



The first day of Public Debate in Dail Eireann on the Irish Peace Treaty made a somewhat unfavorable impression upon the majority of English newspaper correspondents in Dublin, General emphasis is laid on the bitterness displayed by Eamonn De Valera, and other ratification opponents, and upon a similar feeling shown in the argument of Griffith, Collins and their followers. By some correspondents, Mr. De Valera is represented as having spoken as a man who knew himself defeated. On the other hand, it is declared that his impassioned oratory swung the pendulum towards his side. All writers dwell upon the sensation, created by a statement of Robert C. Barton, one of the Treaty signatories, that Mr. Lloyd George threatned war if the agreement was not signed. None of the newspapers expect a decision before Wednesday, and many think Saturday the earliest day on which a vote is probable. The Westminister Jazette thinks, "the longer the debate lasts the more certain and decisive will be the drift back from words to ealities." 

THE STRANGE POWERS OF A BEAUTIFUL GIRL WHO SWAYS LENIN, THE SELF-IMPOSED RUL-ER OF RUSSIA.

(Pearson's Weekly.) She has been called the famale Rasputin, the putin, the Russian Joan of Arc, the woman Napoleon, the female Ivan the Terrible. As a matter of fact she is not any of them. She is just pretty little Olga Goro-Lenin, the real ruler of Russia, the only person whom Lenin obeys and the person with more power in her little hands than the Czar ever exer-

First of all, Olga Gorokoff is a redhot Communist. She is really a fanatic on Communism. When she talks about it to her supporters she raves about it, flinging her arms and with her dark oval face lit up with the fire of her enthusiasm.

When she it not talking Communism she talks very little, unless with Lenin. He is deeply in love with her, and she with him. Between them they keep Russia in their hands; and Olga is the more

powerful of the two. Olga has had a sad life. She was born in central Russia, her parents being agriculturalists and not too well off. When the first revolution broke out she was driven with them out of her home, and her father and mother both died one winter from exposure. She never forgot that. "What do you want, Olga?" he cried. "I thought you were a ghost. How did you come here?"

She stood looking at him with her dark eyes eyes which have quelled the rebellion in hard men of the army. Slowly she drew a revolver from her coat pocket and laid it on the desk in front of Trotsky.

"Comrade." she said. "I see through your schemes as easily as I entered your office. Here is my present to you -that, or good behaviour!"

And without another word she turned and walked out into the snow again. At the door she waited for five minutes, almost expecting to hear the report of the weapon she had given Trotsky.

No report came.

She drove back to Lenin and reported that Trotsky would not be aggressive any more. She was right again. Trotsky was too weak to kill himself. and his plotting stopped because he feared Olga.

Lenin has never ceased to admire this young woman from the moment he first saw her. She controls him as she would a child.

Time after time those who are in close touch with this semi-Jew dictator have seen him cease his wild outbursts when she enters the room and turn to her with the devotion of a

youth. He is terribly jealous of losing her aid and companionship, and within the first few months of his acquaintance with her, he caused at least four young officers in the Red Army to be executed on pretences of having been disloyal. Their real crime was that they had looked on Olga with tender
