

The Herald attempts, but completely fails, to exonerate Mr. Chadwick from the charge we preferred against him, of having obtained the County printing by a mean evasion of the statute disqualifying him or any other member of the County Council from holding a contract under it. But, in order to withdraw public attention from the iniquity and illegality of his course in this matter, we are treated to even more than the ordinary string of falsehoods, misrepresentations, jesuitical evasions of the truth, and skillful dodging of the real question at issue.

In the first place, it charges that we have had a monopoly of the County printing. This is utterly untrue. We obtained it for several years consecutively by fair and square competition, just as the Herald some ten or twelve years ago obtained it, and held it for a number of years. If it was a monopoly in the one case it was equally so in the other. The writer in the Herald knows this well enough, and when he says that we have had a monopoly of the printing he states what he knows to be false, though he has not manliness enough to admit it.

Again, in saying that this printing was given to us year by year "by a few of the Grits in the County" he wantonly impugns the honesty and maligns the character of such staunch Conservatives as the present Warden and County Clerk, the late Warden, Mr. Leslie, and the late Clerk, Mr. Ferrier, who are or were members of the Printing Committee, and who year after year accepted our tender as the lowest. Are these "the Grits who manipulate the public purse for the benefit of their friends?" So the Herald says. It further adds that we have more than once "violated our agreement with the County Council to make a little money." We charge this as a vile slander, and we defy the Herald to point out a single case in which we received a cent from the County that was not honestly earned.

Such are a few of the vile and malicious charges made against the Mercury, and to which we have given a flat denial. We consider it unnecessary further to notice the reckless assertions of such an unscrupulous and dishonest writer, who regards neither truth nor honor nor honesty. We dismiss the subject by repeating our former assertion, that Mr. Chadwick in this matter has been guilty of a mean evasion of the law, which no pre-meditated public servant, or high-toned gentleman, who is careful of his public character, would have stooped to, and we do not hesitate to say that nine-tenths of the people, whether Reform or Conservative, are of the same opinion.

The Intercolonial and Pacific Railways. The Intercolonial Railway Commissioners met at Ottawa on Tuesday. The contractors on that line are largely represented; one or two are putting in their final estimates, having completed their work. The greater number of them, however, are beseeching the Commissioners with large claims for extras. It is estimated that the extras claimed will amount to nearly five millions of dollars, one firm alone demanding half a million. This latter firm belongs to Quebec, and its members were active supporters of Mr. Langevin at a recent election in Quebec city; and broad hints are given by some, who should have the means of knowing the circumstances, that their claim for extras would not have been nearly so large but for the necessity of reimbursing the substantial advances made on account of election expenses. It is said that the Commissioners are appalled at the magnitude of the claims thus put in, and have resolved to shirk the responsibility by handing the whole matter of the extras over to be dealt with by the House. The leading contractors brought hither by the Welland Canal and Intercolonial Railway works are turning their attention towards the Pacific Railway. A combination, which will include A. P. Macdonald, Donald Robertson, James Ross, Duncan Macdonald, Alex. Macdonald, and several others, have now under consideration a proposition to the Board of Directors to build the eastern division of the Canada Pacific, from Lake Nipissing to Fort Garry, and to complete it within four years from the date of the contract. The Government are not yet, however, able to furnish detailed estimates of the work in that region, and until these are prepared the practicability of the work may be doubted. This ring is one composed wholly of ardent Government supporters, and it is not impossible that they may intend by such an extraordinary proposition to assist the Government over the difficulties of the approaching session.

The Municipal Council of Nassagaweya. The Council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, the 3rd day of Feb'y. Members all present—the Reeve in the Chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. On motion, it was ordered that James Menzies and John Easterbrook be paid \$2 each for their services as Returning Officers at the last Municipal election, and the Clerk \$2 for furnishing voters' lists, &c. On motion the Auditor's report was received and examined by the Council, and being found correct was accepted. The By-Law appointing Township officers was then filled up, and on motion it was read the third time and passed, and signed, and the Corporation seal attached thereto, and the Clerk instructed to get 25 copies of the same printed. Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Gillies, that the sum of \$50 per annum be granted to William Back for the support of William Masters, a poor and indigent person, to be paid in quarterly instalments in advance, to commence on the 1st of Feb'y, 1873. Carried. On motion the Inspector of Taverns was instructed to visit the several houses of parties applying for licenses, and to notify the applicants to be prepared with their bonds to receive a certificate for license at the next meeting of the Council, on Monday the 24th inst. thus enabling vendor, purchaser and consumer not only to identify the genuineness of the capsules, but likewise the contents of the vessel to which it is applied.

The Lord Chancellor, in his judgment, said that the capsules are not used merely for the purpose of the ornament, but that they are serviceable in protecting the wine from injury and insuring its genuineness.

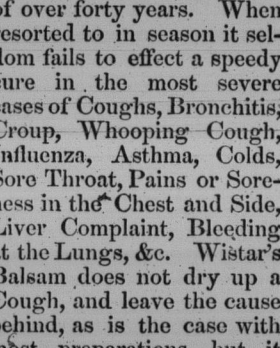
