WITH unfeigned sorrow the Agriculturists of the whole Province heard of the death of Joseph J. Northur, which took place, after a comparatively brief illness, on 20th January-Solemn and touching it is that we should have to record the melcholy event in the very number of the Journal containing the Prize List which he laboured so hard to perfect. Mr. Northup was widely known as a prominent and successful city merchant; but his marked tastes for agricultural pursuits, his interest in live stock, and his thoroughly practical knowledge in this department, were not so well understood. He felt an intense desire to see the farmers of Nova Scotia share the advantages of those improvements that had proved so beneficial in other countries; and, with this end in view, he laboured zealously, both in the Agricultural Board and out of it, freely devoting his time and energy and means to encourage, advise, and assist, wherever his help was required. He was appointed as one of the original Members of the Board of Agriculture, at its organization in 1864, and, through successive elections, continued to be a member up to the time of his decease-Of late years he occupied the prominent position of President. His singular business sagacity and constant activity enabled him to be of great service to the Boa , especially in the importation of live stock, of which he was an excellent judge. The zest with which he entered upon schemes for importation, his skill and business tact in making purchases of animals, and arranging for their safe and economical transit, were the means of saving large sums of money to the Province, and win long be remembered by his colleagues who accompanied him on those expeditions. Throughout his whole connection with the Board his untiring labours, alike in times of success and discouragement, were labours of love. He studiously avoided every recognition of a public kind of services he

had rendered,—complimentary references to himself by other Members of the Board were invariably omitted from the Reports, in deference to his well-understood wishes. Impelled by the true patriotic instinct, he loved to work for the benefit of others, and his reward was the sense of doing good to the hardy tillers of the soil, and of helping to raise them to a higher social position than had been attainable before. A very large portion of the farming class all over the Province will feel that the Nova Scotia tarmer's best friend has been laid in the tomb.

The publication of the present number of the Journal of Agriculture has been long delayed, in consequence of the necessary alterations and corrections upon the Prize List, which has been in type for the last six weeks, and is now issued in as complete a form as it has been found possible to make it. In adjusting a large number of conflicting suggestions, from numerous quarter the Committee have endeavoured, in each case, to adopt the course likely to prove most conducive to the agricultural interests of the Province at large, and they trust that the Prize List will, on examination, meet with the approval of the great majority of intelligent Agriculturists.

Held by authority of the Provincial Legislature of Nova Scotia, and under direction of the Central Board of Agriculture.

COMPETITION OPEN TO THE WHOLE PROVINCE.

PROGRAMME FOR THE WEEK.

For the convenience of persons at a distance who may intend to bring live aximals and articles requiring speedy and careful transit, the following particulars are given of the intended Programme of Arrangements. Further details will be made public sometime previous to the show:—

Monday, October 5.—The exhibition grounds and buildings will be opened this morning, at 7 o'clock, and continue open during the day, till sunset, for the reception and arrangement of exhibition articles, and animals. Exhibitors on arrival will immediately report themselves to the Superintendent of the Exhibition, who will allot appropriate pens or space for their exhibits. This day none but members of the general committee officials, judges, exhibitors and necessary attendants will be admitted.

Tuesday, 6 .- Live animals, cut flowers and hot house plants, and perishable articles generally, will be received this morning from sunrise up to 9 o'clock, A.M., precisely; when the judges in the various classes will meet at the Secret rry's office, obtain entry books, and commence to award premiums. As soon as the respective committees of judges have made their awards they will personally show their books to the Secretary, and will then be furnished with the requisite prize tickets, which it will be their duty to place carefully upon the various articles before giving up their books and report. This day the exhibition will be thrown open to the public at 2 o'clock, P.M., on payment of 50 cts. each time; children under twelve years of age 25 cts. At three o'clock, the President and Members of the Board of Agriculture will receive His Honor the Lieut. Governor, and such official persons as may be invited to take part in the opening ceremony. An address will be delivered. Seats on the platform will be reserved for throughout the Province that have subscribed to the Prize Fund.

Wednesday 7th.—The judges will this day meet as soon after 7 A.M., as possible, and will complete their awards, and will place all the remaining prize tickets. Admission to the public 25 cts. Children 10 cents.

Thursday, 8th.—Admission this day 25 cts., and children 10 cts.

Friday, 9th.—Admission this day 25 cts. Children 10 cts. The general committee will meet at twelve o'clock noon. An address will be delivered at 2 o'clock, P.M., and official amount ements made, after which (three o'clock) live stock may be removed from the grounds.

Saturday, 10th.—The Treasurer will commence paying premiums at the grounds at 9 A.M. All live stock and articles of every description will be removed this day, if not during the preceding atternoon.

