MEETING OF BIRDMEN

Annual Session of the Nova Scotia Poultry Association Held at the Agricultural College

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Poultry Association took place at the Agricultural College, Thursday, March 13th, at 10 a. m. Mr. E. C. Griffin, Vice President, occupied the chair. Fifteen delegates from different Poultry Clubs of the Province, attended. Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Frank E. Jackson, reported that the Poultry show building at the Sydney Exhibition had not been improved. Interest in Poultry at North Sydney was as keen as ever. More chickens were raised during the last year and the clubs imported more poultry and feed for their members.

Mr. W. W. Osborne, reported for the Pictou County fanners and stated that a show had not been held in Pictou County during the last year, but they were now re-organizing their Poultry Club, and were going after the Association to carry on a large show next fall. He stated that the difficulty of obtaining feed of good quality at a reasonable price had kept many from enlarging their Poultry flock.

Mr. Thomas Barrett, Stellarton, reported that their Association was being re-organized and would develop more strength and would assist in increasing the quality and number of poultry in the County of Pictou. He also called attention to the high express rates and asked for united action on the part of our Association in reference to express rates on live poultry and poultry for exhibiting.

It was unanimously agreed that the Secretary deal with this matter and report to the Executive as soon as reply could be had from the express companies. The date for the next Poultry Show in Pictou was selected and reserved for this particular show. The dates selected were November 13th, 14th, and 15th.

Mr. R. J. Messenger reported for the Annapolis Poultry Club. The high price of feed and the scarcity during the last two years has retarded the increase production of poultry in this County. The price received by the farmers for poultry and eggs was better than ever before but feed had been at a prohibited price.

Mr. Fred Bath, Bridgetown, stated that the reason a show was not held in Annapolis during this year was practically due to the prevalence of influenza and to the difficulty of obtaining suitable dates on which to hold their show. He stated further relief was necessary in regard to the feed situation before much more could be expected in Annapolis County in Poultry Production.

Mr. Alden Harris, of Wolfville, reported that a good Show of Poultry had been held at Wolfville during the past season. Their show was held in an apple warehouse which makes an ideal Poultry Show building.

Mr. John R. McMullen, of Truro reported for the Colchester County Poultry Association and stated that the first show held had an entry of about 300 birds. The show held in December of last year had an entry of over 800 birds, of a greatly improved quality over those exhibited at the first show. The egg exhibit of over 30 entries was a credit to the show and showed the interest taken in egg production. The dressed poultry at this show was superior to any exhibit of the kind held in the Province of Nova Scotia.

As a delegate of the Colchester County Poultry Association Mr. McMullen stated that he was instructed by his Association to impress upon the Department of Agriculture and the Nova Scotia Poultry Association the necessity of holding an egg laying contest at the Provincial Agricultural College. He outlined the success which attended the organization of

school children amounted to about 1000 chickens. Mr. McMullen again brought the attention of the Association to the necessity for taking prompt action in regard to the holding of the laying contest.

A committee consisting of Mr. H. H. Hull, Glace Bay, W. W. Osborne, New Glasgow, and Mr. John McMullen Truro, was appointed to interview the Secretary of Agriculture and the Premier of the Province to press for immediate equipment and material to conduct an Egg Laying Contest at the Agricultural College to begin on October 1, 1919. This committee was instructed by the Association to await on the Secretary of Agriculture, Professor M. Cumming, and place their views before him at an early date.

A discussion followed in reference to the reorganizing of the Maritime Poultry Association and the Association decided to leave the matter as it now stood until the Maritime Poultry Show is held at Amherst.

A committee consisting of Messrs Landry, Mattinson, and Bath were appointed to draw up and submit at the next annual meeting an amendment to the constitution as outlined in the Act for encouraging Poultry Breeding. Mr. Bath wanted a copy of the minutes forwarded for local publication and the Association instructed the Secretary to have this done. A resolution was passed asking the publishers of the Maritime Farmer for permission to use their paper as the official organ of the Association. The Secretary was instructed to complete arrangements to this effect.

