John Smith, Esq., of Pilkington, left for the great North West, on a prospecting tour, on Monday next. He expects to be absent about six weeks.

As Mr. Kean will not remove until next March, he will during the remainder of his term of office as Reeve, be able to serve the Township at the council board.

HAUL STORMS.—We had a smart hail storm in Guelph on Monday, but it was far more severe east of this. In Simcoe many of the hailstones that fell were over four and a-half inches in circumference. Sky-lights and windows were smashed in many places. The damage to tender crops, plants and fruit will be very serious. In Brantford the ground was soon covered nearly two inches in depth with hail-stones, many of them the size of marbles. Some damage was done to windows, and it is feared the fruit has sustained considerable injury. In Whitby the lightning struck the English Church, near the Railway Station, knocking the steeple to pieces, smashing every window, destroying the organ, and making the interior of the church, especially the gallery, a perfect wreck.

### Methodist New Connexion Conference, SABBATH SERVICES.

The love feast which commenced at nine o'clock was a precious means of grace.

At half-past ten the Rev. Dr. Wm. Cooke, of London, England, preached to a very large and highly interested audience.

The Doctor was respectfully requested by the Conference to furnish the manuscript for publication in pamphlet form, believing that its extensive circulation in the community would do much good.

The Rev. Dr. Cooke preached at half-past two, from John 1:36.

The sermon was an eloquent, yet explicit exposition of the Gospel truth.

The Rev. J. Shuteworth preached at half-past six, from Matthew xv 18. Subject: The Church, 1st, character—divine, benevolent, holy, extensive in proportions. 2nd, its foundation, viz: Christ—good, sure, tried. 3rd, its work—great, difficult, advancing, will be completed.

After the discourse the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered, and thus closed a high day in Israel.

Several ministers filled the neighboring pulpits as follows:—Presbyterian, Rev. David Savage in the morning and Rev. W. Birks in the evening. The Rev. W. Tindall preached in Ellis's Chapel, and Rev. G. Brown in Preston in the evening. The Presbyterian pulpit in Galt was filled by Rev. J. McAllister, and the Wesleyan by Rev. E. Holmes in the morning and Rev. W. Henderson in the evening.

MR. HENRY HUGHES, of Hanley, England, was received into the Conference as a Probationer.

A letter was read from the Rev. R. N. Hill, of Muskoka, setting forth the condition of the mission, and requesting the Conference to station a young man there.

The name of Rev. J. W. Jackson, of Stayner, was discontinued, and ordination cancelled, having failed to fill his engagements as a minister.

Several items of business were disposed of, and Conference adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.—The Revs. D. Savage, W. Tindall and J. Shuteworth were appointed to draft a resolution on the death of the Rev. J. B. Kershaw.

The Conference learned with much pleasure the fact that Montreal circuit has resolved to support its ministers without aid from the mission fund, while it proposes to pay over to the fund all moneys raised by them for this purpose; and the Conference cherishes the hope that this noble example will be soon followed by many more of their circuits.

The first reading of the Stationing Committee was submitted, when the Conference adjourned.

Mr. Costigan's Little Bill.

There is every probability that Mr. Costigan's Bill, to prevent any member for a Local Legislature which has abolished dual representation being a candidate for the House of Commons without resigning his seat, will become law this session. It was introduced last year, but as there was no special object to serve as far as Ontario was concerned, it was defeated on a mixed vote. This session, however, the circumstances of the case are altered. Previous to last session New Brunswick had abolished dual representation, and Mr. Costigan for local reasons, desired to prevent members of the Local Legislature in that Province from contesting with him the representation of his County in the House of Commons. Ontario likewise abolished dual representation, and consequently the bill if passed will apply to this Province. Here was afforded a chance for playing a smart trick on the Ontario Legislature, which it was fully believed would compel Mr. Blake and Mr. Mackenzie to resign their seats in the Government of this Province before they could run for the House of Commons. So every one thought, and the Ministerialists at Ottawa, and the Tories throughout the country were chuckling over this clever little man-u-evre, which it was fondly hoped would seriously embarrass the Local Government, and necessitate a reconstruction of the Cabinet. John A. winked at the dirty trick, and though he affected to stand neutral in the matter by pairing off with Cartier, yet his followers to a man voted for this same bill, which a number of them voted against last session. But now comes in the little joke. The House on Monday night went into committee on the bill, when Mr. Blake, who was not alarmed by its passing, and who voted for it, explained and the laughter of the Opposition and the chuckling of the Tories, that the bill only applied to Provinces where membership of the House of Commons disqualified a man from sitting in the Local House, whereas a man must sit and vote in the House of Commons before he became disqualified from sitting in the Local Legislature. Mr. Costigan's bill therefore did not apply to members of the Ontario Legislature at all, who could run for any constituency for the Commons they chose, who could sit and vote during the next session of the Local Legislature, and who only had to resign before they took their seats in the House of Commons. This resolution fell like a thunderbolt in the Ministerial camp. The trap set for Messrs. Blake and Mackenzie was found to be no trap at all. The little trick was pronounced to be a miserable failure—as miserable as the little bill which was to accomplish such great things for the Tories in Ontario.

