NEW CAR LOAD GRAIN WEIGHTS For C.P.R. on Export Business East and to Europe.

The C.P.R. have decided upon a minimum carload weight on grain and grain products. These weights will be applicable to export business to Europe who brought Canada to the fore as a cable to export business to Europe and points in the lower provinces, where export rates are used as a basis only. The minimum carload weight on grain (except oats), and on peas (whole or bulk), will be the marked capacity of the car. The minimum carload weight on grain products in bags or sacks and on oats will be 60,000 lbs. per car. Where the loading capacity of the minimum, but it must not be less than 35,000 lbs. The minimum carload weight on grain products in bagrels shall be 40,000 lbs. per car. This new classification of carload weights will take effect from May 13.


