FUTURE PROCEEDINGS.

DISGRACE AFTER DEATH. Forger-Notes.
HAMILTON, March 18.—Some surprising evelations were made at a meeting of the late James Reid's creditors to-day. A statement was submitted showing liabilities of some \$50,000, exclusive of two mortgages amounting to \$26,000. The estate, by udicious management, may possibly cover a large part of the amount, but the exact surprise was expressed when the executors put in a number of notes as "fictitious paper" to the extent of \$16,000, which were found to be forgeries. The paper purports to have been signed by Thomas Bain, M.P. for North Wentworth, but he that the late Mr. Reid uttered the paper to help tide over the difficulties. The forgeries were on the Montreal, "Federal and Commerce banks and the Farmers' and Traders' loan association. 


