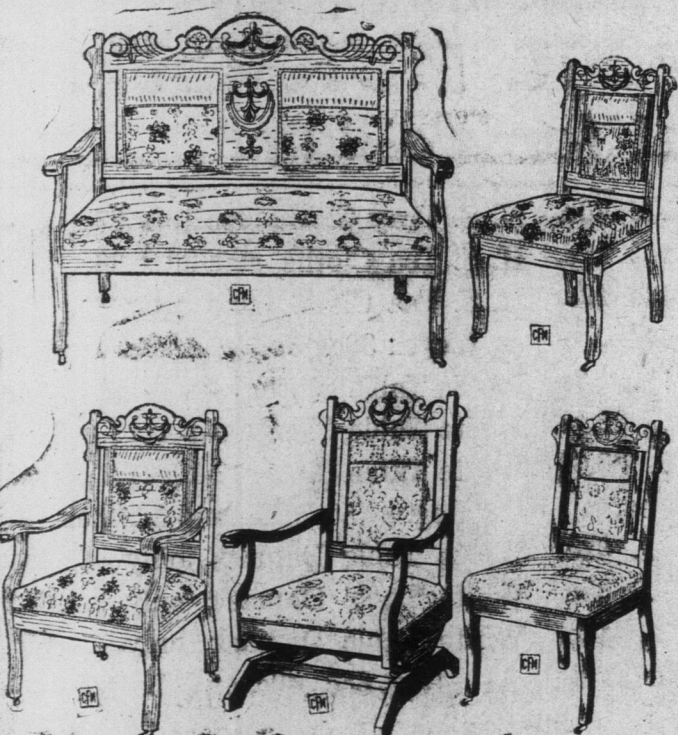
Near at hand a semi-circular room with carved stone seats correspond to the tepidarium in the places of Greek and Roman baths, but the precise disposition and relation to the chambers will be a chief feature of the investigations.

Just to the north and still within the royal city, though not contemporary with its original buildings, a small Roman temple was found, of the simple design which one might readily associate with a detached garrison of Roman soldiers or a small colony of artisans with special privileges.

Important Resolutions.

Some ten days ago, the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, gave notice of his intention to move the House into Committee of the Whole to consider certain resolutions, to stand first on the Order of the Day. The motion will come up to-day. The subject matters comprise:

- The cure and cull of fish.
- The standardization of fish when exported from this Colony.
- The protection and propagation of lobsters.
- The protection of the Seal-fishery.
- The effect of the prosecution of the whole fishery on our bait supply.
- The supply of bait.

Many of the matters have appeared in the Manifesto of both political parties. They have formed subjects earnestly discussed by the F.P.U. and appear in the platform of reforms desired by the fishermen. They have also been discussed by the Newfoundland Board of Trade and many recommendations have appeared about them.

Under these circumstances it should not be difficult to find common ground for a working understanding between all parties in relation to all these matters, which affect the staple industries of Newfoundland. By offering to withdraw the clause about the protection of hoods in his sealing bill, if the matter of protection of seals is taken up by the Government, Mr. Cosker has shown a disposition which is right and proper and sets an example of a course of conduct which merits consideration in the discussion of the motion under reference.

The Late Rev. Dr. Frederick Woods.

(From "Zion's Herald," the New England Official Organ of the M. Episcopal Church.)

After an illness of several days, Rev. Frederick Woods, D.D., died Wednesday morning, Jan. 28, in his eighty-first year. Early in September of last year the 'Herald' presented an excellent portrait of Dr. Woods, and a brief sketch of his life, in connection with the observance of his eightieth birthday anniversary, which occurred at his home in Melrose, Sept. 7.

He was a man of colossal proportions, as a Christian preacher, reformer, and friend. He came of splendid stock, and, under the nurture of the Holy Spirit, by painstaking, conscientious endeavor had made the most of himself.

He was born in St. John's, Nfld., the oldest of fourteen children. Graduating from Mount Allison University at Sackville, N.B., he went to Genesee College, New York, completing his course at Wesleyan as a Phi Beta Kappa man.