Mr. W. W. Osborne, suggested that any persons who had been improperly dealt with in purchasing stock should report it to the Secretary of the Association to be dealt with. If members of the Association, an explanation should be demanded, if non-members all members to be notified of any unfair dealing by these breeders delaring by these breeders of Poultry of Poultry. Mr. H. H. Hull, reported in full the details of the organization of a Federal Council of Poultrymen organized at Ottawa.

A NATIVE OF CLEMENTSPORT ONE OF SALEM'S OLDEST CITIZEN PASSED AWAY

Edmund P. Balcomb Was Noted Carpenter and Remarkably Active Man in His 91st Year.

"Salem Evening News", March 15

Edmund P. Balcomb, one of the oldest citizens of Salem, died at his home, 21 Ocean avenue, yesterday, in his 91st year, after a long illness. He was born in Clementsport, N. S., Aug. 15, 1828, the son of James and Mary (Potter) Balcomb, and he was educated in the public schools there. He learned the carpenter's trade in his native place, and in 1852 he came to Salem and worked at his trade for Bruce & Balcom. In the fall, he went to Yarmouth, N. S., lived there eight years, then spent the next eight years, in his native town, Clementsport. He next, came to Salem, where he remained ever since. On his return to Salem he became a member of the firm of Balcomb Brothers, contractors and builders, and he worked at this trade up to 1906, when he was 78 years of age. The last 20 years of his active life, he was in the employ of the Salem Elevator works.

When he came to Salem he built the first house on Ocean avenue, the avenue being then little more than a cow path and there was not a single house between the avenue and Derby house, where the South branch public library now stands. Mr. Balcomb was always a hard working man and

A GOOD CITIZEN

He married in Bridgetown, N. S., March 12, 1854, Miss Louisa A. Munroe daughter of Andrew and Phebe (Messenger) Munro, but she died in Salem April 25, 1892. Their married life was ideal and four children, two sons and two daughters, were born of the union, three of whom are living in Salem. They are Maj. Edwin B. Balcomb, the architect, and Frank L. Balcomb of the Salem Elevator Works, and Miss Lizzie M. Balcomb. He leaves four grandchildren, Frank W. Balcomb, Mrs. Burton, G. Phillip and Mrs. Louis W. Mount of Salem, and Mrs. Clarence E. Swett of Somerville, and four great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild, and a sister, Mrs. S. A. Ingham.

He attended the Lafayette Street church. He served in the military two days while in Nova Scotia, having been pressed into service in anticipation of a great Fenian raid. A few years ago he received \$100 in payment for his services then performed. He was a strong advocate of temperance and a horticultural expert.

With shipping facilities from Halifax to London and Liverpool re-established, it seems that there is a splendid opportunity for developing trade in this connection. It is only a question of price and transportation. Home markets have taken the entire supply during the war and at fair prices, but large quantities have been used on board the troop ships at Halifax and St. John. This demand having ceased other markets must be sought. It is a question between Boston on the one hand and Great Britain on the other as to where our surplus stock shall go. At present prices it would seem that the farmer should find the industry a very profitable one.

Wireless Phone From Ireland to Glace Bay.

LONDON, March 19—The establishment of wireless telephony between Ireland and Canada was announced today by the Marconi Company.

MONTREAL, March 19—Experiments in wireless telephony across the Atlantic have been proceeding for some time between the Glace Bay, N. S., and the Clifton, Ireland, stations of the Marconi Company. The London announcement indicates that they have been successful. The experiments are still being continued.

SUPREME COUNCIL TAKE STEPS TO KEEP PACE

POLES AND UKRAINIANS ORDERED TO STOP FIGHTING IN GALICIA

France Prepared to Resume Diplomatic Relations With Austria—International Air Code and Labor Agreement Adopted

PARIS, March 19.—The situation in Galicia was considered today by the supreme council and it was decided to request the Poles and the Ukrainians to cease hostilities under certain conditions.

The text of the official statement containing this announcement, issued this evening, follows:

"The supreme allied council met this afternoon between 3 and 7 o'clock. The exchange of views took place in regard to the military situation in Galicia. The council agreed to the terms of an injunction to be addressed to the two armies facing each other in front of Lemberg, requesting them to suspend hostilities at once, on certain conditions.

