## THE JUNCTION HIGH SCHOOL.

A Public Meeting Decided That It Should Be Completed.

In compliance with a resolution presented to Mayor Bowd a public meeting was held in Campbell's Hall, Toronto, last evening, for the purpose of discussing the advisability of the council granting \$3000 asked for by the board to complete the new High School building.

The original estimates by the architect provided for a building cost of about \$21,000, but the board attempted to build the school by day labor, and after proceeding for some time they found that it would cost much more than the architect's estimate. After making several demands on the council and spending about \$33,000, the building was still in an uncompleted condition, and \$3000 more is required to complete it.

Mayor Bowd stated that he called the meeting to get the sense of the taxpayers, but he was opposed to placing any more money in the hands of the board, as he considered them incompetent and untrustworthy as a school board. The people must say whether they wished the council to vote the money or the board must raise it.

A. J. Anderson, John Brocklebank, David Hall, James Hall, J. A. Todd, John Patterson, Peter Phillips, T. T. Law, J. F. Holden, Dr. Gilmour, Dr. Williams and W. Wilcox all spoke in favor of granting the necessary \$3000 to complete the building, the speakers believing that it is worse than folly to invest \$33,000 and then for the lack of \$5000 necessary to complete to allow such a fine building to stand idle.

A resolution was then carried without a dissenting voice, as follows:

"Moved by A. J. Anderson, seconded by H. T. Law. That it is the express desire of the ratepayers and electors that the municipal council take immediate steps to place in the hands of the High School Board the sum of \$5000 required for the final completion of the High School building, and that the money be provided without the necessity of a bylaw by popular vote."

After the resolution had been unanimously carried Mayor Bowd stated that he would support the granting of the money by the council.

**Suburban Notes.**

New York, June 1.—A Herald special from London says: "There have been floating around the clubs and other centres of information in London for many months vague rumors of some revelations that were soon to appear in connection with Irish affairs that would utterly destroy the Home Rule movement, route the Gladstone-Rosebery party and triumphantly carry Lord Salisbury and the Tories back into power."

"Similar rumors were in circulation in the spring of 1887, just before the appearance in The London Times of the series of articles entitled 'Parliament and Crime,' the publication of which afterward proved such a serious matter for that newspaper, and again on the eve of the general election in 1892, the latter time without result."

"The rumors have recently taken a more definite form, and it is insisted upon by the best informed Irish Nationalists that a far-reaching attempt is about to be made by some of the leaders of the Tory party to besmirch the memory of Parnell and the good name of some of the Irish members of the House of Commons, with a view to affect the coming general election in Great Britain and Ireland."

Irish Nationalists on the Home Rule. Dr. Thomas Edw. Barrett, President of the Irish National Federation of America, said yesterday: "The Federation has information that the agents of the Tory party have been scouring the United States for nearly a year to obtain any kind of information that would enable them to get up a campaign cry for next election."

"We know that there are to be Tory agents in this country endeavoring to discover or manufacture any possible evidence of infidelity on the part of the objects of what I regard as one of the blackest attempts ever made to besmirch a political party."

"It has been openly boasted that the relations will blow Lord Rosebery and the Liberals as high as a kite, but for my part I have too much faith in the good sense of the English people to believe for a moment that their judgment can be affected by any such transparent fraud as is about to be attempted on them."

"That the Tory party is capable of resorting to desperate and despicable methods the past fully proves. In Ireland it makes common cause with the extremists, whom it denounces in the House of Commons in order to divide the Irish people and defeat Home Rule."

## CONFUSION OF STREET NAMES.

To Establish a Proper System—No Duplication or Confusion to be Allowed. The sub-committee of the Executive Committee of street nomenclature met yesterday afternoon, Ald. Allen in the chair.

The City Surveyor submitted a long report, in which he pointed out improper designations of streets which had never been sanctioned by the council; also to the duplication of names and to the occurrence of names nearly similar as likely to cause confusion. There is a prominent use of the words "avenue," "street," "road," "place," "terrace" and "row" which is not governed by any regulation of the city.

The City Surveyor suggested some rule by which this confusion may be avoided. He also stated that he had written to the Postmaster, submitting a proposed revised list, which Mr. T. C. Patten approved and also supplemented by a further list of streets which led to difficulty and delay in the delivery of letters.

The County Judge is the Arbitrator. Ald. Lamb remarked that the county judge last year was very chary in sanctioning the change of names of streets. He must have good and sufficient reason for every suggested change.