He was a great preacher in the best sense of the term. Many who knew him best say that in his days of vigor he was clearly the greatest preacher in the New England Conference. He was a comprehensive student. He knew how to study, and when he had selected the theme for a sermon he covered the entire ground in preparation, and when the sermon had been delivered it was said by competent critics that he had treated every phase of the subject, and that nothing could be added. His sermons were a normal unfolding of the message which he had to declare, and steadily increased in intellectual power to the end. Since the announcement of his translation many ministers have told us of masterly sermons which they had heard him deliver, and how the main points of the discourse and telling utterances were impressed upon their memories. We hope that the family will seriously consider the wisdom of publishing a volume of his sermons.

Dr. Woods was a great reformer especially devoted to the cause of prohibition. Tremendous philippics were those which he thundered against the liquor traffic. For the churchman who bartered his vote for political preferment or influence he had only condemnation. Indeed, in some of his pastorates his utterances on this great question of temperance reform strained the friendship and loyalty of the churches he was serving. His political attitude is interestingly summarized by the 'Evening News,' of Malden, in the following paragraph:

"In politics he followed an independent course. He was with the Republican Party in the early days and was appointed by Governor Andrews on the State Christian Sanitary Commission, the duties of which took him to Southern battlefields. En route he stopped at the White House and was welcomed by Lincoln, an incident in which he always took a great pride. Later he became affiliated with the Prohibition Party, but during the free silver agitation he was strong for McKinley, of whom he was a great admirer. Last fall he cast his vote for President Wilson."

He was a great friend. His confidence and friendship were easily won, and when once given were not withdrawn except for gravest reasons. He was big enough to allow his brother minister the same privilege of possessing independent opinions that he claimed for himself. The writer bears grateful and affectionate testimony to his expressions of fraternal interest, and to the kind and tender expressions of sympathy and support which he was always offering so sincerely to his many friends.

We have but one Frederick Woods, though entered upon his life in heaven, he has left sacred and inspiring memories and impressions which will live on to bless us here for many years to come.

The funeral, which was largely attended, occurred at the Church on Friday afternoon, Jan. 30, with the pastor in charge. Bishop Hamilton delivered a very fitting tribute, and Rev. Dr. Charles F. Rice offered prayer.

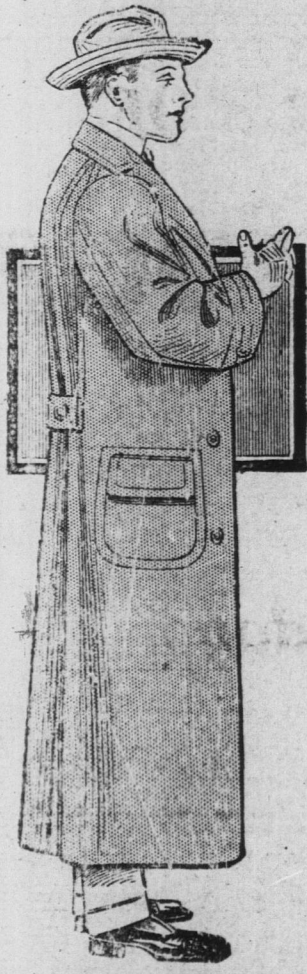

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—
Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.
I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner but which, with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—Nov 11, 14



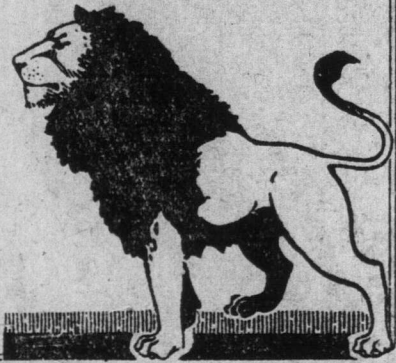

Reply to Catholic Churchman.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Sir—As a member of the Church of England in this Colony I must dissent from the modern exposition of the teachings of that Church as set forth by the "Catholic Churchman" in your paper of the 11th instant. "Catholic Churchman" in setting forth the negative side of the Conference held at Kikuyu in June, says among other things "the Prayer Book is very strong on Catholicity (whatever he means by that) and its various issues, and only the prejudiced and ignorant can assume that the Church of England is one of the numerous sects organized at the Reformation. A man may wash his face, but after washing he will still have the same face."