"The council then dealt with the western frontier of Poland and heard the report of the commission of Polish affairs, which was presented by its chairman, M. Jules Cambon.

"The next meeting will be held on Friday, March 21, at 3 p. m."

FRANCE TREATING WITH AUSTRIA

PARIS, March 18.—(Havas Agency) The French government, the Petit Parisien announces, desire to resume at least unofficially diplomatic relations with German Austria. Foreign Minister Pichon, it adds, has called to Paris Henri Allize, the French minister at The Hague. The paper says that M. Allize probably will be sent to Vienna.

Italian claims before the peace conference will encounter no difficulties, and a solution will be easy, according to the Paris correspondent of the Giornale D'Italia, of Rome.

A SIGNIFICANT ORDER

PARIS, March 19.—(Havas Agency) The chamber of deputies has authorized the removal of special fortifications about Paris, which were erected shortly after the war began.

The commission on international waterways, ports and railroads of the peace conference has decided to recommend to the conference that Switzerland should be given the navigable facilities on the Rhine for which she has made demands.

The military terms of the treaty of peace have been amended by the elimination of the clause providing for the control of Germany's armament for an indefinite period. Admiral Benson, of the United States navy, pointed out that the original terms committed the United States to a virtual indefinite occupation of Germany, and it was chiefly on his insistence that the terms were modified. It was also pointed out that control of any portions of Germany for such a period would delay the return home of American troops, and would amount to annulling the sovereignty of Germany.

As amended, the terms provided for control through the time fixed for the delivery of materials of war, guns and ships, but not through the period during which war damages will be paid by Germany.

INTERNATIONAL AID CODE

PARIS, March 19.—(By the Associated Press)—In a report submitted today the commission appointed to consider plans for an international air code announced that the British proposals have been, in the main, accepted. An international council will be formed as a section of the league of nations to handle all matters relative to aerial navigation.

It has been decided that each nation is entitled to sovereignty over the air above it, subject to the granting of permission for the passage of foreign aviators. There is to be no discrimination against any nation by another, air pilots will be on an equal international basis, and there will be international rules governing the right of way for airplanes and airships.

LABOR MATTERS SETTLED INTERNATIONALLY

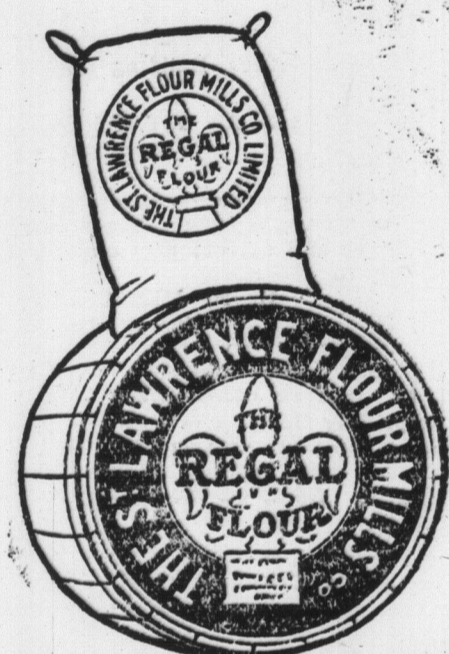
PARIS, March 19.—The commission on international labor legislation held probably its last meeting today when it reached an agreement on all points at issue. The American contention that each country should settle its internal labor problem without invoking the power of the league of nations prevailed.

The commission on the international regime of ports, waterways and railroads met at the ministry of public works today to consider clauses regarding transportation by rail to be inserted in the treaty of peace.

"The twenty-eight and twenty ninth meetings of the committee on the international labor legislation took place today. The special sub-committee, appointed to find a solution of the difficulties which have arisen in regard to application of labor conventions by certain federal states presented a report suggesting a solution which was adopted by the commission.

"The final reading of the British draft convention for the establishment of a permanent organization for international labor legislation was completed and the draft convention as amended was adopted by the commission for submission to the peace conference.

"The commission then continued the discussion of the labor clauses to be recommended for inclusion in the treaty of peace."