The City Surveyor said he thought His Honor would be favorably disposed to a revised list on a proper basis. The list could be publicly exhibited so that alterations could be made if necessary. There ought to be an official list of Toronto's streets, which at present there was not, and the designations of place, avenue, street, road, should be used on a well-defined principle.

Ald. Hewitt asked if it would not be preferable to abolish all the present names and have the streets known by numbers only, as in some American cities.

The Chairman could not approve of this, and said further it would be undesirable to change the names of long-established streets, or those called after well-known and worthy citizens.

On motion of Ald. Lamb the City Surveyor was requested to prepare a report embodying his suggestions and those of the postmaster and registrar, giving the alterations of names proposed and the reason therefor. This will be considered at a special meeting, and when approved sent to the county judge.

Literature For Lumbermen. The monthly meeting of the Toronto District W.C.T.U. was held yesterday. Mrs. Gregg occupied the chair. The various unions of the city were represented and spoke encouragingly of the work. Great attention has been paid to the lumbermen in the Ottawa and Muskoka districts during the past winter; large parcels of literature, scrap books and comfort bags have been sent and much appreciated by the men; liberal contributions have also been sent towards the support of the missionary, who has worked very successfully among them. Mrs. Ella Williams of Montreal, Dominion W.C.T.U. President, will visit the city next week and conduct a parliamentary drill at headquarters, 56 Elm-street, on Thursday, June 7.

Reductions in Hardware. At a meeting in this city of the different manufacturers interested in the hardware trade, at which representatives from Montreal, Hamilton and Toronto were present, many changes were made. For tinned and black rivets the discount was raised to 55 and 10 per cent. The expected change in wire nails was not made, and burrs and carriage bolts were also left unchanged. Some changes in the large sizes of wire spikes and cast-iron nails were decided upon, and reductions were made in wooden butter cases and wooden pails.

Council will be asked for \$200—How-  
ing Club Water and other expenses.

At a meeting of Ald. Hewitt's sub-  
committee on the civic celebration of Dominion  
Day, held yesterday afternoon, a letter from  
Col. Otter was read, stating that the mili-  
tary would co-operate on condition that  
\$1000 were granted for the purpose.  
Refreshments would be necessary for the  
men and payment to the bands. He could  
not promise a very large muster, as many of  
the volunteers wished to have the holiday  
at their own disposal.

The fire brigade would parade if \$250  
were granted; the police force could not be  
spared from their duties for the sake of  
augmenting a procession; the wheemen  
would be absent at the Canadian Associa-  
tion's meeting at Montreal; the school  
children at their games in Exhibition Park.  
The following representatives of sporting  
clubs were present and stated their willing-  
ness to undertake a regatta if \$300 were  
granted them: F. J. Smyth, Charles Len-  
nox, Toronto Rowing Club; Alexander  
Fraser, G. H. Muntz, Argonaut Rowing  
Club; George Goodenham, Don Rowing  
Club; S. P. Grant, Bayview Rowing Club;  
John Lennox, Sunnyside Rowing Club.

If funds are not forthcoming, will dis-  
solve.

The Chairman said, in view of the above  
reports, it would be necessary to ask the  
council for \$2000. He was anxious that  
another large sum could be obtained by  
subscriptions. The hotel people and others  
had promised assistance in this line. The  
expenditure of this money would contrib-  
ute to the enjoyment of the people of Tor-  
onto and the demonstration would attract  
thousands of visitors.

Toronto seemed dead to her own in-  
terests as regards holidays. She sent her  
citizens out of town instead of providing  
special attractions at home and bringing in  
hordes of visitors. It came to this, that un-  
less the council granted \$2000 the com-  
mittee would dissolve.

Ald. Sheppard said there was a preva-  
lent feeling that the money would be waste-  
d. He did not think so, though he ad-  
mitted that the \$1000 for the military  
parade might be saved. Dominion Day  
ought to be properly celebrated in a city  
like Toronto. If it were, more money would  
be spent in the city than the amount of the  
civic grant. He moved that the com-  
mittee make request of the council for  
\$2000.

This was agreed to and the cloud lifted

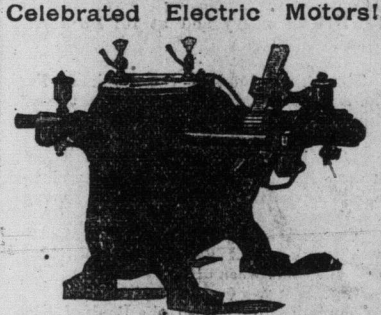