When we consider the Prayer Book of the Church of England and look to it for authority, we must go back to its compilation and the circumstances under which it was compiled, and how far it is a help to washing the face of the Church of Christ.

The Reformers in England, following the line of thought born on the European Continent, endeavoured to stem at the re-establishment of the Apostolic Church, the humble and lowly Church of the Saviour, which became corrupted first in the days of Constantine. At that same time the idolatrous and religious ceremonies of the Pagan churches, with all their gorgeousness were adopted, and the prophetic words of the Saviour and his Apostle began to be fulfilled.

The Clergy of the Church from being servants became masters, and the striving for preferment and worldly show and pomp showed that the flesh was so weak that they could not resist the pomp and vanities of this wicked world. So from Constantine's time until the days of the attempt at Reformation the so called Christian Church departed further and further from the principles of the Apostolic Church as founded by Christ.

At the Reformation an attempt was made to wash the face of the Church (I am using this idiomatically as "Catholic Churchman" suggests it) but the action was only a lick and a promise, the dirt laid on it by Constantine and followers, was not cleaned off as may be seen by the comment on the compilations of the Prayer Book and by the teaching of a section of the nominal adherents

of the Anglican Church, who, like "Catholic Churchman" quote the Prayer Book to suit their own purposes. He says the Canons and Prayer Book tells us what the Anglican Church is to-day. Certainly they do, but they do not advocate the doctrines set forth by "Catholic Churchman." In his letters he refers to the Sacrament of Confirmation or Penance, where does he find any Canon, Rubric or Article which authorized or makes Confirmation or Penance a Sacrament? I cannot find any authority for it, neither do I find any authority, save that of Rome, for other matters quoted by him. The Church to which "Catholic Churchman" belongs ignores the articles of the Christian Religion, laughs at the teachings of the Church Catechism, sneers at the Rubrics and notes in Communion Service, as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer, and introduces matters which were not thought of by the Church of Rome until after the Reformation period.

"Catholic Churchman" may sneer at "Protestants and think he has with him the laity of the Church of England in Newfoundland, but he will find, in all those who try to introduce innovations, that the laity will not follow the wolves in sheep's clothing who are trying to ape the powers exercised by those who govern the Church of Rome.

SYDNEY, C.B., To-day. The death occurred suddenly in the vestry of St. George's Anglican Church, last evening, of the Venerable Archdeacon Smith, Rector of the Parish.

TOKIO, to-day. Five naval officers, including a Rear Admiral, are held in confinement by the Navy Department pending Court Martial, in connection with naval scandals.

LONDON, To-day. A protest against the disendowment clauses in the disestablishment bill has been sent Premier Asquith by 15,321 Nonconformists of the Diocese of St. Asaph.

NAIROBI, British East Africa. To-day. The Boran tribesmen exterminated recently an entire village composed of 700 men, women, and children of the endle tribe in the Lorian swamps in the Northern part of the Protectorate, according to an explorer who returned here. The Borans, who are peaceful people engaged in pastoral occupations had been incessantly harassed by the Rendiles. This so greatly exasperated the Borans, they retaliated by killing everyone of the Rendile tribe they could find.

LONDON, To-day. The French Line steamship Niagara from Havre for New York, is in distress 135 miles off Ushant, the westernmost islands off the coast of Brittany, according to a Havre dispatch to "Joyce" reporting the receipt of a wireless message from the steamship. The vessel's sars Niagara lost her star-board propeller and one blade of the propeller on the port side. Anxiety is felt for the safety of the liner. A steamer has gone to the assistance of the Havre French Liner which is returning to port disabled and has on board 147 passengers. The steamer Bourdeau has been sent to assist the Niagara.

