

Great as would be the gain to Riverdale, there is nothing like sectionalism in the project, since convenient access to the rapidly grow-ing portion of the city, east of the Don has become a public necessity. That situation is shown by the fact that wo of the strongest advocates of the viaduct are Aid. Adams and J. J. Granam, of the sixth ward.
