

That Spanish Agreement.

It has always been a well known fact that no one can excel Sir Richard Squires in the art of taking credit where it is NOT due. The much talked of Spanish Agreement furnishes another instance of the manner in which the Prime Minister is attempting to bluff the electorate.

When England made a treaty with Spain last year, whereby British goods would enter that country under a preferential tariff, an invitation was extended to such colonies as so desired. to be a party to it. This invitation was taken advantage of by Canada only. After the treaty had been concluded, the steamer Mons, with a cargo of Newfoundland fish, arrived at Alicante. Hawes' agent there saw that if the preferential tariff were allowed to Newfoundland, there would be a big saving on the Mons' cargo. He, therefore, communicated with the Newfoundland Government with the result that the British Foreign offic made it possible for Newfoundland to be included in the treaty.

When the Prime Minister went to Spain, he was met at Madrid by Mr. Lewis, Hawes' agent, who informed him that he had seen the British Ambassador, and the matter had been satisfactorily arranged. PLUNGED INTO BURNING BUILD. ING AND RESCUES BABY.

The story of a mothers desperate lunge to save her baby from a blazng building is recorded in a report ent in from the Magistrate of Fogo o the Deput Minister of Justice Summers. It appears that about hildren noticed smoke about and told is mother. Her husband was in the woods at the time. She ran upstairs to nvestigate and on opening the door of a bedroom found the place all ablaze. She ran and called her nearest neighbour, Mr. J. Ford, leaving a baby 18 months old asleep in its cradle in the kitchen. When the mother came back o the house with help her brother-inlaw, Mr. Z. Ford, shoved open the door to rescue the baby but he was driven back by fire and smoke. The mother almost frantic when she saw his efforts were futile rushed through the flames, reached the cot and caught the baby in her arms.