LONDON, To-day. The latter part of the week will see two Metropolitan bye-elections decided, Bethnal Green being on Thursday, and Poplar, Friday. Both will be triangular contests, with a Socialist in the field. Poplar, vacated by Sidney Buxton going to South Africa, gave a Liberal majority last time. Masterman who seeks re-election for promotion in Cabinet has rather an insecure seat, both constituencies extend within walking distance of each other. Both are populated with people difficult to arouse over any issue beyond those touching their daily living, hence Home Rule may fail to carry weight as it inevitably would elsewhere. Workers are not pleased with the inaction of the Government respecting the loss to Yarrow of the Shipbuilding at the Thames Iron Works, which formerly gave employment. Sir Matthew Wilson, Masterman's Unionist Opponent, is relying for victory on Home Rule coupled with Insurance as there is much dissatisfaction regarding the latter.

As will be seen by this report, the sum of Twenty-eight Thousand Two Hundred Dollars was collected during the short space of four years, whilst to the end of 1913, the expenditure amounted to Thirty-eight Thousand, Five Hundred. The amount of debt on the Church on Dec. 31st, 1913, was roundly Ten Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$10,246.21).

With the exception of one small amount, all outstanding accounts have been paid. The only expense to be met during the present year will be Fire Insurance, \$191.25, an Interest on Loan, about \$500.
 It has been decided to hold in future only one event in aid of the Church Fund each year, i.e. the Galien Party. Upon the offertory collections we shall depend for the remainder of the sum required to pay the amount due the Bank of Montreal. If no other repairs be effected, the sum received from these two sources should be sufficient to leave the Church free of debt three years hence.

The thanks of the Committee are tendered to Messrs. Bowring Bros Ltd., for their kindness in placing Bowring Park at our disposal for the holding of the Garden Party in 1911 and 1912. The fact of its being held in so charming a spot added greatly to the success of the event. We desire also to express our gratitude to Capt. Atlay, of H.M.S. Calypso, for supplying hunting for the occasion and for sending men to give necessary help; to the Reid Nat. Co., for donation, and also for their kindness in transporting materials to the scene; to the T. A. Band for furnishing music free of charge; likewise to Messrs. Alan Goodridge & Sons, Ltd. for generous donation; to the newspapers for publishing reports from time to time; to Mr. Kieley for the use of the Casino Theatre for the holding of several entertainments and, lastly, to the ladies and gentlemen of all denominations who assisted us in many ways, particularly in connection with garden parties and concerts, during the past few years.

HALIFAX, Feb. 14.

A wireless from the cable ship Minia, says she has the crew of the fishing schooner Cynthia, of Gloucester, on board, which was abandoned Saturday. The schooner was fired, but did not burn owing to being coated with ice, and is now a menace to shipping.

HALIFAX, Feb. 14.

The Gloucester fishing schooner, Harmony, Capt. Gibbs, put in here to-day in a disabled condition, and with several of her crew frostbitten. The vessel was fishing on Queens Bank, but found cod scarce and decided to return. On the inward passage she lost her boom, and put her steering gear out of commission.

LONDON, Feb. 14.

While the Liberal papers generally support the ministerial attitude regarding the South African negotiations, there is an under current of feeling that a dangerous precedent has been set, which has not been satisfactorily dealt with. The Westminster Gazette thinks that there must be some serious grounds for discontent, where a large number of men are in a state of insubordination. England now becomes the legate of the South African trouble. Whereas on general principles Britain must not interfere with the internal affairs of the Dominions and self-governing countries; on the other hand the Dominions must not leave untidy ends for Britain to tie up. The Manchester Guardian agrees with Ramsay MacDonald, in his charges that the acts of the South African Government in the suppression of the strike, were illegal, but contends that to give Britain any title to interfere it must be established that not alone South African, but Imperial interests are at stake. The paper hopes that the Imperial Government, while not setting the bill, will dissent from a policy which might be quoted as a precedent against constitutional liberties.