Bands of music will be in attendance at stated intervals.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

- 1. Every intending competitor must transmit to the Secretary, not later than the dates mentioned below, an entry paper, containing a correct list of the animals or articles which he intends to exhibit, together with certificate of pedigree in the case of thorough-bred stock, or else a reference to the registry numbers of the Nova Scotia Stock Register, or English, Canadian or American Herl Books. Any competitior failing to transmit his entry certificate at the proper time will be excluded from competition. No fee is charged for the entry of animals or articles.
- 2. Horses, cattle, sheep, swine and poultry, must be entered on or before Saturday, 5th Sep., one month preceding the show, and the age of each animal should be stated in years, months and days
- 3. Plants and Flowers, Grain, Roots, Vegetables, and other field and garden products, Agricultural Implements, and manufactures of all kinds, and articles not eisewhere enumerated, may be entered up to Saturday, 26th September, one clear week preceding the show.
- 4. Exhibitors of bulky articles, requiring extensive or unusual accomodation, should communicate with the Secretary during the first week in September, in order that there may be time for the committee to make the requisite arrangements.
- ceive His Honor the Lieut. Governor, and such official persons as may be invited to take part in the opening ceremony. An address will be delivered. Scats on the platform will be reserved for the Presidents of all Agricultural Societies will be received up to 9 A.M., on Tuesday,

- 6th. All necessary erections, and bulky articles requiring to be put together on the grounds or in the buildings, must be finished, and all waste material and rubbish removed, not later than 12 o'clock, on Saturday, 3rd October, as no such work can be permitted during the show week.
- 6. Exhibitors will in every case give the necessary personal attention to whatever they exhibit. Necessary attendants upon stock and workmen, actually required to attend to machinery, will be furnished with admission tickets with their names written upon them, which tickets will be good at the Exhibitor's Gute, only during the show.
- 7. All articles for competion shall be the production or manufacture of the Province, except where otherwise mentioned, field produce must be the growth of 1874; and all live stock must have been owned and kept in the Province not less that three months prior to the Exl bition.
- 8. Articles from other countries, and especially from other Provinces of the Dominion, are solicited, but not for competition. The judges will have the power of granting a limited number of honorary prizes for such articles.
- 9. All expenses incurred in the conveyance of articles or animals to and from Halifax, placing them in the exhibition, and maintaining them while there, shall be borne by the exhibitors, who must likewise undertake all risk of loss or damage. Articles must in every case by delivered and unpacked free of expense to the Board.
- 10. Each exhibitor will receive from the Secretary an entry ticket for every article to be exhibited by him, and he is required to affix such ticket upon the article or animal which he exhibits, except in Class 11, Fruits, in which all articles exhibited will be taken charge of by an Arranging Committee.
- 11. When fewer than three competitors appear for any prize, and where the articles exhibited are of inferior merit, the judges shall have the discretionary power of awarding or withholding prizes or reducing their values. No article can take two prizes or be exhibited in two collections, unless the contrary is distinctly expressed in the prize list. In estimating the merits of live stock the judges are requested to take age into consideration where animals of different ages are competing against each other.
- 12. In case of ties, the judges will award the highest prizes to animals from largest herds, and to roots and grains from largest areas, upon proof furnished Secretary by exhibitors, upon entering animals, &c., for exhibition. The committee are required to reject articles

unfit for exhibition.

13. No person shall be allowed to enter for Exhibition more than one specimen (or required quantity) in any one section or class. This rule is not to ap ply to animals, but to apply to all kinds; of grain, vegetable products, plants and flowers, fruits, implements, home manufactures, &c.

14. During the exhibition, all vegetable products and manufactured articles ! tion Superintendents, and all live stock shall be taken charge of by their owners, -the Superintendents giving all practicable assistance in providing the necessary accommodation and food. Hay, straw, oats, and roots, will be supplied on the grounds at reasonable prices, and there will be a free supply of water.

15. All articles exposed for sale shall have the prices affixed, and be sold by the owners, or by parties appointed by them for that purpose. The Board, while desirous of affording every facility for business, are not to be regarded as undertaking any responsibility in connection with such transactions. No Auctioneer will be allowed to sell animals or articles on the grounds or in the building without the written permission of the President or Secretary of the Board of Agriculture, and the time and place of sale specified in such permission must be strictly adhered to.

16. Articles sent for competition or exbibition shall not be removed from the exhibition rooms or grounds, till the time appointed, under forfeiture of any prizes or awards that have been made to the respective exhibitors.

17. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall attempt to influence their decisions by his presence or remarks, or who shall afterwards, within the limits of the show grounds, use any contemptuous or abusive language, in consequence of any award made, shall forfoit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitle, and be otherwise dealt with as the Board may determine.

18. An Exhibitor who may feel aggrieved in consequence of any accidental irregularity, is requested simply to draw the attention of the Superintendent of the Department, or of some Member or Official of the Board to such, without entering into any discussion apt to cause hindrance or distraction. Should be not receive what he may consider sufficient redress on the spot, he must nevertheless abide by the decision given, and conform to the kules as interpreted by officials; but he may, at the close of the Exhibition, bring

which they shall consider unworthy or the matter before the Board by written statement, with a view to full enquiry.

> 19. No animal can be admitted within the enclosure that has not been previously entered in accordance with Regulations 1 and 2, and animals of an inferior character, unworthy of a place in the exhibition, will not be admitted under any circumstuices.

N. B .- The above Pregramme and Regulations will be carried out as structly as practicable but as the precise position shall be under the control of the Exhibit and extent of the Exhibition Buildings are not get determined, the Board reserve to themselves the power to make such changes in the Arrangements and Regulations as may become necessary for the successful carrying out of the Exhibiton.
