WILL MR. THORNTON BE DECENT OUT OF HIS SEAT?

Kerosene Lamp Explodes in the Home of John Hayman, St. 49 Nicholas-street, Last Evening With Awful Results.

Mother Attempts to Rescue Her Babe From Flames and Her Own Clothing Takes Fire—Heroic Conduct of a Ten-Year-Old Boy.

In a fire which occurred a little before 6 o'clock last evening in the home of John Hayman, at 49 St. Nicholas-street, Clarence Hayman, a 13 month old child, had his life and Mrs. Mary Hayman, the mother, were terribly burned in a heroic attempt to rescue the infant.

About 5 o'clock Mrs. Hayman left her two children, Clarence and Edith, in the dining-room, while she prepared the evening meal in the kitchen. Clarence was seated in a high chair alongside the table, while his sister, who is about 2 years old, played about the room. After the children had been there about half an hour, Edith accidentally pulled the cloth off the table, dragging a kerosene lamp with it. The lamp fell into her little brother's lap, and exploded, the oil saturating the child's clothes. Edith fled in terror from the room, and screamed for her mother.

Mother's Awful Experience.
The latter had heard the explosion. She dashed at her child and vainly endeavored to extinguish the flames. In so doing her own clothes caught fire, and almost immediately she was a mass of flames. With no thought of herself, she extricated the child, and was then compelled to drop the infant on the floor. She hurried to the street and threw herself in the snow in an endeavor to quench the flames which were fast burning her alive.

Heroic Assistance.
At this time 10-year-old Frank Brown, who lives next door to the Hayman household, came out of his home and saw the woman struggling in the snow. With great presence of mind he laid bravely upon the infant, and in the possession of the flames, he found little Edith crouched in a corner in an almost exhausted condition. He was in the act of carrying Edith to the street when he saw Mrs. Hayman who, in the meantime, had managed to enter her home. He restrained the woman from going any further, and, as she was

Laurier, a majority even larger than the Liberals obtained four years ago. This is an event of consequence not only to Canadians, but to the whole British Empire, for it has killed the project for a customs union between the Mother Country and the great self-governing colonies.

The effect of this sweeping victory for the Liberal program in Canada upon the British Empire at large is unmistakable. Laurier will continue to discriminate in favor of British imports to the extent of 30 1/2 per cent, but it will not admit them duty free, and it will not even request a preference for Canadian products in the United Kingdom. The Liberal party, headed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and conspicuously represented by Sir Richard Cartwright, comprises all the friends of the United States in Canada. It is the party which recognizes the tremendous power of the influences which tend to connect economically and politically British North America with the great British Empire.

"The victory of Sir Wilfrid Laurier means that the Joint High Commission will shortly resume activity and will endeavor to modify the relations of the English-speaking Commonwealths upon this continent."

We desire the reader to pause for a moment after this remarkable extract, and allow us to pass on to our relations with the Mother Land and our prospects of getting preferential trade, and after dealing with that, we will return to our relationship with the United States. In the Jubilee year Sir Wilfrid Laurier cut a great figure in the procession, and the opportunity of his life came at that occasion to do something for preferential trade, or what the New York Sun is pleased to call, a British customs union, between the Mother Country and the colonies, and to declare in favor of the products of the United States. Sir Wilfrid Laurier failed to take advantage of that opportunity, he said nothing was to be got, and it is so to get that Canada did not want it—Canada was a free trade country like England, and not given to any measure that was discriminatory in its character. He was a free trader of the most out-and-out kind, and received as a recognition of this declaration the now notorious Cobden medal. Events moved along, the Spanish-American war came, and suddenly, in a single night, the Americans found that, while all the rest of the world was against them, Great Britain was their friend, and stood as between them and those hostile Governments which viewed with alarm the rise of the United States as a great power. Then came the war in South Africa, and the Americans in a degree reciprocated the kind offers of England, and the United States and Great Britain came out on better terms than ever they had been in the past. While all this was going on, two years or less ago, the Liberal Government at Ottawa passed a law which gave British goods a preference in the Canadian market over products from other countries, and nothing was exacted in return. This was decidedly objected to by the Conservative party in this country, and is still objected to by the Conservative party, and by papers like The World, who believe that to change with a view to the protection of our own industry, and who believe in this policy without any concessions being received in return. And we who believe in this policy believe that Canada has a duty to discharge toward the Mother Land, but that that duty should take another form than a trade concession to British manufactures and Canadian manufactures and Canadian workmen. Returns Show That He Had a Majority of 40 Votes Over Beith in West Durham, Yet There is a Protest.

Rowanville, Ont., Nov. 14.—A surprise was sprung on the public to-day at the official count of ballots cast in West Durham election by Mr. D. B. Simpson, Q.C., of this town, acting for the West Durham Liberal Association, of which he is the honorary president. When the votes had been counted, Mr. Simpson entered a protest against Mr. Thornton's nomination as the Liberal candidate, altho he had a majority of 40 votes. Mr. Simpson protested against Mr. Thornton's return on the ground that his nomination was not presented to the returning officer in accordance with the statute as set forth in section 34 of the Dominion Elections Act of 1900. The facts in this particular case are as follows:

The nomination day was fixed by the proclamation for Wednesday, Oct. 31, 1900, between 12 noon and 2 p.m. On Tuesday preceding nomination day, Mr. K. R. Is Being Sought After Thru the Assessment Commission Now in Session.

THE CASE OF SUMMER COTTAGES.

Are Tax Sales Insufficiently Advertised as Regards Non-Resident Owners.

The subject of assessment of lands and improvements thereon was again the principal phase of assessments dealt with by the commission yesterday.

Mr. Fullerton's proposal to amend the clause by adding the words, "and such land shall not be assessed as a summer cottage unless it is used as such."

Mr. Mackenzie suggested the following as an alternative clause to be added: "That no sale of land in any city or town shall be invalid by reason of their having been used as cottages within the county belonging to or possessed by the person assessed for the lands, or goods or chattels upon such lands liable to taxation, and no levy by distress having been made upon such goods or chattels for the payment of taxes due in respect of such lands."

Assess at Fair Value.

Assessment Commissioner Grant of London endorsed the proposition that all classes of property should be assessed at their fair value. In London, he said, the assessment was based on the value of the property, and not on the value of the improvements.

Single Tax Idea Again.

This did not meet the views of W. A. Douglas, the single tax man, who pointed out that Mr. Grant did not know what he was talking about.

Equality of Assessment.

James A. Proctor, chairman of the Court of Revision, said that his experience led him to believe that assessments are made from the point of view of a particular class of property.
