LANCASTER, Ont., April 26.—At
an early hour this morning four
masked burglars forced an en-
trance to the local branch of the
Merchants Bank of Canada in this vil-
lage by battering in the door. They cov-
ered Herman Von Metake, the teller,
who was sleeping in the back room, with
revolvers, but the latter managed to se-
cure his own revolver and fired, wound-
ing one of the burglars. A general scuf-
fle ensued, during which the burglars
pounded Von Metake on the head with
their revolvers. Despite Von Metake's
wounded condition he managed to put
the burglars to flight. They took their
wounded comrade with them, leaving
him at the station, about four hundred
yards distant from the bank, where he
died some hours later. Mr. Von Metake
is in a precarious condition, but will re-
cover. The top of his head was prac-
tically beaten to a jelly, and the eyes
wounded inflicted by a blunt instrument.
It is believed the burglars would have
killed him had he not taken effect upon
one of their pals. Finding their pal
dying or dying they hurried off with
the loot, which was fairly well dressed,
of medium height and evidently about
thirty years of age.

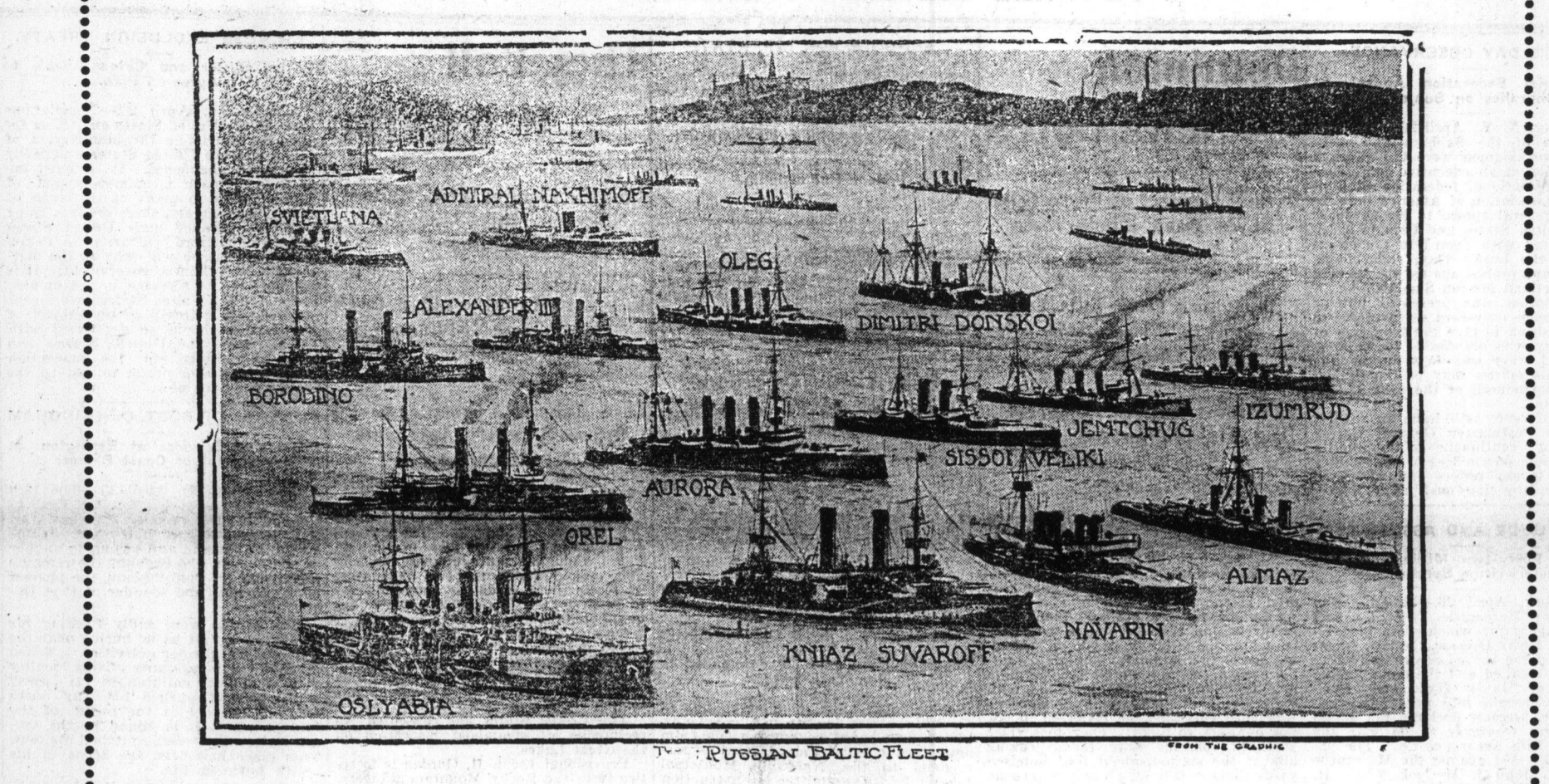

Navies Play Hide and Seek

Cross Fire of Correspondence Designed to Cover Position of Fleets.

Application of Strict Neutrality Compels Rojstvensky to Leave Kamranh Bay.

London, April 24.—(2 a. m.)—Beyond the report from Kamranh Bay that the Russian second Pacific squadron has proceeded northward, there is no further news of any kind, nor confirmation of the reported firing of Kamranh Bay. There have been rumors recently that a portion of Rojstvensky's squadron was at Hanien, near the promontory of Lienchau. If these rumors are true it is supposed the whole squadron may reassemble there and endeavor in Chinese waters to continue coaling and other preparations. Little attention is paid here to reported movements of the Japanese warships. It is considered that Vice-Admiral Togo is not likely to lift the veil of secrecy expected for the express purpose of misleading.

