The truth is, to use the words of the "Maritime Fishermen," our Export Regulations have proven to be a mere "umbrella," to keep the rain off the backs of our competitors. Sales are governed by demand and supply. If Regulations are not obectionable to the buyer, they are unnecessary, because the buyer would have agreed without Rules. If object tionable to the buyer, they are dan gerous to this country, because they only have the effect of turning the fix a price for sale that is as low or lower than the market price, the fixing is obviously unnecessary.