Mr. Costigan's Statue in New York.  
A fine statue of Shakespeare was unveiled in the Central Park on Thursday, which is designed to commemorate the lines he hath made upon the world of the great poet. The Tribune takes advantage of this event to make the following special tribute to an artist:  
"After all the eulogies and speculations, the eulogies and guesses, the archaical commentaries and the vain attempts, and his own best experience, what the world has shown, outside of party cliques, an honest man almost doped to what has been said either for or against him. By this we mean to say that his is a self-sustained fame, and sustained too against such remarkable odds. The great plays do not bear the stamp of Shakespeare's interpreters and expounders; nor is it because of the endless philippic diatribes to which he has been subjected, the terms written in honour or dishonour of him, that to-day he receives our special act of respect. He has his statue because he is in the hearts and the hearts of the people, and in their hearts because so many of his characters have become, as it were, immortal creatures, and contemporary of all ages; because his words are full of the vitality of the world's present events; because every man of average intelligence, be his culture shall or large, is charmed by his narrative, fascinated by his beauty, attracted by his truth, and astonished by his power. Altogether, his is the most familiar name known by the English tongue—so familiar, indeed, that it can hardly with propriety be called literary. He is the one great writer whose personal is in proportion to what we may, without offence, call his notoriety. There are other great names with which, merely considered as names, we are just as familiar; we call ships after Milton and villages after Homer; yet both remain in second-hand dust upon the shelves. Probably not two thousand persons in this country of people could read the *Himal or Paradise Lost*, into through during the ensuing year. Shakespeare, because his work is broken into fragments, each in itself complete, is constantly in the hands of the indolent and desultory readers. This is one of the reasons why he is so perpetually reprinted, both in cheap and costly volumes. There is an endless demand for him, just as there is, if we may say so without irreverence, for Bibles or Prayer-Books. Doubtless his fame has been in part perpetuated at the theatre; but why is it that he, so much more firmly than Johnson or Beaumont and Fletcher, keeps the stage? There is nothing comes in this world by chance. Fame lasts; it is notoriety that fades and falls into dumb dust; and the books which have this grip upon the human heart are so few that a strong man might carry them on his shoulders. It is creditable to our kind that such an immortality is possible, and that it should have been achieved, if only by two or three. We need no Alexandrian library for our best scripture. It may easily be lodged upon the shortest shelf of a poor man's garret. We like that our City, in its finest place of public resort, is to set up to-day a statue of William Shakespeare, because that we do believe that the honor which we thus pay to ourselves is a genuine outgrowth of our reverence and gratitude—for reverence for his insight, and of gratitude for its results. 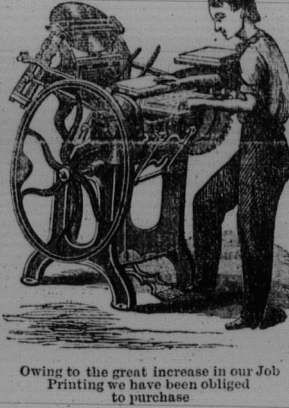

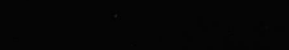

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### The Loss of the "Tripoli."

The rock on which the *Tripoli* stranded on the 10th is near Wexford, on the southeast coast of Ireland, at the entrance of St. George's Channel, and is a point that is usually very closely approached by vessels sailing from the port of Liverpool bound West. The Collins' steamship *Tripoli*, Capt. Luce, on one of her trips from Liverpool to New York, a short time previous to the melancholy disaster which ended her career, struck on the same rock, and was compelled to return for repairs. The present disaster to the *Tripoli* excited the more attention for the fact that such an occurrence is very rare in the history of the Cunard Company, which has been heretofore one of the most fortunate steamship lines in the world. Since their steamers first began to run across the Atlantic, in 1839, it is said they have never lost a passenger nor a mail-bag by any disaster. On one occasion a passenger while standing on deck was killed by a heavy sea which broke aboard and threw him against the side of the vessel, but we believe no other loss of life was ever caused by accidents to these steamers. Only one steamer has been lost during the thirty-three years' service of this Company, and that was the *Columbia*, one of their old boats, which was wrecked on the Nova Scotia coast while running for Halifax. The *Tripoli* is an iron propelled of 2,058 tons, built at Glasgow in 1865, and is constructed with seven bulk-heads. The vessel is partially covered by insurance in English offices. She had a valuable cargo of foreign merchandise for Boston merchants, and about 300 steerage passengers.
