The Situation Of Son Paulo. Friends of Brazil will read with great regret a state of revolution exists in and about Sao Paulo. Exporters to that country will also feel some anxiety as such events tend to depress business and effect the rates of exchange. The City of Sao Paulo with well over 65,000 inhabitants, is a fine modern progressive city, situated over 2,000 feet above the sea level. The railway connecting the State of Sao Paulo with the lowlands, built by an English Company, is a splendid engineering feat. From the year 1827 to 1896 no less than 493,-535 Italians emigrated to Sao Paulo State, whilst throughout the Republic of Brazil, it is estimated the number reached 1,1000,000. Since then the numbers have increased if anything. Many large industries are being run by Italians with Italian labor, and appear to be flourishing. Sao Paulo is the great coffee producing State of the Union, the crop being valued at about £18,000,000. The Port for Sao Paulo is Santos, which until recent years was considered one of the most unhealthy ports in South America. It was rarely if ever spoken of as a "clean pcd." However as the resuit of excellent work on the part of the health authorities, Santos is today healthy, and a port of considerable importance. It may surprise some of your readers to learn that from January to June 1921, the value of fish and fish products entering Santos was placed at £72,440, computed at the rate of exchange at that time. In years gone by, I understand Newfoundland exported fairly large quantities of codfish to Southern Brazil. Reverting to coffee-a very few



An army officer is usually employed as Censor, and takes up his position in the cable offices. All code books, private and otherwise, must be produced together with a translation of the message. 

Mr. Kinsella on Overtime

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.-The figures published from the report of the Hon. the Miner of Finance, as paid to several vil servants for the fiscal period of m 1922 to 1924, include \$100.00 to self from the Department of Posts nd Telegraphs, and I am glad of the portunity to be able to just axplain ow I received this amount.

Supt. Kinsella of the Parcel Post epartment died in November, 1922 and the present Superintendent, Mr. Galway, was not appointed till May, 1923. Previous to his lamented passing Mr. Kinsella had been absent com his office two months, thus the Superintendent's place was vacant for nine months during which time I did the work and this included four of the busiest months in the year at the Parcel Posts besides attending to my

own duties. The work involved for these nine months was about \$180,000.00, the Superintendent's salary would have totalled \$1,042.20, while I received \$100 .-00 for this nine months period, or even dollars and eleven cents a onth. In other words the government saved \$942.20 by holding this position vacant for nine months.

At no time, sir, can the salaries paid the Pestal officials or the perquisite (not known there) obtained, be held up to astonish the public. We are the most poorly paid officials in the ivil service, and yet ours is the tervice that is the very public's own. If there should be an opportunity it any time to earn one hundred dollars, or one hundred cents, and to earn it in a legitimate and perfectly onest way, is there any of the decent, hinking public who will resent the poor paid Postal Official from getting

this poor amount? I think not, and to that public I eave the present explanation. Yours very truly.


