



SIR WILLIAM RAMSAY.

The eminent English scientist, Si William Ramsay, whose name is so intimately associated with the new lement radium, is a born chemis He has always lived and moved in scientific atmosphere. His grandfather was a large manufacturing chemist his father was also intimately con nected with the science, tho he prac-

tised as a civil engineer, while his mother's father and brothers were all physicians and chemists. Sir William Ramsay is one of the world's youngest scientists, being only world's youngest scientists, being only fifty-two years of age. He is a Scotsman by descent and was born in Glasgow in 1852. His uncle, who was a sugar planter, when he died, left his library to young Ramsay's father. This library contained a selection of books on chemistry, one of which exercised a peculiar fascination for the youth. A horse that she was driving broke a shaft. She had to pay for fixing it. She had money and property of her own and her relatives declare her husband was forever trying to get her to give it to him. 

The body was recovered in a few minutes after in 25 feet of water with a trolling hook and efforts to revive were carried on for two hours. Heart failure is given as the cause of the accident. Blackie was in a bad state for several nours afterwards.
