A BOOM IN WAR EAGLE.

MORNING BOARD QUIET .- A FAIR BUSINESS DONE IN AFTERNOON.

GAS AND STREET RAILWAYS SIEADY.

Whet'er the war news had a de-pr ssing effect on operators, or whether the buyers have been satiswhether the buyers have been satisfied with their purchases of last week and for the time being have their full complement of stock, it was clear that the demand had greatly slackened off, and with the exception of War Eagle and Montreal Gas, the list was slow in the extreme, with remarkably small sales and very little change in price. New York advices favored the bulls, the general market there being very strong.

MONTREAL GAS.

This stock assumed the leadership this stock assumed the leadership this morning, but as only 600 shares sold, it was more on account of the general duliness than of its own activity. The quotations were on the shady side, but the stock showed fair strength, as it only 1 st about \(\frac{3}{4}\) per cent. The closewas at 193\(\frac{7}{8}\) to 194.

CANADIAN PACIFIC.

The strength of Sterling Exchange The strength of Sterling Exchange being upward, has a tendency to narrow the price of Pacific between London and this market. There was one sale in New York, up to noon, at 82½, the quotation here being at the same price, as only 75 shares sold it looks as if the bulls had, in the meantime, decided to look on and see what the warlike news really means. It closes at 82½ to 82½, about ½ p.c over parity. over parity.

The public is not likely to come in on a day preceding an election, the results of which are expected to have an important effect upon values. On the Floor of the Exchange, the disposition of the traders is to attach undue importance to the State election but the country at large of course, looks with the greatest intercourse, looks with the greatest interest to the result of the election for Congressman. Should a republican majority in the next House be assured, it would really matter very little from a speculative standpoint if Van Wyck were to be the next Governor

of New York.
The feature of Saturday's market Dealers both inside and outside of the Exchange state that the demand for investment is increasing, with the result that first class bonds are now probably selling on a less remunerative basis than at any time in the financial history of this country. Taking this into consideration try. Taking this into consideration and also remembering that foreign nations are heavily in our debt, there seems to be no good grounds for the spasm of uneasiness which afficted some of the traders on the floor Saturday after the publication of the Bank statement.

The exports of the products of the mines which for the nine months ending September 30, 1898, are in round numbers \$20,000,000, have increased more than 33 p.c. since 1888; exports of the productions of the facets which were \$18,675,141 in the exports of the productions of the forests which were \$18,675,141 in the corresponding nine months of 1888, are in the nine months just ended \$30,776,578. Agricultural products which in nine months of 1888 were \$304,717,262, are in the nine months. \$304,717,362, are in the nine months just ended \$571,294,955. Exports of domestic manufactures, which in the nine months of 1888 were but \$99,842. \$1888 were but \$99,842. \$72, are in the nine months of 1898 \$227,822,845. It thus appears that the manufacturers have in the period 1888 98 enjoyed a larger growth in exports of their productions than any other class of our great pro-ducers.

ducers.
The September Summary of Commerce and Finance, issued by the Treasury Bureau of Statistics, from which these figures are gathered, shows that the exports of manufactures during he nine months ending September 30 have amounted to practically a million dollars a day for each business day of the year. These figures indicate that the exports of manufactures for the full calendar year will, for the first time in our history, reach the \$300,000,000 line. The exports of agricultural implements, which in nine months of 1897 were \$4,845,927, are in the corresponding months of the present year \$8,184,-331.
