The author must surely feel flattered, unless he is aggrieved for personal reasons, that his proposals have been adopted almost to the letter by the Highroads Commission.

This admirable book, written to awaken in Newfoundlanders a "better roads spirit," was issued early in 1924, or immediately after the collapse of the administration of which the author was a member. It is reasonable, therefore, to conclude that he was not voicing sentiments to which his colleagues were opposed. The elaborate road building programme, of which he was such an enthusiastic advocate, was part and parcel of a tourist policy for Newfoundland, as he clearly states. In that movement he expressed implicit faith, and may it not be taken for granted that if the election, which was being contested while the "Booster" was in process of being printed, had resulted in a victory for his party, the projects mentioned would have been undertaken immediately?

Nose Vaccine for Colds

otion Against Influenza-Smallpox Serum Foreshadowed.

The possibility that by applying an appropriate vaccine to the lining rene of the nose we may be able in the near future to obtain protection against colds, influenza, and other inhaled diseases is foreshadowed in a report to the Medical Research Council on his inquiry into the virus of cow-pox and small-pox by Dr. Mervyn Gordon, consulting bacteriologist to St. Bartholomew's Hos-

To-deal with big outbreaks of these diseases it is desirable that an efficacious method less troublesome than inoculation should be discovered.

Having found that the virus of cow-pox heated to 55 degrees Centigrade and injected under the skin of a rabbit produced immunity (protection against infection). Dr. Gordon annlied the same dose to the mucous lining of the rabbit's nose and produced equal protection. He writes:

"Further experiments are desirable to determine the extent to which this physiological property of the nasal mucosa can be exploited for the practical production of immunity.


"Since all that is required is the free application of the antigen (microbic substance) to the nasal mucosa, it is conceivable that ultimately immunisation by the nasal route may be found to possess a high value in the case of threatened epidemics of respiratory-borne diseases, a contingency in which preventive medicine is at present gravely at fault.

"As in such infectious maladies the virus is air-borne, the nasal mucosa is the surface in the body most exposed to attack. This site would appear to be the outpost where specific immunisation is most needed and most likely to prove successful in checking the spread of such inhaled infection."

SIR ESME HOWARD'S SPEECH AT ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 9-The greatest guarantee of world peace is understanding between Great Britain and the United States, the British Amhassador, Sir Esme Howard, told a meeting to-night of the English-speaking Ilnion at St Louis

Those who were trying to build up that understanding and friendship, he said, are not trying to establish a world-dominating alliance, but rather are endeavouring to erest what wa become a real temple of peace in all parts of the world where men of English speech come together. "If I believed Anglo-American

friendship would develop into a big, brutal, bullying power," he asserted, "I never should desire it to take root. But because I believe, in spite of lapses which are unavoidable in view of human imperfections, the British-American ideal in life is just and squaredealing, therefore, I for my part, shall continue to advocate a clear, frank understanding between our two countries as long as there is any breath in

my body."

Growth Is Proof. The growth of the English-speaking Union, the Ambassador said, is a proof of the feeling that friendship between all branches of the English-speaking world is a necessary factor for the well being of the world.

This idea of the necessity of a good understanding between the United States and Great Britain is not new." he continued. "We find it in many British and American writers of distinction, including Thomas Jefferson, before, during and after the revolution. They realized the advantage that would ensue to these countries as well as the world at large from a frank and friendly feeling between them and from a free and voluntary co-operation, unfettered by any for-

mal alliance." The Ambassador praised the Locarno Security Pact as bringing a sense of safety between France and Germany, not felt since the Empire of

Charlemagne was broken up in 843. Europe, he said is at last learning to settle her own matters, and insofar as Great Britain is a European power, she has, "I say with pride, taken an active part in promoting this great and wonderful European covenant."