A Handsome Vessel

Yarmouth Herald

During the past year or so many handsome new vessels have visited Yarmouth, some of which were fully complete and ready for sea and were being towed to the loading ports, whilst others were in tow for their homes to be rigged and fitted. Another one, unriggered, arrived on Saturday in tow of steamer Keith Cann and is, without an exception, the prettiest lined vessel that has yet graced Yarmouth's waterfront. She was the schr. Herbert Eugene, launched a fortnight ago at Freeport, for La Have parties, to which place she will be towed by the tug Mary H. Cann to be rigged and fitted.

The handsome vessel measures 122.10 feet over all, 27 wide, 11 depth of hold and 190 gross tonnage. She was built under the supervision of W. A. Brooks, Freeport, and her fine lines and beautiful mould bespeak much credit for that gentleman as a master builder. ADmits THAT SHE POISONED HER HUSBAND

Seattle Girl Causes Death of Wife of Man She Waited

SEATTLE, March 19.—Miss Ruth Garrison, eighteen, confessed today, the police said, that she put poison in the food of her luncheon guest, Mrs. Grace E. Storris, twenty-eight, yesterday because Mrs. Storris was a rival to the affections of her husband Douglas Storris, an automobile mechanic. Mrs. Storris died in a department store emergency hospital immediately after luncheon.

Miss Garrison telephoned Mrs. Storris yesterday, the police allege, and asked her to come to lunch and discuss the question of a divorce for Storris. The girl reached the tea room ahead of her guest, ordered the meal and, according to the police, placed the poison in a fruit cocktail.

Miss Garrison was arrested today and under persistent questioning, the police said, she admitted placing the poison in Mrs. Storris' food.

Monroe Doctrine Placed in True Light

LONDON, March 20.—The Liverpool post says:

"Lord Robert Cecil places the Monroe Doctrine in its true light with regard to the League of Nations. He says in effect that so far from the League being the death blow to the capital article of American political faith it is the application of that article on a universal scale.

"According to the draft of the covenant the parties to the league undertake 'to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence on the part of every member of the League. The most absolute supporter of Monroeism could surely desire no more than that.

"The independence of both Americas is guaranteed by an overwhelming majority of the powers, great and small. The League of Nations will give America her rightful place in the van of the forces of civilization and henceforth are to shape the large purposes of our race."

BRITAIN MUST KEEP ARMY ON RHINE
Winston Churchill says Conditions in Europe are Getting Worse Instead of Better

LONDON, March 19—During debate in committee in the House of Commons today on the Military Service Bill, Winston Churchill, Minister of War, opposing the amendment limiting the operation of the Bill to December 31, 1919, instead of April 30, 1920, emphasized the fact that the British regular army had virtually disappeared, and that it was necessary to keep men whom the Bill retained, with the colors for overseas garrisons.

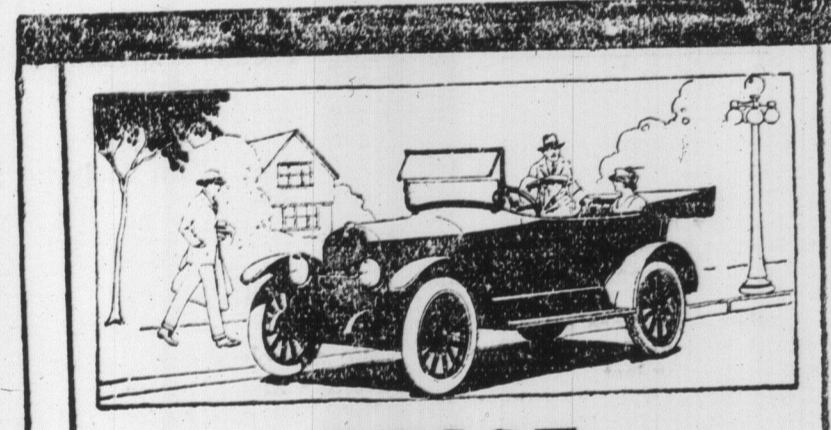

Population of Canada is Increasing

OTTAWA, March 19—Canada's estimated population today is 8,835,000 according to an answer given to Mr. Tobin in the House. The population last census was 7,206,643.
