

WRITS NOT YET ISSUED BUT THEY SOON WILL BE

Scott, Ross and Sifton in Conclave Preparatory to Final Organization for the Polling.

Winnipeg, Nov. 21.—(Special).—From information received here from Regina to-day it would appear that the announcement of the issuance of the writs for Saskatchewan was premature, tho there appears to be good foundation for the report that the provincial elections will be held on Dec. 23.

Walter Scott left here to-night for the west without making the expected announcement and he was accompanied by Mr. Ross, now of Moose Jaw, and formerly notorious in connection with Yukon scandals who was his first commissioner and subsequently federal representative when that constituency was abolished.

Ross has considerable influence in Central Saskatchewan and is thought to be together with that of Clifford Sifton, is regarded by some as being the final gathering of the party before the issue of the writs.

ASKING FOR TARIFF FAVORS ENAMEL MEN PRESENT CASE Industry Which Caters to People in Precarious State Because Europe's Low-Priced Labor Competes.

London, Nov. 21.—The tariff commission had a very busy session this morning, a number of deputations being heard. C. H. Wile of the London Rolling Mills Co. asked that the duty on enamel be not increased. He made a similar request in regard to the 22 ton duty on iron filings purchased in the United States. He also wanted 20 per cent. reduction on the duty on bituminous coal. He stated that the preferential tariff had caused his main competitors to come from the United States. The anti-dumping clause had also prevented the slaughter of American iron bars and steel in Canada.

The London fruit and vegetable dealers made a reply to the petition of the Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association at Toronto by asking for lower duties where the latter had asked for increases. They believed the dealers had been the means of increasing the consumption of fruit and that the growers had benefited thereby while imported fruit did not come in at a profit.

The manufacturers in Canada of steel enameled ware presented a statement asking that whatever the maximum ad valorem duty, which is recognized in the tariff act, there be a duty of 25 per cent. ad valorem on the ware, but Austria should be allowed to import the ware at a duty of 10 per cent. on the value of the ware. The greatest difficulty that enameled ware can be produced in this country is the cost of labor in Canada compared with that in Europe, which is only from 20 to 25 per cent. as great, is one reason. Five Hundred Manufacturers in Birmingham Working Under Agreements to Maintain Prices. Retail Trade Also Controlled by Monopolies in Great Britain. In his book "Protection and Prices," Watson Griffin devotes a chapter to "Combines in Britain."

BRITISH GOLD IN CANADA PROFITABLE FOR THE WORKER

Ruciman, M.P., Argues in Favor of Investments Abroad—Canada Wants Credit.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 21.—Walter Ruciman, M.P., addressing a Liberal meeting at Liverpool, said it had been argued that a vast amount of British capital invested abroad might be invested in England, and so provide work for her own people, but he could prove it was more profitable for our working classes when invested abroad. Three millions were recently borrowed in England by Canada in payment for machinery from the United States for farmers in the far west, but Canada did not buy gold sovereigns, only credit. The credit was transferred to the United States, who owed a good deal to Canada, and the credit was transferred to Japan. Japan, in turn, wanted to buy cotton from India, and our credit went to India, but India, too, did not want the gold sovereigns, she had been buying piece goods from Lancashire, and she asked us to pay Lancashire direct, and so the loan to Canada resulted in the transfer of \$3,000,000 worth of Lancashire goods to India. Could they wonder that men whose economies were so close as to say that the \$2,000,000 was lost to us were professional? Prof. Clapham of Leeds University, a free trader, addressing a meeting of the Bradford Conservative Club upon the colonial preference, said an objection to the scheme was it appealed only to the pockets of certain sections of the community in the colonies, and that it only appealed to certain colonies at all. He saw no reason to believe that the lumbermen of Eastern Canada would derive any great satisfaction from the knowledge that the Manitoba wheat-grower was given a preference. The scheme of preference would not work as a business arrangement unless it were eventually extended to all foodstuffs and raw materials.

PLOTTING AGAINST PALMAS.

May Have Been Attempted to Secure Up a Resignation.

Havana, Nov. 21.—Evidence obtained by the commission which is investigating the discovery of the secret police on Saturday last of arms, ammunition and accoutrements in a house in the Cerro suburb, is tending to implicate a few men of prominence. Government officials now admit that they have received various secret advices concerning contemplated uprisings before election day, particularly in the provinces of Santiago, Santa Clara and Pinar del Rio, with a probable attack on the palace in Havana. The object of the latter, according to these officials, appears to be the removal, possibly by assassination, of President Palma. The plotters, it is pointed out, are well aware, since there is now no vice-president, that the election, according to the constitution, will be in the hands of congress, and that the Liberals, with the help of a few independent, could control both houses. The generally accepted theory is that these rumors of plots are intended by its opponents to imbue President Palma with the idea of resigning, and that there are no actual plots to do him physical injury.

INCENDIARY ENDANGERS LIVES.

Barrie Baker is Accused of a Very Serious Offense.

Barrie Nov. 21.—Alfred E. Carcaden, a baker and restaurant keeper, who was under arrest on a charge of incendiarism. This morning fire was discovered in his shop, but luckily was extinguished before it had got any headway. Had the fire got a good start at the time it was discovered, it would have been very heavy and perhaps attended by loss of life, as the store is in the Queen's Hotel block and the hotel was crowded with guests. Justice Tretzel, who was presiding over the case, was presiding over a room on the first floor, named Carcaden a few years ago was a farmer in Oro Township, and had been in business in Barrie only a year, coming here from Orillia. He was arraigned before Police Magistrate Radenstam to-day, pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried by jury.