Tension at Tokio Relieved.

Tokyo, April 23.—The announcement that in response to Japan's representations, France has promised the expulsion of the Russian second Pacific squadron from Kamranh Bay, and affirmed her determination to maintain neutrality, has received here with pleasure and has relieved the tension of popular feeling, although it is believed that if Rojstvensky entered Kamranh Bay for the purpose of finally preparing for a dash north, the purpose was accomplished before he was ordered to leave. There is also a suspicion that Rojstvensky may have a technical removal from French territorial waters by going outside the three-mile limit, and the Russian fleet will remain uncolored until the Russian fleet departs from Indo-Chinese waters. The Foreign Office in a statement issued today, says: "The French government, upon receipt of the report that the Baltic squadron had arrived at Kamranh Bay, instructed the Governor-General of Indo-China, to strictly enforce the rules of French neutrality. Subsequently the Japanese government lodged a protest with France, and the French government issued new special instructions to the Governor-General for transmittal to the Russians, ordering them to leave French territorial waters as soon as possible. The Governor-General telegraphed, replying that he had taken the necessary measures according to instructions, and that he had taken the necessary measures simultaneously addressed the Russian government, asking that the Admiral be instructed to leave French territorial waters. The Russian government replied that it had already sent such instructions. The French government gave assurance that they would take in future, necessary measures to see that neutrality is vigorously respected."

Ping Suey Had Valuable Cargo

China Mutual Liner Went to Sea Yesterday With Freight Worth Two Millions.

Cottage City Meets With Accident When In Wrangle Narrows—U. S. S. Perry in Port.

Steamer Ping Suey, of the China Mutual line, which passed out yesterday morning en route to Liverpool, had on board cargo to the value of \$2,000,000—the most valuable cargo ever sent out from Puget Sound, not even excepting that of the steamer Telemachus, which last fall exceeded all previous records.

The cargo consists in the main of the general merchandise usually shipped to the Orient. Among the most valuable items in the vessel's cargo, of cotton sheeting there are 20,000 bales. Each bale represents between 700 and 800 yards of cotton, of a width of 50 inches. Fire Raging In Coal Mines

For Days Flames Have Been at Work in Tunnel at Frank.

Sometime Before Conflagration Can Be Extinguished and Work Proceed.

Frank B. C. April 26.—For days past a fire has been raging in the coal mines here, but only during the last few hours has it assumed a serious aspect. It is supposed to have started from an open miner's lamp a mile from the mouth of the tunnel, and so far as can be ascertained, has been burning for several weeks. An effort is being made to close the air passages and thus smother the fire, but this is rendered difficult by the smoke and heat which are produced. Since the great disaster of two years ago immense sums of money have been spent in retimbering the mines, and this has all gone up in smoke during the last few days. All this work will need to be done again when the fire has been extinguished, but at present it looks as though this would be at some distant date.

It is not known yet if any lives are lost, but it is feared that some men have perished in the flames, which came very unexpectedly from the heart of the mine, and the prospect for the future is not bright. It will doubtless be some time before the fire can be entirely extinguished, but there is a possibility that it may be "gobbled" and if this proves true it will mean nothing more serious than a re-timbering of the entry in the disaster.

Worst Phase of Situation

appears to be that the fire will necessitate the closing of the mine for some time, while retimbering is in progress, thus throwing the large force of men out of work.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

Edward F. Dunne, the new Mayor of Chicago, was elected on the public ownership platform. One of his first official acts in office was to cable to the Lord Provost of Glasgow, Scotland, asking that leave of absence be granted for the manager of municipal tramways of that city to come to Chicago and confer with him on the present situation. The request has been granted and we may look forward to negotiations having in view the municipalization of street railways.

In considering the question of public ownership of such utilities as electric tramways, water works, telephones, etc., etc., the difference in municipal methods in Great Britain and in America is a question strictly in mind. In Great Britain the town councils are really miniature parliaments in which the executive head has no more power than any one of the members. Each of the departments of the city is entrusted to a committee of the council which is a responsible official. It is pointed out that the council for mayor is selected by the council from their own number, and he has no veto or other privilege, nor any power of individual action such as is the case in the United States. Another important fact has to be kept in mind, and that is that in Great Britain the municipal council is an exceedingly high one. Men are selected for the position on account of their moral and business standing in the community. There is no question attached to such position except the honor involved, and that is regarded as high indeed. Public opinion in this respect has not yet been developed in America and it is very doubtful if fully carried out apart from the essential principles of government as maintained in the Old Country. Referring to this subject the Toronto World, in an article in its issue of April 22, has an advocate of public ownership, says: "It is remarkably efficient working in Great Britain is mainly attributable to the business principles which are followed by the municipalities, and to the composed of successful men of business, accustomed to the conduct of large commercial and industrial enterprises and animated by public spirit."

ODD FELLOWS CELEBRATE.

American Order Was Eighty-six Years Old Yesterday.

Today is the eighty-sixth birthday of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and the day will be celebrated by some 1,500,000 members of the order throughout the world. At most of the 11,000 lodges of Odd Fellows some appropriate ceremonies will be observed in honor of Thomas Willey, the Baltimore blacksmith who founded the American order nearly a century ago.

This, the largest secret society in the world, is an offshoot of the great English Friendly Society, and was founded in the United States by Thomas Willey, who with four comrades at Baltimore in 1819 founded the first Odd Fellows lodge in the New World. Willey and John Welch had both been members of the English society, and when they came to the new country to make their homes they conceived the idea of founding the order on this side of the water. They published a call, and John Dunton responded April 13, 1819. They were members of the British order, which had four members, and they organized a legal lodge where none existed, and on April 26, 1819, the first lodge of Odd Fellows in the United States came into existence.
